PROCEDURES USED IN COMPUTING SOCIO-ECONOMIC STATUS (S.E.S.) OF THE TEACHERS IN THE COLLEGES AFFILIATED TO GUJARAT UNIVERSITY

Income, education, upbringing, age, foreign exposure, of the teachers, occupation, education of the father were taken as bases of the S.E.S. of the teacher.

- 1. According to income, a teacher was given a rating from 1 to 3 as follows:
 - (1) Middle Rs. 400 + to Rs. 800 per month
 - (2) High Middle Rs. 800 + to 1200 per month
 - (3) High Rs. 1200 + and above per month
- 2. According to education, a teacher was given a rating from 1 to 3 as follows:
 - (a) Bachelor's degree
 - (1) Pass Class
 - (2) Second Class
 - (3) First Class
 - (b) Master's degree
 - (1) Pass class
 - (2) Second class
 - (3) First Class
 - (c) Ph.D.

- 3. According to upbringing also a teacher was given 1 to 3 rating
 - (1) Village
 - (2) City
 - (3) Town
- 4. Age
 - (1) 45 4 to 560
- (1) 25 + to 35
- (2) 35 + to 45
- (2) 35 + to 45
- (3) $25 \div \text{ to } 35$
- (3) 45 + to 55 and above
- 5. Foreign Exposure
 - (1) Just a visit
 - (2) Visit to foreign university
 - (3) Study in foreign university
- 6. Occupation of the father
 - (1) Manual labour, farmer
 - (2) Clerks, school teachers, college teacher, junior officer
 - (3) Doctors, Lawyers, Industrialists, Businessmen
- 7. Education of the father
 - (1) Illiterate
 - (2) School Education
 - (3) College education

To compute S.E.S. of a teacher the above mentioned 7 ratings were pooled together and the S.E.S. was arrived as shown below:
