



INTRODUCTION

The idea of establishing a University at Baroda was engaging the attention of the former Government of Baroda State since the year 1909. Some schemes for a University were framed but none of them materialised. In 1925, Baroda University Commission with Professor A. G. Widgery as Chairman was appointed. It made out a strong case for the immediate establishment of a unitary residential University at Baroda having the faculties of Arts, Science, Technology and Agriculture, and Economics, Commerce and Administration. Besides the faculties, the University was to have the Institute for Oriental Studies, the Institute for Gujarati Studies, the School of Fine Arts, the School of Nursing and the School of Domestic Science. Provision was also to be made for extension courses, library movement as a University extension movement and compulsory medical examination. Circumstances, however, were not favourable to the establishment of a separate University, but the idea continued to grow unabated. The following institutions for higher education were established in Baroda during the two decades that followed:

- I The Secondary Teachers' Training College in 1935
- 2 The Sayaji Golden Jubilee Science Institute in 1937
- 3 The Pratapsinh College of Commerce and Economics in 1942
- 4 Government orders were passed to establish Medical and Engineering Colleges which ultimately began functioning from 1949

In 1947, His Highness Maharaja Sir Pratapsinh Gaekwad encouraged the idea of the University and appointed a Committee under the Chair-

manship of Shri K. M. Munshi to offer practical suggestions for its early establishment. The Committee submitted its report to the Government of Baroda towards the end of the year 1948 and recommended that the University should be primarily a teaching and a residential University with an affiliating side to accommodate mofussil colleges and should institute the tutorial system of instruction. All the existing higher educational institutions including the Central Library, the Oriental Institute and the Kalabhavan were to be taken over by the University. The Committee also recommended that Government should give a block grant of Rs. 25 lakhs annually to the University for the first five years.

The Government of Baroda in their order No. (R) 169-39 dated the 21st February, 1949, decided to establish a residential University for Baroda and to affiliate on its external side, the Colleges at Visnagar, Petlad and Navsari which were situated in the State of Baroda. Due to the subsequent merger of the Baroda State with the State of Bombay, the Baroda Government restricted the jurisdiction of the University to the area within a radius of ten miles of its office. The University started working on the 30th April, 1949 with the following institutions:

- (a) Constituent Institutions under the management of the Uni-

By June, 1950 the institutions taken over were re-organised into six Faculties of Arts, Science, Education and Psychology, Medicine, Commerce, and Technology and Engineering, and the First Year and the Intermediate classes in Arts and Commerce were organised into a separate institution

called the Intermediate College. Three new Faculties of Fine Arts, Home Science and Social Work were also started from June, 1950. The management of the Baroda Sanskrit Mahavidyalaya and the Gujarati Section of the Old Baroda High School were taken over by the University from the Government of Bombay in 1951. The University continued to follow Bombay University courses and standards of admissions, examinations, etc. in old faculties in the academic years 1949-50 and 1950-51. During this period, new courses and standards of admissions and examinations were prescribed and they were introduced year after year from June, 1951 onwards. The first examinations of the University were held in March-April, 1951. Considerable development has taken place in all Faculties and Institutions in the way of improvements in the existing courses and the standard of instruction, starting of new departments and courses, provision of adequate staff, improving old buildings and providing new buildings and sanctioning the necessary grants for library, equipment and contingent expenditure. The development for the preceeding years are described in the seven Annual Reports published so far. This eighth Annual Report covers the period from the 1st July, 1956 to the 30th June, 1957 and is submitted to the Senate in accordance with section 24 (2) of the Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda Act as amended up-to-date.

CHAPTER I-GENERAL

1. Institutions in the University

Constituent and Recognised Institutions (under sections 42 and 69 of the Act).

- (1) (a) Faculty of Arts: Provides courses leading to the degrees of B.A. and M.A. and guidance in research for the Ph.D. the Diploma in Library Science.
 - (b) The Oriental Institute: Provides facilities for research work in Sanskrit and Ancient Indian Culture and undertakes publication work in Gujarati, Marathi and Sanskrit.
 - (c) The Baroda Sanskrit Mahavidyalaya: Provides courses leading to the degrees of 'Acharya' and 'Shastri' and the 'Upadhyaya'.
- (2) Faculty of Science: Provides courses leading to the degrees of B.Sc. and M.Sc. and guidance in research for Ph.D. degree. paratory Science and Intermediate Science examinations upto
- (3) Faculty of Education and Psychology: Provides courses leading to the degrees of B.Ed., M.Ed., B.A. (Psycho.) and M.A. (Psycho.) and guidance in research for the M.Ed. and the diploma in Teaching. The University Experimental School is Psychology and conducts classes from Standard I to Standard Certificate of the Bombay State.
- (4) Faculty of Commerce: Provides courses leading to the degrees of B.Com. and M. Com., post-graduate diploma in Banking, search for the Ph.D. degree.

 (5) Faculty of Medicine (7)
- (5) Faculty of Medicine (The Medical College, Baroda): Provides courses leading to the degrees of M.B., B.S., M.D., M.S., D.M.R. & E., D.Ped., D.V. & D., T.D.D. and D.C.P. The College is managed by the Government of Bombay.

- Sheth Ujamshi Pitambardas Ayurvedic Research Unit: Provides facilities for research in Ayurveda.
- (6) Faculty of Technology and Engineering: Provides courses leading to the degrees of B.E. and M.E. (Civil, Mechanical and Electrical), B.Text. (Eng.), B.Text. (Tech.), and B.Arch., the diplomas in Civil, Mechanical and Electrical Engineering, Textile Chemistry, Textile Technology and Architecture; and the certificate courses for Turners and Fitters, Wiremen, Carpentry, Dyeing and Weaving and guidance in research for the Ph.D. degree in Textile Chemistry. In addition, the Faculty has a Technical High School attached to it, which conducts courses leading to the examination for the Secondary School Certificate of the Bombay State.
- (7) (a) Faculty of Fine Arts: Provides courses leading to the degrees of B.A. (Fine) and M.A. (Fine), post-diploma and diploma courses in Painting, Sculpture and Applied Arts, post-graduate diploma course in Museology, diploma courses in Textile Design and certificate courses in Photography, Lithography, Pottery, Wood-work, Bronze-casting and Process and Block-making.
 - (b) College of Indian Music, Dance and Dramatics: Provides courses leading to the degrees of B. Mus. and M. Mus. and diplomas in Music (Vocal and Instrumental), Dance and Dramatics, an advance diploma course in Dance and a three year S. S. C. course in Vocal Music.
- (8) Faculty of Home Science: Provides courses leading to the degrees of B.Sc. (Home) and M.Sc. (Home). The Chetan Balwadi is attached to the Faculty for experiments and observations in Child Development.
- (9) Faculty of Social Work: Provides a post-graduate course leading to the degree of M. S. W.
- (10) Intermediate College: Provided courses leading to the Preparatory and Intermediate examinations in Arts and Commerce upto March, 1957. From June, 1957 it provides courses leading to the Preparatory Arts, Science and Commerce examinations only.
- (II) The Museum and Picture Gallery (managed by the Government of Bombay).

3. Special features of the year

(1) Progress of Important Research Projects*

- (i) Department of Gujarati has two schemes on hand viz. (a) Editing and publishing critical editions of Old Gujarati Texts under the title Prachin Gurjar Granthmala; which has five volumes to its credit. The last two volumes Nalakhyana and Varnak Samuchhaya were published during the year. (b) Publication of the literary material of late Professor B. K. Thakore, where two volumes Niruttama and Lectures by Professor B. K. Thakore Part III are published so far.
- (ii) Department of Archaeology carries out explorations and excavations at selected sites and publishes results under the title 'M. S. University of Baroda Archaeological Series'. The third volume of the series 'The Personality of India' was published during the year.
- (iii) Department of Sociology has three major schemes on hand. (a) Sociological study of a multi-caste village in Gujarat for which Barot records are available is being conducted under a grant from Chicago University. (b) A study of urbanisation and industrialisation in a village is financed partly by the University Grants Commission as a part of its scheme of research in Social Tensions. (c) A study of the Social Changes in Mahuva, a coastal town in Saurashtra, is being financed by the Rockefeller
- (iv) Department of History has been doing research in (a) the Muslim History of Gujarat from 1200 to 1750 A.D. and (b) editing the records of correspondence between Baroda Government and Baroda Residency.
- (v) The Oriental Institute has undertaken since the year 1951 the publication of a critical and illustrated edition of the Valmiki Ramayana. The work is expected to continue for eight years and estimated to cost Rs. 8.25 lakhs. Work of collation of Bal-kanda and Ayodhya-kanda

having been completed, editing of these Kandas has been taken up and portion of the Bal-kanda is in Press. The collation of Aranya-kanda has been taken up.

- (vi) Scheme of compilation of a Cultural Chronology of Gujarat from the earliest times upto the year of Independence-1947 A.D.-in four volumes is also taken up by the University. The manuscript of the first volume covering the pre-history period upto 942 A.D.—the end of Chavda rule—is ready and being scrutinized by a committee of experts.
- (vii) In Chemistry Department, research work is being done on Halogenation of Coumarins and flavones, Chemical investigations of medicinal plants, colouring matter of Raphanues caudatus, etc. Work is also being done on the construction of a magnetic balance under a grant from the Ministry of Education, Government of India.
- Bio-chemistry Department is working on two schemes sponsored by the Indian Council of Medical Research: (viii) (a) Studies on animal tissues in a synthetic culture, and (b) Studies on human lactation. It is also working on a project C4 Metabolism in A Nigar and Food Yeast under grants from Council of Scientific and Industrial Research and Bombay Industries Research Committee respectively.*
 - Department of Zoology does research work in the fields of Animal Physiology, Avian Biology and Comparative Anatomy.
 - (x) Botany Department conducts research in the fields of Embryology, Flora of area round Baroda and Pavagadh Hill, grasses and grass-lands of Gujarat.
 - (xi) Physics Department works in the fields of Heat transfer, Viscosity measurements, Inter-ferometry and Crystal growth. A scheme of Optical studies on etched surfaces of metal and alloy crystals is also taken up on a grant from the Council of Scientific and Industrial Research.

