Letter to Principals Asking for Rating of Teachers

You are requested to use the following definitions to guide you in the selection of teachers who will participate in the study.

Committed teachers: are those teachers who are recognised as being devoted or dedicated to the teaching profession. They are serious in their intent to remain in the profession and to make their efforts count in achieving high quality in education. Committed teachers are known by their positive attitude toward the profession and may include those who show promise as well as those whose work gives evidence of their intent.

<u>Non-committed teachers</u>: are those teachers whose major interests and concerns are not focused on the teaching profession. They do not intend to remain in the teaching profession for long and their efforts may be largely for purposes other than achieving high quality in education. The attitude of non committed teachers toward the profession is not necessarily negative, but it may be quite casual. They may be considered as being the opposite of committed or dedicated to the teaching profession.
