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I have retained a keen interest in Indian Classical fine arts since childhood. I am just as interested in the folk arts as well.

Among the fine arts, I have been greatly interested in vocal music and the pakhawaj among percussion instruments, and among the folk arts I am especially keen on the Kirtan (Kirtan Bhakti). I received traditional training in the art of Kirtan (Haridasi) right since childhood from my father. As my father was a mahant in a temple, I was blessed with a spiritual background, along with the opportunity to pursue and learn all the three arts at home.

My father left for his heavenly abode when I was 12, and the next education in Music was initiated with a Diploma at the M.S. University of Baroda. After passing the old SSC examination, I earned a B.Mus. degree and a Diploma in Tabla from the M.S. University. I later completed my studies for the M.Mus. (Vocal) degree as well. I received some training under Guru Parampara from my mentor in Mumbai, Sangeetbhushan Ram Marathe ji. However, on account of indisposition, I had to return to Baroda. On account of having a temple of my own, I was again engaged in Kirtan and singing. I was also doing parts in Marathi Sangeet Nataks on the other hand, which gave me immense pleasure.

I followed on the path shown by my father and kept up my dedication to Music (Classical Vocal). I had the opportunity to serve at the Faculty of Performing Arts, M.S. University, Baroda, for 27 years. Coincidentally, I had the opportunity to study for the Ph.D. degree while in service at the university. The late Shri Shrikant Chaturvedi, a reader in the Vocal department, was my first guide.

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