^{*} The University is financing research to study the mechanism of formation of different acids in various plant tissues.

- (xii) Department of Statistics is engaged in various statistical summaries and analyses and some problems of Mathematical Statistics.
- (xiii) Faculty of Education and Psychology works on four schemes of research: (a) Vocational and educational guidance, (b) Construction and standardisation of achievement tests in Gujarati, (c) Rural work project, (d) Inquiry into Psychological factors related to adolescent adjustments. The first three schemes are financed by the Government of India and the fourth by the Indian Council of Medical Research.
- (xiv) Faculty of Commerce is conducting a joint study of Rural incomes and savings in Gujarat and Rural capital formation under the auspices of the Planning Commission.

 The work is nearing completion.
- (xv) Faculty of Medicine carries on three schemes under Indian Council of Medical Research grants viz. (a) Inquiry on the influence of cooking on the nutritional value mia in pregnancy, (c) Influence of antirheumatic substances on the hyperphysico-adrenocortial axis.
- (xvi) Faculty of Technology has started research work in its during the year are: (a) Reinforced stone and brick foundations, (c) Machines for spinning and picker test-cost housing, (f) Study in Naphthol dyes, etc.
- (xvii) Faculty of Social Work carries on a Survey of the gradufinanced by the University Grants Commission.
- (xviii) College of Indian Music, Dance and Dramatics has a research section which prepares a bibliography of published and unpublished works on music, a subject index inquiries in subjects like family history of different

gharanas, the state and form of music in different periods of history, etc.


(2) Important events

- (i) The University started the following new courses from July, 1956:
 - (a) Post-graduate diploma in Library Science,
 - (b) Master of Engineering—Civil, Mechanical and Electrical.
- (ii) The Fourth meeting of the All-India Council of Secondary Education was held in the University in December, 1956.
- (iii) The French Cultural Week was organised by the University from the 1st to the 8th July, 1956 and the German Cultural Week from the 12th to the 18th December, 1956. The programme included lectures by the Consuls of the respective countries, exhibitions of pictures and photographs and film shows on the various aspects of life in these countries.
- (iv) The Annual Conference of the Indian Mathematical Society was held under the auspices of the University at Baroda in the last week of December, 1956.
- (v) Conference of the representatives of the eight Universities in the Western Region on General Education was held in the University on the 6th and the 7th February, 1957.
- (vi) A Workshop on Examinations was organised in the Faculty of Education and Psychology by the Ministry of Education, Government of India, for Lecturers in Training Colleges in India in the month of March, 1957. It was conducted by Dr. Benjamin Bloom, the Chicago University expert.
- (vii) The Sanskrit Commission appointed by the Government of India visited the University on the 21st and the 22nd April, 1957.
- (viii) Three members of the staff of the Faculty of Arts—Professor M. N. Srinivas (Sociology), Professor B. J. Sandesara (Gujarati) and Dr. N. G. Kalelkar (Linguistic), received grants from the Rockefeller Foundation, U.S.A., for study and lecture tours in U.S.A.

- (ix) Professor T. K. N. Menon, Dean, Faculty of Education and Psychology was included in the delegation of educationists sent by the Government of India to U.S.S.R. to study the educational system of that country.
- (x) In the team of University teachers sent by the Government of India to U.S.A. under Wheat Loan Educational Exchange Programme to study General Education, two teachers of the University—Shri V. Y. Kantak, Reader and Head of the Department of English and Shri K. S. Yagnik, Senior Lecturer in Education—were included.
- (xi) The University decided to introduce three year degree courses in Arts, Science and Commerce from June, 1957.
- (xii) The Sixth Annual Convocation for conferring degrees and diplomas was held on the 13th October, 1956 in the Shamigardens. Dr. John Matthai, Vice-Chancellor, University Bombay, addressed the Convocation.

7. Finances of the University

(I) Endowments received during the year:

The Syndicate accepted the following new endowments during the year:

(a) Shri N. A. Mody Memorial Prize Fund

A donation of Rs. 1,500 in form of securities (3% Conversion Loan, 1986) was accepted as per Syndicate Resolution No. 41 dated the 22nd September, 1956 from Shri Amritlal Chunilal Mody in memory of his son Shri Natwarlal A. Mody for awarding a prize every year from the interest accrued on the securities, to a student who obtains the highest number of marks with atleast second class in B.Sc. Examination of the University (with Principal Chemistry) and prosecutes his studies further and takes In-organic Chemistry.

(b) Shri Harivadan Bhatt Smarak Fund

A donation of Rs. 1,791 was accepted as per Syndicate Resolution No. 63 dated the 26th August, 1956 from Shri Keshubhai Valia, Jamnagar, the member of the Trust Committee of Shri Harivadan Bhatt Smarak Fund, for awarding every year a prize in cash from the interest accrued on the securities, to the best candidate passing the B.A. (Fine) Examination of the Faculty of Fine Arts in Painting and Sculpture, by rotation.

The amount of the donation of Rs. 1,791 is invested in 3% Conversion Loan, 1986 of the face value of Rs. 2,400 (Transferred at R. 73.75% from Technology & Engineering Fund to Shri Harivadan Bhatt Smarak Fund).

(c) Kashigauri Kantawala Scholarship Fund

A donation of Rs. 10,000 was accepted as per Syndicate Resolution No. 40 dated the 22nd September, 1956 from Shri M. H. Kantawala in memory of his wife Shrimati Kashigauri Kantawala for awarding scholarship in the College of Indian Music, Dance and Dramatics from the interest accrued on the security after deducting management charges, to a girl student who passes the third year degree examination of B. Mus. in Vocal and Instrumental Music in alternate years with the highest number of marks securing at least second class and prosecutes her study further in the College.

In the event of no suitable girl student being eligible for the award of the scholarship in any particular year, it may be awarded for the alternate subject in that year failing which it may be awarded to a girl student on the results of the second year degree examination in B.Mus. in like manner; failing this also the scholarship may be awarded to a girl student on the results of the final year diploma examination in Vocal and Instrumental Music alternately.

The amount of the donation of Rs. 10,000 is invested in 4% Bombay State Development Loan, 1970 of the face value of Rs. 9,900.

CHAPTER II—OFFICERS AND AUTHORITIES OF THE UNIVERSITY

1. Officers

(I) The Chancellor:

3. Starting of new departments and courses

An important decision by the Syndicate in the direction of improvement of the educational pattern was to introduce three year degree courses in the Faculties of Arts, Science and Commerce. As a consequential change the procedure of admissions for Medical and Engineering Degree courses was modified. It was laid down that passing of Pre-medical examination shall be the minimum qualification for admission to the M.B.,B.S. course in the University from June, 1958. It was decided to start a Pre-medical course in the Faculty of Science from June, 1957. In the case of admissions to the Technology and Engineering Degree courses it was decided to add the Pre-professional course to the existing degree courses and re-organise them into integrated courses of five and four years' duration respectively. All these new courses were started from June 1957.

The Syndicate also considered the question of integrating the General Education courses in the three year degree courses. The General Educa-

tion Committee had already drawn up in the previous year a detailed scheme of lectures in the three areas of Humanities, Social Sciences and Natural Sciences and recommended that the subjects be included in the first two years of the three year degree courses. The Syndicate approved this recommendation and included General Education as a regular subject in the three year degree courses. It was also decided to include it as a regular subject in the Pre-medical course, the First Year of the new B.E. course, and the first years of the courses in the Faculties of Home Science and Fine Arts. It was also decided that there should be no formal yearend examination in this subject but the student's progress and performance be judged on the basis of the record of his class-work throughout the year. The University had the advantage of being the seat of a regional Seminar on General Education convened by the Ministry of Education on the 6th and the 7th February, 1957 at which representatives of eight Universities participated. Two of its teachers were also deputed by the Government of India to study General Education programmes in U.S.A. Deliberations at the Seminar showed that there a lot of clarification and co-ordination was needed to implement properly the General Education programme. The Syndicate, therefore, sanctioned a separate department of General Education with a whole-time Co-ordinator and necessary staff and a separate office, to co-ordinate and watch the progress of General Education programme in the University.

The Syndicate approved the starting of the following new courses:

- (i) Post-graduate course leading to the Diploma in Library Science;
- (ii) Post-graduate courses leading to the degrees of Master of Engineering (Civil, Mechanical and Electrical).

4. New developments and improvements in the existing departments

In the Faculty of Arts, new post of Junior Lecturer in Hindi was sanctioned to replace the post of a part-time teacher and part-time appointments in the department of English were continued to provide for intensive teaching of English. Suitable special grants were also provided for books, contingency and equipment to continue research and publication work in the departments of Economics, Gujarati, History, Sanskrit and Sociology.

In the Faculty of Science, instituted posts of Professors of Statistics and Physics were filled up to handle the development of post-graduate and

research work which has been expanding steadily in these departments. One Junior Lecturer was added to the staff of each of the departments of Botany, Zoology and Mathematics. A micro-analytical laboratory was started in the department of Chemistry and special grants were approved for Herbarium room in the Botany department and for furnishing the research room of Zoology department.

In the Faculty of Education and Psychology, a Professor in Educational Administration and a Reader in Psychology were appointed during the year. Provision was also made for purchase of apparatus, equipment, printing, etc. for research.

In the Faculty of Commerce, three part-time posts of Professors of Cost and Management Accounts, Industrial Law and Income-tax Law were filled up.

In the Faculty of Technology and Engineering, posts of Professor of Architecture and Professor of Textile Chemistry were filled up. Also new posts of a Senior Lecturer in Textile Chemistry and Junior Lecturer in Civil Engineering were created.

In the Faculty of Fine Arts, a post of Junior Lecturer in Exhibition and Photography was created. An additional amount for deadstock, equipment and apparatus was provided to meet the additional requirements for post-graduate instructions.

