PREFACE

There is vast gap between women's economic contribution and their economic status, world over. This thesis attempt to work out the factors behind low economic status of women in urban informal sector in Baroda. Through an integration of women's perspective in economic analysis of the urban informal sector, I also attempt to contribute to a new conceptualisation of economic reality.

I believe that it is important to integrate women's perspective in economic theory not only to provide recognition and legitimate share to women but also to enrich and enlarge the scope of economic theory itself. Feminist scholarship has shown how the absence of women in economic theory results in skewed and often faulty understanding of economic reality.
