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#### APPENDIX A - IV

### Methods of Estimation of Economic Role Performance by Women

**Opportunity Cost Method II :** Based on an Earning Function

This method was based on earning function as mentioned in Chapter III pp.

#### <u>Steps</u>

- (i) <u>Estimation of an earning function</u> (Y) as mentioned in method
   II pp.
- (ii) Estimation of non-market work
  - a. For Employed Respondents :
  - Per hour wage (PHW) was calcualted on the basis of above mentioned earning function for each and every employed respondent.
  - Non-market (monthly) work hours were multiplied (NMWH)
     with (PHW) as calcualted above = (NMWH X PHW).
  - b. For Non-employed Respondents

The same earning function (Y) based on regression equation was imputed for non-employed respondents by making necessary changes as follows :

- Experience (EXP) = 0
- Experience X Education i.e., (EXP X EDU) = 0
- Education = 0 in case of illiterates.

It was considered appropriate to impute the wage equation (Y) derived from market work of employed respondents which was based on their education and experience to their counterpart non-employed respondents with the above mentioned changes. This will give the expected income of non-employed respondents as their experience in market work is zero. It should be mentioned here that this method explicitly gives more weightage/emphasis to the education variable and thus the results are likely to be biased. Secondly their experience being zero, does not mean that there was no scope of their potential experience in market work to be positive had they decided to enter the same. Inspite of these limitations this method was used to estimate the expected earnings of each and every non-employed respondents as per their human capital characteristics.

#### (iii) Economic Role Performance

- a. Employed Respondents : It included estimated monetary value of time spent in non-market productive work i.e.,
   (NMWH X PHW) + estimated earnings (Y) based on earning equation for each and every employed respondent.
- b. Non-employed Respondents : Estimated / Imputed monthly earnings : based on earning function (Y) after necessary changes as mentioned above for each and every non-employed respondent.

The mean monthly monetary valuation of non-market work was estimated by earning function to be Rs. 768.90 for employed and Rs. 300.30 for non employed respondents (Table 71). The mean monthly income from market work by employed respondents was estimated on the basis of wage equation (Rs. 422.70). The economic contribution of employed respondents through market and non-market work was estimated to be Rs. 1191.60 and for nonemployed respondents Rs. 300.30.

**Opportunity Cost III : Based on weighted average earnings** 

#### <u>Steps</u>

- (i) <u>The weighted average income</u> earned by employed respondents was calculated as follows :
  - The employed and non-employed sample was grouped according to their educational gualification as :

Illiterate upto primary level Above primary levél

- Income earned, under above mentioned categories from market work was multiplied by number of respondents at different levels of earnings. The sum of these was divided by corresponding number of respondents in that education category. Thus, the weighted average income was obtained.
- This weighted average income was applied to each group of respondents having similar qualification amongst non-employed respondents.

The method of application of weighted average earnings of employed respondents to their counterpart non-employed respondents was considered appropriate as employed respondents were having similar pattern of educational qualification and belonged to the same tribal area as employed respondents except that they did not participate in market work. However, this method is biased. Since education is again considered the only human capital variable affecting the income and secondly the weighted average is sensitive to the number of respondents and income which is unique to the sample. Thus, there is a sample bias also.

- (ii) Estimation of non-market work
  - a. For Employed Respondents :

Per hour wage (PHW) was calculated from the actual income earned from market work.

Per hour wage was multiplied by monthly hours of nonmarket productive work hours by employed respondents. This valuation resulted in estimating the cost of time spent in performing non-market work by employed respondents.

b. For Non-employed Respondents

The weighted average valuation as mentioned in step (i) was applied in estimating the cost of time spent in performing non-market work by non-employed sample.

Thus, the economic role performance for :

- a. Employed Respondents : estimated cost of time spent in non-market productive work (mentioned in step ii) by employed respondents + actual monthly earnings from market work.
- b. Non-employed Respondents : the weighted average valuation of non-market productive work by non-employed respondents as mentioned in step (i).

In case of employed women, the monthly valuation of nonmarket work, based on their earnings from market work, also has a bias. The value of non-market work due to their nature, intensity and skill required, can not be made equivalent to the earnings from corresponding market work. Logically for similar type of non-market work, the valuation should be at par across women assuming their skills to be homogenous. But this method would give different values depending upon their income from market which is again specific to the sample. Inspite of this limitation

the monetary value of non-market work of entire sample was estimated by this method to find out the variation in the result.

The findings disclosed that mean monthly monetary valuation of non-market work based on weighted average earnings was estimated to be Rs.1835.45 for employed and Rs. 1027.92 for non employed respondenets (Table 72). The actual mean monthly income of employed respondents from market work was calculated to be Rs. 1380.76. The economic contribution of respondents through participation in market and non-market work was estimated to be 3216.21 for employed and Rs. 1027.92 for non employed respondents.

#### APPENDIX A - V

#### Food Adequacy and Consumption Expenditure per Consumption Unit

For assessment of the adequacy of food it becomes necessary to bring the whole family at a unit level so as to get a realistic and comparable picture. Family members are a group of persons of different age groups and sex. For this purpose food intake of women and children are assessed in terms of those of the average man by applying appropriate co-efficients to the different age, sex group and occupation too. In the present study number of consumption units were calculated by this method.

For example; a family consisting of father doing sedentary work and mother and three children aged 10, 8 and 6 years has an adult man equivalent or consumption unit of 3.9 (i.e., 1.0 + 0.8 +0.8 + 0.7 + 0.6) and the daily energy requirement of the family would be 2400 x 3.9 or 9400 Kcals. (Gopalan, 1993) The calorie intake of each household was calculated from dietary composition tables. The results of actual calorie intake were compared with the standards of Recommended Dietary Allowances. The assessment was made at three levels.

These scores were helpful in determining the health status of all members of households under study and were used as indicator of health status in composite household development indicators.

**Per Unit Consumption Expenditure Pattern :** Expenditure pattern was assessed on the basis of per consumptions unit as calculated for estimation of food adequacy.