In the Faculty of Home Science, the staff was strengthened by addition of a Senior Lecturer and a Junior Lecturer

Post-graduate scholarships in all the Faculties and Institutions were revised from Rs. 30 per month to Rs. 40 per month.

The administrative and supervision work of Shrimati Sarojini Devi Hall of Residence for women students having increased considerably, a full time Superintendent for the Hall was appointed from the 1st May, 1957.

5. Honorary Professors

The scheme of inviting eminent scholars and experts in the specialised branches of knowledge as Honorary and Visiting Professors and Lecturers is continued. Under the scheme, Shri C. C. Mehta, Honorary Professor of Dramatics in the College of Indian Music, Dance and Dramatics, Shri H. K. Doring, Honorary Professor in Sculpture in the Faculty of Fine Arts, Principal N. M. Shah, Honorary Professor of Mathematics in the Faculty of Science, Shri L. B. Shastri, Honorary Lecturer in Aesthetics in the

Faculty of Fine Arts, Shrimati Mirabai Badkar and Shri Goolam Rasulkhan, Honorary Lecturers in the College of Indian Music, Dance and Dramatics were continued during the year. Shri G. M. Jadhav was appointed Honorary Lecturer in French and German during the year. Besides these, some other eminent persons were invited to deliver lectures, the details of which will be found in Chapter XXIV.

6. Research Assistants and Research Students

Schemes to appoint Research Assistants and Research Students was also continued. During the year, there were five Research Assistants and four Research Students working in the University under this scheme.

7. Additional grants for research

In addition to the amounts sanctioned in the revenue budget and grants received from Government and Research Bodies, the University also considered the schemes of surveys, research, studies, etc., and sanctioned necessary grants for books, equipment and contingency to improve facilities for research work. Some schemes approved previously were continued and some additional schemes were sanctioned during the year. Additional grants sanctioned during the year were as follows:

CHAPTER V-OTHER AUTHORITIES OF THE UNIVERSITY

1. Council of Post-graduate Studies and Research

The main business at the meetings of the Faculties of Arts, Science and Commerce, Education and Psychology and Technology and Engineering and the two joint meetings of the Faculties of Arts, Science and Commerce and the Faculties of Arts and Commerce, was to consider the recommendations of the various Boards of Studies about the syllabi in the subjects coming within their purview for the three year degree courses, the Pre-medical course and the new B.E. and B.Text. courses scheduled to start from June, 1957. The following are some of the other recommendations made by the Faculties mentioned above and the other Faculties:—

(a) The Faculties of Arts, Science, Education and Psychology and Commerce recommended that the viva voce be introduced at the Master's degree examination.

- (b) Faculty of Arts on the recommendation of the relevant Boards of Studies recommended that
 - (i) Two new degrees 'Vachaspati' and Master's degree in 'Library Science' be instituted, and
 - (ii) Candidates, who have passed the 'Shastri' examination be considered eligible for admission to first year
 B.A. provided they have passed S. S. C. in subjects laid down in Ordinance 167.
- (c) Faculty of Education and Psychology on the recommendation of the relevant Boards of Studies recommended:
 - (i) Addition of methods of teaching Agriculture, Commerce, Social Studies, School Libraries and School Administration in B.Ed. examination.
 - (ii) Raising of credit for class work in the T.D. and B.Ed. examinations in theory and practicals to 30 and 33\frac{1}{3} percent respectively.
- (d) Faculty of Commerce on the recommendation of the relevant Boards of Studies recommended
 - (i) Revision of the scheme of papers and the syllabi of some of the papers of the post-graduate Diploma in Banking and laid down that graduates in Arts admitted to this course be required to pass a qualifying test in Book Keeping.
 - (ii) One month's practical training in Co-operative Societies and Banks for students of the undergraduate Diploma in Co-operation and revision of the minimum qualification for admission to the Diploma to passing the First Year in Arts, Science or Commerce of the three year course or Intermediate Arts, Science or Commerce of four year course.

The Faculty also appointed committees to draw up syllabi for two new post-graduate Diplomas viz. Diploma in Co-operation and Diploma in Insurance.

- (e) Faculty of Medicine recommended
 - (i) institution of a post-graduate Diploma in Orthopædic Surgery;

- (ii) recognition of eleven hospitals for post-examination training;
- (iii) Ordinances 489 A to E for Internship.

The Faculty also gave detailed opinion to the Syndicate on the various recommendations of the Undergraduate Medical Education Conference convened by the Ministry of Health, Government of India at New Delhi, from the 19th to the 22nd November, 1955.

- (f) Faculty of Technology and Engineering on the recommendation of the relevant Boards of Studies recommended that
 - (i) the system of considering students, who pass the Diploma in Civil, Mechanical and Electrical Engineering in first class as eligible for admission to the second year of the corresponding degree courses be continued on a permanent basis,
 - (ii) students, who fail in S. E. examination be considered eligible for admission to second year of the corresponding Diploma course in Engineering.
 - (g) Faculty of Fine Arts on the recommendation of the relevant Board of Studies recommended that
 - (i) In the 5 years' B.Arch. degree course candidates, who have passed the Diploma in Architecture upto and including examination held in 1956 or the Intermediate Examination in Architecture of this University with five years' practical experience be exempted from attendance in the 4th year and be permitted to appear at the 4th year examination and after passing the same be admitted to the 5th year of the B.Arch. Course;
 - (ii) the experiment of spreading the preparatory course over two years, which was started from June, 1955 having been found unsatisfactory the preparatory course be done in one year as per the former practice from the session commencing from July, 1957;
 - (iii) the scheme of advanced (post-diploma) course in Dancing be approved;
 - (iv) One seat in the post-graduate Diploma in Museology be reserved for a candidate who has passed B.A. (Fine).

- (h) Faculty of Home Science on the recommendation of the Board of Studies recommended
 - (i) Addition of 'Clothing, Textile and Related Arts' as a subject in the B.Sc. (Home) Science;
- (ii) the revision of the scheme and syllabi of the B.Sc.
 (Home) courses so that in the new scheme the teaching
 of general courses will be spread over the first three
 years of the course for all students and even in the
 fourth year for students who opt for the same. Other
 students will have the option to specialise in one of the
 majors—Child Development, Foods and Nutrition,
 Home Science Education, Home Management and
 Clothing, Textile and Related Arts.

18th March, 1957 The items of business at the meetings of the Boards comprised elections, drawing up of panels of examiners, consideration of reports of examiners, revision of syllabi and reviewing the standard of admissions and passing, schemes of examinations etc. of various courses. During the current year, however, much of the time at the meetings was spent on drafting of the syllabi of the new three year degree courses in Arts, Science and Commerce, Pre-medical course and the new integrated degree courses in Engineering and Technology. Some of the noteworthy recommendations made by certain Boards are included in the recommendations of the Faculties mentioned in the preceding paragraphs.

CHAPTER VI-OTHER BOARDS AND COMMITTEES

General

Besides the authorities mentioned in the foregoing chapters, there are several other Boards and Committees. The work done by some of these bodies during the year is mentioned below:

1. University Board of Sports

Four meetings of the Board of Sports were held during the year. The Inter-University Cricket Tournaments, South Zone and All India Finals were held at Baroda during the year and the Board appointed an Organising Committee under the Chairmanship of Dr. C. S. Patel, Pro-Vice-Chancellor. The Board also approved certain arrangement for running the Boat House. The Board also recommended that those students who have completed two years of compulsory Physical Training either in A. C. C. or N. C. C. in this or in any other University be exempted from A. C. C. parades. On the recommendations of the relevant selection committees the Board approved to send Cricket Team, Volley Ball Team, Tennis Team, Badminton Team and Kho-Kho Teams (men and women) to participate in the Inter-University Tournaments. The Board unanimously resolved that His Highness the Chancellor Shrimant Fatehsinhrao Gaekwad be invited to accept the "Honorary University Colours" as an outstanding cricketeer and for his valuable and generous contribution to the development of the same. The Board also recommended to invite Inter-University Badminton Tournaments at Baroda during the year 1957-58.

2. Publication Board

The Publication Board met once during the year on the 6th July. 1956 and considered thirteen items. The Board considered and recommended for approval of the Syndicate the future programme of publications under the Gaekwad Oriental Series and the publication of the following works by the University: Estimated cost Sr. No. Title

3. Library Committee

The Library Committee met once during the year in the beginning of the academic year. The annual book grant was allocated amongst the different subjects. Vendors for the supply of books during the year 1956-57 to the University Library and the libraries of the institutions were recommended. The Committee recommended the deputation of staff members in various libraries of the Faculties and Institutions to the newly started course of the Diploma in Library Science. The new simplified procedure for the purchase of books for the University Library and the libraries of the institutions was recommended for adoption.

4. University Building Committee

A meeting of the Building Committee was held on the 9th January, 1957. The Committee scrutinised and recommended the works of ordinary and special repairs to be carried out during the year 1957.58 and recommended to take up the following new works:

- (i) A common room for women students of the Faculties of Arts, Science, Education and Psychology, Commerce and the Intermediate College in the campus of these institutions.
- (ii) Stone carving shed in the Faculty of Fine Arts.
- (iii) Boiler House and the Heat Engines Laboratories in the Faculty of Technology and Engineering.
- (iv) New works at the Social Education Organisers' Training

5. Students' Advisory Bureau for Studies in India and Abroad

The Bureau collects and furnishes information regarding the Indian and Foreign Universities and Educational Institutions and advises students on the question of studies in India and Foreign Countries.

The total number of handbooks, calendars, bulletins etc. of the Universities in various countries in the library of the bureau at the end of the year, was 2,124 out of which 224 were added during the year.

In the year 1956-57 the bureau received 45 circulars regarding scholarships, fellowships, other useful information about procedure and conditions of admissions etc. and announcements regarding the various short-term and long-term courses from various foreign and Indian Universities. Besides these, the bureau received cyclostyled literature from the Ministry of Education regarding important courses of studies offered in various Universities in U. K., U. S. A., and other foreign countries. Copies of all these were sent to the Faculties and Institutions concerned for giving guidance to the students desiring to proceed abroad for higher studies. Written replies were sent to 44 queries from students and others desiring to proceed abroad. In addition, information regarding higher studies abroad was supplied to 227 students in the office of the bureau.

6. Standing Committee on Equivalence of Examinations

The Standing Committee on Equivalence of Examinations met twice during the year once on the 20th July, 1956 and another on the 9th March, 1957 and considered in all 22 items referred to it. The following are some of its recommendations which were approved by the Syndicate:

7. Boards of Visitors

The meetings of the Boards of Visitors for the Institutions mentioned below were held during the year. Their reports were submitted to the Syndicate. Some of the important recommendations made by the respective Boards are enumerated below:

(a) For the Faculty of Arts: The Board met on the 7th January, 1957 and recommended that (i) a Women Students' Common Room with attached cycle shed be built in the Baroda College area, (ii) the instituted post of Professor in History be filled from the next academic year, (iii) three part-time posts of lecturers in English be converted into full-time posts and (iv) 20,000 square feet of additional accommodation is necessary

to house the post-graduate departments and that the University Grants Commission be approached for a suitable grant for the additional space.

- (b) For the Faculty of Science: The Board met on the 13th February, 1957 and recommended that (i) three posts of Readers in the departments of Zoology, Botany and Mathematics, one post of Lecturer in Statistics and one post of Senior Lecturer in Bio-chemisty be filled from the next academic year, (ii) an amount of Rs. 3,000 be sanctioned for purchase of cupboards in Herbarium of the Botany Department and Rs. 15,000 be sanctioned for the cold room in the Bio-chemistry Department, (iii) an Animal House be provided for the Bio-chemistry Department and (iv) contingency grants for laboratory and gas, research and Bio-chemistry Department be increased.
- (c) For the Faculty of Education and Psychology: The Board met on the 7th March, 1957 and recommended that the instituted posts of Reader in Psychology and Reader in Education be filled from the next academic year.
- (d) For the Faculty of Commerce: The Board met on the 8th January, 1957 and recommended that (i) the instituted posts of Reader or Senior Lecturer in Commerce, Senior Lecturer in Banking and Senior Lecturer in Accounts be filled from the next academic year, (ii) the subject of Business Administration (Problems of Business Management) be introduced in M.Com. course and as an Optional subject in B.Com. course and (iii) a viva-voce test be introduced at M.Com. examination.
- (e) For the Faculty of Medicine: The Board met on the 29th and the 30th January, 1957 and recommended that (i) the Principal of the Medical College be authorised to fill up all seats remaining vacant in the first M.B.,B.S. from the eligible waiting candidates of the local Universities in the first week of July every year, (ii) the number of servants in the Nurses and Resident Medical Officers quarters be augmented and that the Resident Medical Officers' mess be run departmentally, (iii) a water cooler be installed in the out-patient department for the patients, (iv) the P. B. X. telephone system be installed in the hospital, (v) the Animal House be improved by some structural additions and alterations and installing suitable cooling arrangements, (vi) additional staff of one Lecturer, one Medical Social Worker, one Technician and a Bio-statistician and a clerk-typist, and purchase of a typewriter be sanctioned for the Preventive and Social Medicine Department, (vii) two or three exhaust

fans be installed in the Isolation Ward where tetanus cases are warded and (viii) Living rooms with ordinary amenities be speedily provided on the premises of all Civil Hospitals which have been recognised for post-examination training of students.

- (f) For the Faculty of Technology and Engineering: The Board met on the 11th February, 1957 and recommended that (i) the present grades of Professors, Readers and Lecturers be revised and these be made uniform in the Engineering Colleges in Western Region, (ii) research work in Pre-stressed concrete be taken up and (iii) Government of India be approached for an interest-free loan for staff quarters.
- (g) For the Faculty of Fine Arts: The Board met on the 10th January, 1957 and recommended that (i) the scheme for the degree courses in Textile design be prepared and submitted to the Western Regional Committee, All India Council of Technical Education with all the financial implications, building requirements etc., (ii) the instituted post of Professor in Sculpture be filled, (iii) a post of Junior Lecturer in Bronze Casting and Junior Lecturer in Pottery be created and filled from the next academic year and (iv) a post of an Honorary Professor in Museology be created and the instituted post of a Junior Lecturer in the Department of Museology be filled.
- (h) For the Faculty of Home Science: The Board met on the 12th February, 1957 and recommended that (i) the new courses in Clothing and Textiles be started, (ii) the matching team member from the Faculty to the T. C. M. Experts assigned to this Faculty may not be a teacher of the same specialisation as the expert from the United States and that the Ministry of Education, Government of India be requested to waive this condition, it being emphasised that the Faculty needs services of teachers and not consultants, (iti) the Government of India be approached with a request that more girls with the training in Home Science be sent abroad on scholarships for higher training in Home Science, (iv) vacant posts of two Professors or Readers, one Reader and three Junior Lecturers be filled from the next academic year, (v) an amount of Rs. 84,000 be sanctioned for Library books, a new Home Management House and other equipment including expansion of Chetan Balwadi, and (vi) a provision for an Animal House for the use of Bio-chemistry Department be made.

- (i) For the Faculty of Social Work: The Board met on the 13th February, 1957 and recommended that (i) vacant posts of two Readers in Social Work and one Reader or Senior Lecturer in Social Work be filled, (ii) in order that gradually students' supervision in field work be taken up by trained personnel in agencies, a detailed scheme be drawn by the Dean whereby the trained personnel in the agencies be required to undergo a brief inservice training course in supervision at the Faculty and later be responsible for the supervision of the students placed in that agency and that University be requested to provide for a suitable honorarium to them and (iii) the teachers be encouraged to do research work.
- (j) For the Oriental Institute: The Board met on the 7th January, 1957 and recommended that (i) the grade of the Superintendent, Gaekwad Oriental Series be revised from Rs. 200-15-350 to Rs, 300-15-450, (ii) the grade of Superintendent, Printed Section be revised from Rs. 150-10-200 to Rs. 200-15-350, (iii) Rule Nos. 80 and 81 regarding payment of honorarium to the editors of the Gaekwad Oriental Series be revised and that the rates of honorarium be Rs. 5 per printed page for the original editions and Rs. 3 per page for the second or subsequent editions if the work is not a simple reprint and Re. 1 for simple reprint, (iv) a Central Fund for the purchase of MSS be created in the University and (v) all the MSS be kept in the Oriental Institute after the Institute moves to the new University Library building.
- (k) For the College of Indian Music, Dance and Dramatics: The Board met on the 7th January, 1957 and recommended that (i) the instituted posts of Professor of Music, Reader in Music, Reader in Dancing, Reader in Dramatics, Senior Lecturer in Tabla and Junior Lecturer in Dancing be filled from the next academic year, (ii) equipment worth about Rs. 16,000 be purchased, (iii) the scheme regarding Experimental Theatre Workshop be sanctioned and an amount of Rs. 4,100 be sanctioned for the same, (iv) measures be taken to have more co-ordination between the Faculty of Fine Arts and the College of Indian Music, Dance and Dramatics, (v) fees in the Diploma classes be collected termwise and also an admission fee of Rs. 5 be introduced and (vi) reading of papers by specialists be arranged in different subjects.
- (1) For the Intermediate College: The Board met on the 8th January, 1957 and recommended that (i) in view of the introduction of three years degree courses in the Faculties of Arts, Science and Commerce

from the academic year 1957-58, the Preparatory classes of these Faculties be brought together under one administrative Unit, (ii) some teachers and tutors working in the Preparatory classes be brought under the administrative control of the Principal and (iii) the number of students in each division in all the subjects of instruction in the Preparatory classes be generally 60.

8. Board of Extra Mural Studies

The Board met once during the year on the 9th August. Extra Mural activities carried on during the previous year were reviewed and a programme of extension lectures by university teachers and outside experts, educational tours of students and exhibitions to be organised during the year was drawn up.

9. Wardens' Committee

The Committee met twice during the year on the 4th July, 1956 and the 2nd April, 1957. The Committee recommended that (i) members of the staff be given temporary accommodation in the students' rooms of the Halls of Residence and be charged rent of Rs. 25 per month, (ii) no student be allowed to stay in the Halls during the vacation, (iii) members of the staff who are also bonafide students of the University be given accommodation as students, and (iv) Sayaji Maratha Vasti Graha, Kadva Patidar Boarding and Brahmbhatt Boarding and similar other Boardings be accepted as authorised places of residence for University students.

The Committee also recommended allocation of seats in the halls of residence to different Faculties and Institutions for the academic year 1957-58.

The Committee also considered the question of collection of Hostel Fees and recommended that the Hostel Fees be collected by the Office of the Chief Warden through the Extension Unit of the Bank of Baroda Ltd., Sayajigang Branch.

The Committee also recommended that a University Dispensary with a full-time staff and a few beds be set up in the old University Library building.

10. Supervisory Council for the Halls of Residence

The Council met once during the year on the 18th August, 1956. It considered the medical reports of the students in the Halls of Residence and expressed satisfaction at the low incidence of illness in the Halls.

The Council also viewed the general conditions of Boarding and Lodging in the Halls and expressed satisfaction as to the arrangements.

11. Finance and Establishment Standing Committee

The Committee held ten meetings during the year and considered several items concerning the requests for additional establishment, sanction of grants, purchase of equipments, approval of plans, estimates and tenders for construction works, repairs etc., contracts for sundry articles, apparatus, instruments and laboratory requirements. The recommendations of the committee were placed before the Syndicate on the same day.

The Committee met as a Budget Committee on the 19th April, 1957. It submitted to the Syndicate revised budget estimates for the year 1956-57 and the estimates for the year 1957-58 both for revenue and capital accounts after scrutinising the various proposals received from the Faculties, Institutions and Offices of the University and after discussing the same with the Dean or the Head concerned.

12. Investment Committee

X

The Committee held seven meetings during the year and submitted its recommendations concerning the investment of the University funds on the same day to the Syndicate.

13. Selection Committees

During the year, 41 meetings of the Selection Committees for junior posts were held. They recommended 124 candidates for appointments to various posts. 9 meetings of the Selection Committees appointed under section 48 (2) of the Act were also held during the year. They recommended 11 candidates for appointment to the posts of Readers and/or Professors.

14. Shri Sayaji Sahityamala Publications Committee

The Committee met once during the year on the 3rd July, 1956. It recommended the following for publications:

The Committee also recommended a programme of future publications under Shri Sayaji Sahityamala. Shri Sayaji Balajnanmala and Shri Sayaji Gramvikasmala.

15. Press Supervisory Committee

The Committee held eight meetings during the year. It considered the monthly reports of the Manager and recommended purchase of the papers and stationery etc. It recommended ex-gratia payment to the Press-workers for the year 1955-56. The plans and cubage estimates for the new building were also considered and recommended for approval.

16. Deans' Committee

Three meetings of the Deans of Faculties and the Heads of Institutions were held during the year on the 20th July, 1956, the 12th September, 1956 and the 21st February, 1957. At these meetings various administrative problems were considered and necessary recommendations were made to the Syndicate to amend relevant ordinances and rules. A panel of eminent scholars to be invited as visiting professors during the year was drawn up and constitution of a University Youth Welfare Committee was recommended. A sub-committee was set up to draft a constitution for Faculty Students' Associations.

CHAPTER VII-RESEARCH WORK IN THE UNIVERSITY

I. Some of the research work done by the members of the staff of the University is being published in the Journal of the University. The Journal entered into the fifth year of its publication. Shri C. M. Shukla continued to be its Editor. The following members continued to be on the Advisory Board of the Journal:

Professor N. M. Bhatt, Professor B. J. Sandesara, Professor M. N. Srinivas, Professor S. M. Sethna, Professor S. M. Sen and Dr. B. Subbarao.

2. During the year, Post-graduate and Research work was done in almost all Faculties and institutions under the University. 55 students registered for Ph.D. and 7 students registered for Master's degree during the previous years continued their research. Details about fresh students registered during the year for these degrees are given in the statement below :-

CHAPTER VIII-FACULTY OF ARTS

1. Brief History

The Baroda College is the oldest institution transferred to the University. It was founded in the year 1881. It had two sides, viz. Arts and Science, and was affiliated to the University of Bombay for all subjects of University education and upto the highest degrees in the Faculties of Arts and Science. For nearly half a century, it was the only institution imparting University education in the former Baroda State. The institution was taken over by the University on the 30th April, 1949. Its Arts and Science sides were organised into the Faculty of Arts and the Faculty of Science, from June, 1950.

2. Building

The Faculty is housed in the east wing of the former Baroda College building, the Sociology Block and the Archæology Block. The Faculty library which was housed in the western wing on the first floor of the main building has been shifted to the new building of the University Library from June, 1957. The rooms thus vacated are occupied by the Faculty of Commerce except for one room which is occupied by the Department of Economics of the Faculty.

3. Courses of Studies

There was provision for the following courses during the year:

- (1) Upto Ph.D.: English, Gujarati, Marathi, Sanskrit, Sociology, History, Philosophy and Economics, Politics, (Archæology) and Ancient Indian Culture.
- (2) Upto M.A. only: Persian, Psychology, Statistics, Geography and Mathematics.
- (3) B.A. (Subsidiary Pali, French, Urdu, Education, Hindi and General) only: and Law.
- (4) M.A. (Subordi- Pali and Urdu. nate) only:
- (5) Upto B.A. (Prin-Hindi. cipal) only:

5. Staff

During the year, the staff of the Faculty consisted of 2 Professors, II Readers, I2 Senior Lecturers, 20 Junior Lecturers, 10 Tutors and 10 Class III and 15 Class IV servants and 4 Part-time Teachers. 6. Library and Reading Room

Till June, 1957, the Faculty had a well-equipped library. The Library and Reading Room of the Faculties of Arts and Commerce were placed under a common management and run jointly. They were kept open from 11-00 a.m. to 5-30 p.m. on all working days except Saturdays on which it was kept open upto 3-00 p.m. In addition, the students and the staff made use of the departmental libraries operated by the various Science, Education and Psychology, Commerce and the Intermediate Coltege have been merged with the University Library which started work on faculties).

9. Literary, Cultural and Other Activities

Many members of the staff contributed articles on academic and on popular themes and reviews on important books in outstanding journals, delivered public lectures, gave radio talks and were associated with aca-

demic, literary and cultural activities in and outside Baroda. Many members of the staff were deputed to attend the annual conferences and they read their papers there.

Four members of the staff of the Faculty, Shri D. M. Patel, Dr. (Kumari) S. A. Nachane, Shri B. G. Desai, and Shrimati H. K. Chavan, continued to work as Officers in the N. C. C. organization. Shri V. K. Chavda and Dr. Y. V. Surendranath were deputed for Pre-commission training at Kamti.

The Faculty maintained a Poor Boys' Library which loaned text-books to poor and deserving students. A number of new books were added to this library during the year.

The Faculty students participated in all items of the Inter-University Youth Festival Competitions conducted by the University. Six students of the Faculty were selected for inclusion in the University Contingent sent for the Youth Festival at New-Delhi.

The Faculty won the first prize in the Inter-Faculty drama contest and was awarded the drama trophy for the year.

10. Co-curricular Activities

- (1) Planning Forum: The Faculty of Arts is co-operating with the Faculty of Commerce in running a Planning Forum. The Forum is organizing discussions on the first and the second Five Year Plans.
- (2) Tours: Many associations of the Faculty took the students on short-distance excursions and the departments of History and Politics took parties of students to Mount Abu and other places of historical interest.
- (3) Socials: The Faculty annual dinner was held on the 21st December, 1956. A large number of teachers and students participated in this community function. The Faculty social gathering was held on the 22nd December, 1956 when an interesting variety entertainment programme was given by the students. The Vice-Chancellor presided at the occasion.
- (4) Debates: Under the auspices of the Speaker's Club of the Faculty Students' Representative Council, various debates were held; some of them were trial debates at which speakers were selected to represent the Faculty at Inter-Faculty contests. Extempore speech competitions were also included in the programme. Representatives of the

Faculty participated in all the Inter-Faculty debating contests organised by the University.

The following symposia were arranged during the year:

- (b) Our parties and the forth-coming General Election.

At these symposia, members of the staff and some eminent guests participated.

The Faculty won a prize in the Pro-Vice-Chancellor's Trophy debate.

- (5) Exhibition: Exhibitions were arranged by the departments of Archaeology, Sociology and History on the occasion of the University Week.
- (6) Celebrations: Important national days and events like the Human Rights Day and Tagore Jayanti were observed and lectures were arranged according to the occasion.
- (7) Condolence meetings: The staff and the students of the Faculty held a meeting and expressed their sense of deep sorrow on the sad death of Shri C. S. Patel, Senior Lecturer in Gujarati, who passed away on the 9th January, 1957. Condolence meetings were also held to pay tribute to late Dr. B. R. Ambedkar and Dr. R. D. Ranade.
- (8) Sports: The Faculty Students' Representative Council arranged tournaments in Badminton, Carrom and Tennis and also conducted a literary competition. The University Cricket XI was captained by Shri Parmar of the Sr. B.A. Class who has already made a mark in the University Cricket.

11. Tutorial and Class Work

Four tutorials (tests) per paper are set in a year at regular intervals. They are examined by the teachers themselves and by the Tutors where the numbers are large as in the Preparatory and the former Intermediate class. In the latter case, the teacher concerned examines 10% of the scripts. The tutorial work is discussed by the teachers with individual students in smaller classes and with groups of students in large ones. In some departments, seminars are held for particular problems followed by discussions and explanations, whereas in some other departments special tutorial classes are held for individual discussion of the subject taught and for attending to individual difficulties. CHAPTER IX-FACULTY OF SCIENCE

1. Brief History

The Faculty of Science, though it assumed its present name in 1950, is an institution of long standing. Previously it formed the Science side of the old Baroda College, which was established in the year 1881. It continued to be housed in the main building of the Baroda College till the year 1937 when a new building called 'Sayaji Golden Jubilee Science Institute' was constructed for it.

2. Buildings

The Faculty of Science is accommodated in its main building known as the Sayaji Jubilee Science Institute Building and the Square Block Building near it. There is a separate small room for the Meteorological Observatory. For 1100 students in the three Preparatory Science Classes, the two Intermediate Science classes and the B.Sc. and the M.Sc. classes in seven to eight subjects, there are ten lecture rooms and laboratories for undergraduate, post-graduate and research students in the subjects of Biochemistry, Botany, Chemistry, Geography, Mathematics, Physics, Statistics and Zoology.

3. Courses of studies

There was provision for the following courses during the year:-

- (i) Upto Ph.D. Bio-chemistry, Botany, Chemistry, Physics, Statistics, Zoology
- (ii) Upto M.Sc. only Geography, Mathematics
- (iii) Upto B.Sc. only Geology

The post-graduate course in Geography, the three years degree course and the pre-medical course were started from June, 1957.

5. Staff

6. Library and Reading Room

The average attendance in this Common Room, which has now been well decorated and equipped and which provides snack and indoor games also, is about 400 students per day from the Faculties of Arts, Science and Commerce and Intermediate College.
- (2) The Faculty maintained libraries in the various departments and these have been well used by the students and teachers. The postgraduate students are given the facilities of an open-shelf library and they have been observed to make very good use of the facility. The number of books issued to the students is about nine hundred and to teachers about seven hundred and fifty.
- (3) The amount spent from the University Grants Commission Library Grants this year was Rs. 18,749.

The Twenty-second Session of Indian Mathematical Society was held in the University on the 24th, the 25th and the 26th of December, 1956. The Vice-Chancellor, Shrimati Hansa Mehta, inaugurated the Session Principal N. M. Shah, the Honorary Professor of Mathematics, was the Chairman of the Reception Committee. Shri S. D. Manerikar, as the Local local arrangements.

(2) The Perkin Centenary:

The Centenary of Perkin's discovery of Mauve, the first synthetic dye, was celebrated under the joint auspices of the Faculty of Science and the Faculty of Technology and Engineering, on the 17th September, 1956. depicting the different discoveries of Perkin and the growth of dye industry, was held. Dr. Suresh Sethna spoke on the 'Life and work of

William Perkin'. Prof. R. L. Desai and Dr. R. D. Desai also spoke on the occasion.

(3) Astronomical Observatory:

A number of demonstrations were arranged in the Astronomical Observatory when the visitors were shown the magnified images of planets and stars through our 8" Refractor Telescope.

(4) Exhibition of Medicinal Plants:

A stall exhibiting typical medicinal plants and interesting physiological experiments was set up by the Botany Department during the Flower and Fruit Show in Baroda in February, 1957.

(5) Exhibition during University Week:

During the University Week Celebrations, the various departments of the Faculty arranged an exhibition to popularize Science and showed a number of experiments and various scientific instruments with demonstrations of their working.

(6) Some Activities of Teachers:

- (i) Professor Suresh Sethna delivered two Radio Talks on 'Progress of Science'.
- (ii) Dr. A. R. Chavan delivered an illustrated lecture in Baroda Museum on 'Preservation of Wild Life' during the Wild Life Preservation Week.
- (iii) Dr. J. C. George gave a talk on 'You and Heredity' at Smt. Sarojini Devi Hall and a Series of lectures on 'Human Evolution' to the Sociology students of the Faculty of Arts.
- (iv) Professor N. M. Bhatt was the Chief Guest at the Annual Gathering of the Mathematical Society of V. P. Mahavidyalaya at Vallabh Vidyanagar (Anand) on the 27th February, 1957 when he gave a talk on 'Statistics and Mathematics'. He spoke on Science as a career to the high school students of Baroda at the Career Conference in Baroda on the 24th February, 1957. He also gave the inaugural address at the Annual Conference of Kaira District Secondary Teachers' Association held at Karamsad.
- (v) Dr. V. G. Phatak worked as the Chairman of the Students' Common Room Committee and he was in charge of the University Boating RI4

Club and the Gardens in the campus of the Faculties of Arts, Science and Commerce.

- (vi) Dr. A. R. Chavan worked as the Adviser to the Students' Representative Council of the Faculty. During the Inter-University Cricket Tournaments held in December 1956 at Baroda, he worked as the Secretary of the Tournament.
- (vii) Dr. A. R. Chavan and Shri N. T. Sheth were the teachers in charge of Cricket and Tennis respectively. Shri Atul Mehta and Shri G. V. Pethe worked as Coaches in Cricket and Tennis respectively.
- (viii) Dr. J. C. George worked as the Editor of the Faculty Magazine which was published in April 1957. Dr. J. C. George worked also as the Editor of a Research Journal in Zoology: Journal of Animal Morphology and Physiology.

(7) Meteorological Observatory:

The Meteorological Observatory continued to do its useful work and it was classed by the Government of India as Excellent.

(8) Micro-Analytical Laboratory:

The Micro-Analytical Laboratory in the Department of Chemistry has now a Micro-Analyst appointed in the grade of Rs. 200-350/- and the laboratory is now able to take up outside work. During the year, about 100 samples were analysed.

10. Co-curricular Activities

(I) Societies:

The various Societies e.g. Bio-chemical, Botanical, Chemical, Geo-graphical, Geological, Mathematical, Physical, Statistical and Zoological were active throughout the year and arranged a number of lectures, reading of papers, discussions etc. on a variety of topics. They also organized small tours in which students and teachers took part and they celebrated their annual functions with entertainments and social and cultural programmes. The teachers and the students of the Faculty delivered a good number of lectures before the Societies in the Faculty, some interesting topics being Viruses and Plant Diseases, Protein Synthesis, Radiation Health Hazards, Transfinite Numbers, International Geophysical year, Theory of Sets of Points, Colour Changes in Crustacea, Iodine Cycle in the Living Body etc. Some of the important lectures by distinguished visitors to these societies were:

- (ii) The Chemistry students, under the guidance of Shri N. G. Savant went on an educational tour to Jamshedpur, Calcutta, Dhanbad, Bombay and other places and visited various factories and places of cultural and scientific interest.
- (iii) The Physics students, under the guidance of Dr. N. S. Pandya, went on a study tour to Bombay.
- (iv) The members of the staff and students of the Department of Zoology had a very successful study and collection tour to Bombay.
- (v) Geography tours led by Shri C. M. Gupta were made to (i) Bombay, Matheran, Lonavala and Poona and (ii) Cutch & Saurashtra.
- (vi) The students of the Geology Department went on tour to Rajasthan, Dehradoon, Sankheda etc. to study Geology of those regions.

(4) Films:

(5) Students' activities in sports and contests:

- (i) Shri N. M. G. Bhakthan secured the general championship in athletic sports.
- (ii) Shri V. S. Munshi and Shri Jaykant Patel secured places in the University Cricket Eleven and played in Inter-University Cricket Tournaments held at Baroda.
- (iii) Shri Ramesh Bhatt was runners-up at the University Tennis Tournament.
- (iv) Shri C. D. Patel the Captain, Shri J. S. Patel and Shri Bhakthan distinguished themselves in various Volley-Ball Tournaments and secured championship for the Science Faculty and the University teams in the Inter-Faculty and other Tournaments.

- (v) Shri A. G. Tambe captained the University Kho-Kho team in which six other students of the Faculty found places. This team of the veterans was unluckily beaten in the finals by the Poona University Team in the Inter-University Competition. The Science Faculty team won the championship in Inter-Faculty Tournament.
- (vi) In the Inter-Faculty Badminton Tournaments, the Science Faculty team was the Runners-up.
- (vii) Kumari Meenaxi Captain won the first prize in the Boat Race for Girls.
- (viii) Shri M. S. Didmishe won the triple crown in the University Carrom Tournaments.
- (ix) The students of the Faculty took part in the competitions of drama, garba, group-dance, group-singing and debates. They secured a third prize in the drama contest.
- (x) A good number of the students of the Faculty were selected for the National Youth Festival at which Kumari Rajni Nene secured second prize in instrumental music and Kumari Rekha Gandhi and Kumari Hema Gandhi were in the group dance which was highly appreciated.
- (xi) Three students of the Faculty were elected to the University Union, Shri Bipin Patel as General Secretary, Shri Ramesh Shah as Debating Secretary and Shri Jaykant Patel as Indoor Games Secretary. They discharged their duties very satisfactorily.

(6) Social Service:

In the Village Apprenticeship Scheme, eight students of the Faculty were selected and completed Training and Service as Apprentices.

(7) N. C. C.:

The boys and girls of the Faculty continued to take keen interest in N. C. C. and joined in large numbers, Kumari Manik Bapat secured the first prize in shooting at the N. C. C. Meet. Shri Lilu Tahiliani of the Faculty was selected for the National Defence Academy at Khadak Wasla for training as a Commissioned Officer. The past students of the Faculty-Shri N. B. Dixit, Shri Keyur Mehta, Shri A. K. Pathak and Shri Kanti Taylor are now already Commissioned Officers while Shri O. A. Pereira of the Faculty is undergoing training at Dehradoon for the purpose. The

Faculty teachers Shri N. P. Salvi, Shri N. T. Sheth and Shri N. M. Patel continued to serve as Officers in N. C. C.

(8) Faculty-Day Celebrations:

The Faculty Day was celebrated on the 11th February, 1957 when the Vice-Chancellor, Shrimati Hansa Mehta, presided and distributed the prizes. An entertainment programme of group singing, dance, garba, group-dance etc. was arranged for the occasion.

11. Tutorial and Class Work

The system of reserving 20% of marks in theory and 25% marks in practicals from the aggregate marks for the final University tests and assigning them on the basis of tutorial and other examinations spread over the year was successfully continued. Regular tutorial examinations were held and records of marks were properly maintained and regularly submitted to the University. The attendance at the tutorials was quite good and the whole system is working extremely satisfactory, producing good results in the form of regular reading, seriousness in study etc.

12. Other Important Events

(I) University Grants Commission Visits and Grants:

A Committee of Dr. Patankar, Dr. Mahabale and Dr. Arora visited the Faculty to study our development proposals. Shri C. D. Deshmukh, Chairman of the University Grants Commission also visited the Faculty during the year when he discussed some of the needs and difficulties in purchase of equipment etc. with the teachers. During the year, the University Grants Commission approved the following expenditure towards the development of the Faculty in the Second Five Year Plan period. The expenditure is to be shared by the University Grants Commission and the Government of Bombay in proportion of 2 to 1.

 Scholarship Scheme by the Ministry of Education, Government of India,
 bringing the total number of such scholarships in the Faculty to nine.
- (ii) The Government of Bombay granted several backward Class Scholarships, Open Merit Scholarships and Open Merit Free-studentships to the students of the Faculty.
- . (iii) Shri K. V. Vasavada of Jr. B.Sc. class secured the Open Merit Scholarship of the Government of India, of Rs. 75 per month.

(3) Ph.D. Thesis:

Shah was awarded by the University the Ph.D. degree in Zoology on his thesis—'Certain Aspects of the Anatomy and Physiology of Reptiles with special reference to the Chelonia,' (ii) The thesis of Kumari Dolly Jyoti of Zoology Department on 'A study on the Structure and Metabolism of the Bird and Bat Flight Muscle', was also accepted for Ph.D. degree in Zoology. (iii) The thesis of Shri J. J. Shah on 'The Developmental and Anatomical Studies in Vitaceal' with special reference to Axillary Buds and Tendrils was accepted for the award of Ph.D. degree in Botany.

CHAPTER X-(A) FACULTY OF EDUCATION AND PSYCHOLOGY

1. Brief History

This institution was started by former Baroda Government in 1935 as a Secondary Teacher's Training College in the western wing of the Baroda College building. For two years it provided a course leading to Diploma in Education. In 1938 it was affiliated to the University of Bombay for B.T. degree and provided with an independent building and an attached practising high school. The University took it over in 1949 and started M.Ed. course. Following year it was re-organised into a Faculty of Education and Psychology.

2. Building

There were no additions made to the building of the Faculty during the year and the need for additional accommodation was becoming more acute. The University Grants Commission, after enquiry, sanctioned a grant of Rs. 1.15 lakhs for the construction of a wing to the Faculty building to house the Department of Psychology, the condition being that the Government of Bombay should meet 33\frac{1}{3}\% of this expenditure. The construction of this wing is expected to be completed by the end of June, 1958. The new construction will solve, for the present, the problem of accommodation of the Faculty.

3. Courses of Studies

The Faculty provided the following courses:

 - (4) Social Psychology to the students who have taken Sociology for the M.A. degree, and
 - (5) Psychology courses to the students who have taken Philosophy for the M.A. degree.

Faculty of Fine Arts:

- (I) General Psychology to the students of the B.A. (Fine Arts) and M.A. (Fine Arts) degree courses.
- (2) Education courses to the students who do the M.A. degree in Art Education, and
- (3) Psychology courses to the students who do the M.A. degree in Art Education.

Faculty of Home Science:

- (I) General Psychology to the students of the second year of the B.Sc. (Home) Class,
- (2) Education courses in the third year of the B.Sc. (Home) Class to the students who have taken Home Science Education as their major subject.

Intermediate College:

5. Staff

During the year, the staff of the Faculty consisted of 2 Professors, 2 Readers, 6 Senior Lecturers, 7 Junior Lecturers, 1 Tutor and 6 Class III and 7 Class IV servants. In addition to the above, there was a Reader working as Co-ordinator and a Senior Lecturer as Assistant Co-ordinator in the Extension Services, financed by the All India Council for Secondary Education. There were also seven Research Assistants working on three Research Projects.

6. Library and Reading Room

The Faculty library contains over 12,000 volumes and affords facilities for research in all branches of Education and Psychology. There are also a large number of books of general interest. The library is kept upto-date by regular additions of fresh publications in the subjects mentioned above. The library also subscribes to about sixty periodicals.

The library followed the open-shelf system and therefore students had the facility and freedom to choose and read any book during working hours. A certain amount of library reading was obligatory for all students. Students were helped to do this by the prescription of topics and references; sometimes, hours for library study were also provided in the timetables. The library and the reading room were kept open from 10-30 a.m. to 6-30 p.m. on all working days and from 8-00 a.m. to 1-00 p.m. on Sundays. Towards the end of the year, the Faculty Library was merged with the University Library which is located next door. In this process, care was taken to retain in the Faculty small collection of important books in each subject for departmental libraries. The Reading Room was also retained and it provided facilities for general reading when students had free periods.

7. Museum and Laboratories

Museum:

(1) The Faculty Museum contains a large collection of teaching aids, which are used in the teaching of different subjects. To this, some addition is made every year. During the year 1956-57 there was an addition of more than 100 articles which were prepared by students under the guidance of the members of the staff. Every student under training prepares a set of illustrative aids to teach a topic or a series of topics under the project scheme of the Faculty.

- (2) Audio-Visual Aids: The Faculty fitted an Audio-Visual Room with a movie projector, an epidiascope, a gramophone, and other audio-visual aids for the teaching of Audio-Visual instruction which has been introduced as an optional subject for specialisation at the B.Ed. level. During the year, material worth Rs. 1,593.80 was added to the equipment of the Audio-Visual Room. There were regular film shows as below:
 - (i) One show every week under General Education Scheme of the University.
 - (ii) One show every day during the Audio-Visual Expansion Week organised in December, 1956.
 - (iii) Six film shows were arranged for the benefit for the Audio-Visual Education Group of the B.Ed. Class.

The Audio Visual Group prepared a series of film strips entitled, 'From Flower to Fruit'.

(3) Psychological Laboratory: The Psychological Laboratory of the Faculty is considered to be one of the best laboratories in the country. It is equipped with a rich collection of precision instruments required for psychological experiments. During the year, new additions were made to the apparatus under the Wheat Loan Fund. There is a separate section dealing with mental tests and this includes most of the modern material required for testing intelligence, aptitude, attitude, achievements and personality. An annexe to the Psychological Laboratory has been fitted up in one of the cellars for the Research Assistants employed under Indian council of Medical Research Scheme. The problem of space is being solved by a munificent grant by the University Grants Commission for a new wing of the building which is under construction.

The programme of work of the Department was extended to and was appreciated by the schools in the Districts of Gujarat, to which it caters.

During the year, the Department conducted the following activities:

- (a) Courses:
 - (i) The Refresher course for T. D. and S. T. C. Teachers
 - (ii) The Week-end Course in the Method of Teaching Hindi
 - (iii) The Refresher Course in English.

(b) Conference:

The Working Conference of Headmasters at Godhra.

- (c) Workshops:
 - (i) The Workshop on Guidance; (ii) The Workshop on Social Studies; (iii) The Rajpipla Workshop on Educational Evaluation and Construction of Objective Tests.
- (d) Audio-Visual Education Expansion Week:

The Department published seven brochures on topics useful to Secondary Schools, the list of which has been given above in sub-section 8 (B). More than forty schools were invited for theoretical discussions and demonstration of teaching practice. Seven educational exhibitions were organised at Baroda and outside. One of these on the most elaborate scale was held in Shree Pratap High School, Baroda, under the joint auspices of the Extension Departments at Baroda, Bombay and Ahmedabad, on the occasion of the meeting of the All India Council for Secondary Education held here in December, 1956. Films received from the Five Year Plan Publicity Office, the Health Department of the Bombay State and from the Faculty on educational and informative topics were shown to pupils in and outside Baroda. Over and above this, a number of meetings were arranged either in the Faculty or in individual schools where specific problems of syllabus and organisation are discussed. The Department also possesses a library of about eighteen hundred most recent books on education, Teachers from Baroda and outside are using this library on an extensive scale.

(2) Rural Education Project-Ranoli:

The Government of India sanctioned a project of Rural Education under the Second Five Year Plan on Educational Development and sanctioned a recurring grant of Rs. 3,693 subject to 50% contributions being made jointly by the State Government and the University for a period of nine months from July, 1956.

The Programme of work which was conducted by Shri G. P. Bhatt was as follows:

- (a) A batch of ten teacher students with a member of the staff went to Ranoli thrice a week. They engaged themselves in—
 - (i) teaching under supervision in the two primary and one secondary schools to improve teaching methods;

- (ii) making a socio-educational survey of the village;
- (iii) arranging a night-class for illiterate adults;
- (iv) arranging occasional filmshows and entertainment programmes;
- (v) arranging for gardening in the school and office compounds;
- (vi) arranging excursions for children to the places of educational importance.
- (b) Medical Examination of school-children by the medical unit of the Project and the follow-up health service programme.
- (c) Holding meetings of the village people and discussing problems pertaining to education of their children.
- (d) Managing the Project-library and the Village-library.
- (e) Holding Conferences and Seminars for the Ranoli-School teachers and secondary teachers.
- (f) Trying to enlist the co-operation of the village community to convert the present incomplete secondary school into a multi-purpose high school with an agricultural bias.

(3) All-India Workshop on Examination:

The All-India Council for Secondary Education organised in the Faculty a Workshop on Education and Evaluation and Testing Procedures for lectures of Training Colleges in India from the 15th March to the 25th March, 1957 with Professor T. K. N. Menon as its Director. The Workshop which was inaugurated by Shrimati Hansa Mehta, the Vice-Chancellor, was conducted by Dr. Benjamin Bloom, Head of the Examination Research Department of the University of Chicago and an outstanding expert on reformed methods of examination. It was attended by seventy lecturers of training Colleges drawn from all over India and other experts of the T. C. M. The Workshop worked out a functional programme of examination reform which could be implemented by teachers. Shri K. G. Saiyidain, Secretary to the Government of India, Ministry of Education, who addressed the Workshop said in his address that the Ministry of Education attached the greatest importance to the conclusions of this workshop. Dr. Bloom's visit to Baroda was also utilised to discuss with him for the examination reform programme of the University. RI6

(4) Seminar-cum-Training Courses for Teachers of Multi-purpose Schools:

Seminar-cum-Training Courses for technical and agricultural teachers of Bombay State were conducted for a period of 5 weeks in June-July, 1957, by the Faculty on behalf of the All India Council for Secondary Education. Baroda and Anand were chosen by the Council as two centres of the training courses as they have highly developed and well-equipped institutions teaching technical and agricultural subjects and have also the appropriate secondary schools where the trainees can do their practice teaching. The Faculty provided the teaching personnel for pedagogical part of the course at both the centres. Professor T. K. N. Menon and Dr. M. D. Patel of the Anand Agricultural Institute were the Directors at Baroda and Anand respectively. The Seminar-cum-Training course is the first attempt in the country to provide professional training to teachers of practical subjects in the multi-purpose schools that have been started in the country under the First and the Second Five Year Plans. Based on the results of this successful pilot project, an Expert Committee of the All India Council for Secondary Education met and drew up short and long term programmes of training of teachers of multi-purpose schools who teach practical subjects like Engineering, Agriculture, Home Science, Fine Arts and Commerce.

10. Co-curricular Activities

(I) Faculty Club:

- (a) The Faculty Club organised periodical lectures and discussions on educational topics by educationists and elocution competitions;
- (b) Tournaments and competitions in games like Volley Ball. Ping-Pong, Badminton and Athletics;
- (c) Celebrations of Gandhi Jayanti, Tagore Jayanti and other days of National importance;
- (d) Excursions of students to Delhi, Agra and other places;
- (e) Variety entertainment programme and Social evenings.

The students of the Faculty also participated in the Inter-Faculty debates and took part in Drama, Garba, Group Songs and other competitions arranged by the University Union during the University Week and won the trophies for Garba, Group Song, Group Dance and Drama and University Song competition and Sanskrit recitation.

(2) Psychological Society:

The Psychological Society organised by the members of the staff and the students of the Department of Psychology carried out on every Saturday during the week a useful programme of reading of papers, lectures and discussions of problems of psychology which have a bearing on present day life. The Society also arranged programmes of entertainment and excursions.

(3) The Old Students' Association:

The activities of the Old Students' Association of the Faculty during the year consisted of the lending books to deserving and needy students, the arranging of an At Home to the new graduates at the time of the Convocation and running of a Sunday Club for the local old students. The association also arranged for the communication of the results of T.D., B.Ed., and M.Ed. examinations to the candidates.

(4) The Science Teachers' Club:

This club, organised by the Faculty, and with a membership consisting of the science teachers of the high schools of the city and the science-student teachers of the Faculty, had the following activities

during the years:

- (a) Discussion of the weightage that should be given to the different branches of science in the General Science course of the S. S. C. Examination and making representations on the subject to the Board. The Board accepted the Science Teachers' Club advice;
- (b) Construction of model objective type of tests in General Science;
- (c) Arranging of talks and discussions including one on the findings of the Science Seminar organised by the All-India Council for Secondary Education; and
- (d) Arranging of excursions of Scientific interest.

11. Tutorials and Class-Work

(I) Tutorials:

The successful working of the tutorial system since it was introduced in the Faculty a few years ago has proved its efficacy and convinced even its worst opponents that it has an important role to play in our educational system. It is gratifying to note that the tutorial system started by the Baroda University is gaining popularity with other Universities in the country and its usefulness as an instrument of mitigating the evils of our examination system has been recognised on all hands.

Besides establishing personal contact between the teacher and taught, the tutorial system in the Faculty has been successful in creating indissoluble bond of affection between them. The artificial barriers between the two have been cut across and it is no small achievement that the student sees his teacher whenever the latter is free and discusses all students' problems with him.

During the year, the system was improved upon, in the light of the previous experience. A new record card was introduced which provides for recording the details of students' achievements in studies, his co-curricular and other activities and also his interests and attitudes. The card also provides for recording the candidates' scores in tests for general intelligence, social intelligence and personality. While assessing the performance of candidates in class work, due consideration is given to (i) Library reading, (ii) Participation in academic and general discussions during tutorial periods (iii) Performance in periodical essays,

(iv) Results of tests, (v) Results of the Terminal examination, and (vi) general behaviour and participation in social functions. To get over the subjective factor in evaluating by different tutors and to get an over-all estimate of the student rather than the arithmetic total of his scores in different subjects, the Faculty introduced during the year a comprehensive interview of the students to moderate his class-record and finalise it. This interview is held by a panel of teachers with all the records of the student before them.

(2) Practice Teaching and Field Work:

The programme of practice teaching commenced with demonstration lessons given by the members of the staff. These lessons were meant for acquainting the student-teachers with the different methods of teaching. Criticism lessons given by the student-teachers were spread out throughout the year. Practice-teaching by the candidates was first started in the local schools of Baroda. The off-campus programme of teaching of field work were arranged for a fortnight during the month of October in the schools at Avidha, Bardoli, Jhagadia, Kosamba, Pardi, Vapi, Vaso, Halol and Ranoli. Besides giving lessons, the candidates participated in the activities of the school, collected educational data, observed lessons given by the trained teachers of the school and offered cultural programmes to the school and to the community. The off-campus programme also included practice-teaching in primary classes, whereby the candidates were oriented in the problems of teaching in primary classes.

(B)-UNIVERSITY EXPERIMENTAL SCHOOL

1. Building

The Experimental School is an integral part of the Faculty of Education and Psychology and serves the purpose of its laboratory for trying out experiments in educational practice and theory, planned by the Faculty staff, trainees and teachers of the school.

The school continued to be housed in the ground floor of the building of the Faculty of Education and Psychology. Due to its growing activities day by day, the school experiences an acute shortage of a good girls' room, a demonstration room for laboratory and an Open Air Assembly Hall to be used as Activity Hall, Prayer Hall and Music Hall. To its credit, the school is equipped with an excellent Open Air Theatre, a kitchen and enough open space for sports. With the co-operation of the Botanical gardens, the school maintains good kitchen garden.

2. Courses of Studies

The school has two sections viz. Primary for class I to IV and Secondary from class V to VII. In the Primary section, the school continues to follow the same prescribed well-planned activity programme of instruction. All possible efforts are made to maintain co-ordination between the activity programme and the State Education Department syllabus. In the Secondary Section, the courses of study prescribed by the State Education Department duly supplemented by activities are followed. Wherever possible, the courses of study in General Science, Social Studies and Mathematics and Languages are distributed in the form of projects. Attempt is made to co-ordinate the study of Art particularly with the study of Social Studies and General Science. A group of children allotted to Art-study devote a good deal of time for bringing out excellent pictures relating to their study-subject. The school continues to maintain its good tradition of supplementing the prescribed syllabus by several cocurricular activities and hobbies. The school prepares children for the S. S. C. examination of the Bombay State. Besides the normal eight subjects for the S. S. C. examination, provision is also made for the teaching of several optional subjects like Art, Needlework and Embroidery, Music, Civics and Hindi. Gardening beds are maintained by the children

as part of their hobby and help them in the study of General Science. Visits to farms serve a similar purpose.

3. Number of students

The total number of pupils at the end of the year was: 209 Boys and 155 Girls: total 364.

4. Staff

The staff of the school consisted of the Principal, 16 teachers, I Art Master, I P. T. Instructor, I Craft Teacher, I Music Teacher, I Library Teacher and 3 Class III and 6 Class IV servants.

5. Library and Reading Room

The School has an excellent and well equipped library with adequate study facilities. It is in charge of a specially trained Library teacher. The Library has about 7,000 books in stock. No substantial addition was made during the year as there was enough addition of the valuable publications in the previous year from the Ancillary grant. The school subscribes to about 20 children's magazines and maintains a good reading material for teachers by borrowing teacher's journals from the Faculty of Education and Psychology and its Extension department. A good deal of attention is being paid in the school to inculcate among school children a reading habit with the help of class libraries and providing incentive through discussions, assignments, projects, study circles etc. Students are encouraged to use books for information and recreation. They have made valuable files of news-paper cuttings on various subjects which substantially add to their reading material. Children prepare reviews of periodicals and present them periodically before the school assembly.

6. Other Activities by the members of the staff

On every Saturday discussions were held on day-to-day problems of teaching as usual and papers were also read on educational topics. The following persons attended the different Seminars and Workshops during the year:

2. Examination and Promotions:

The school has made a great change in the system of examination. To judge the whole child through its performances in four area of activities; viz. (I) Curricular Studies, (2) Physical (including games), (3) Artistic and Cultural (Arts, Crafts, Hobbies etc. and (4) Social, and ability to participate and profit by the programmes and activities of the next class, are taken as the basis of promotion in school. To minimise the evils of examination, due emphasis is given to the day-to-day work which includes Homework, Composition and Class work. The results of the periodical tests in all the subjects are also taken into consideration for the annual promotions.

3. Cumulative Records:

The school continues to maintain cumulative records of all children.

They have been very useful in the study of the progress of the children.

9. Co-curricular Activities

- I. Health Service: The school has a regular programme of health service. The medical inspection is carried out every year.
- 2. Visits: Regular visits to fields, factories are arranged to stimulate the project work of the children. Teachers of a few schools visited this school and demonstration lessons in Social Studies were also arranged for the visitors.
- 3. Publications: Our bulletins on 'Examinations, Tests and Assignments' have been found very useful to schools.
- 4. Camps: This is a regular feature of the school. During the year, the school organised a camp at Premnagar and also a camp at Ranoli for the A. C. C. Cadets. The Cadets also participated at the Ugat Camp organised by the Government.
- 5. Cultural Programmes and Celebrations: During the year, the school arranged celebrations during the University Week, Krishna Jayanti and School-day. The children participated in the Radio programmes. Regular film-shows were arranged for the children. The children also participated in a special programme arranged during the meeting of the Secondary Education Council in Baroda.
- 6. Excursions: Small class trips to Sevalia, Timba and Kakrapara were arranged. Picnic to Mahisagar was also arranged for primary classes.

10. Other noteworthy events

- The children of the School participated in the Children's Drawing competition organised by Shanker's Weekly, New Delhi.
- 2 They also participated in the Madhyastha Kridamandal and the National Sports.
- 3 The school participated in the University Week Competitions and got prizes.
- 4 The children appeared for Drawing, Hindi, Sanskrit and Shisthavachan Examinations conducted by the various bodies.

CHAPTER XI-FACULTY OF COMMERCE

. . .

1. Brief History

The institution was started in 1942 as an affiliated College to the University of Bombay. It was taken over by the University in 1949. In the year following, First year and Intermediate Commerce classes were transferred to the newly created Intermediate College and the College was reorganised into the Faculty of Commerce with B.Com. and M.Com. classes. For convenience and co-ordination of teaching, it was shifted to the premises of the Faculty of Arts.

2. Building

The Faculty of Commerce occupies the western wing of the Baroda College building. It has three Lecture Halls for the use of the compulsory classes and four small halls for the use of classes in the optional subjects. These small halls are also used by other faculties. Out of the two halls newly erected, one hall is used by the Preparatory Commerce Class.

3. Courses of Studies

The Faculty prepares students for the B.Com. and M.Com. degree examinations and for the post-graduate Diploma in Banking and undergraduate Diploma in Co-operation examinations. The three year degree course was introduced in the Faculty from June, 1957.

During the year, the teaching staff of the Faculty consisted of I Professor, 4 Readers, I Senior Lecturer, 4 Junior Lecturers, 2 Tutors and 3 Part-time Teachers, 3 Class III and 6 Class IV servants. Teaching work of the subject of English is done by 2 Senior Lecturers and one Junior Lecturer in English of the Faculty of Arts, and work in Statistics is done by a Reader of the Statistics Department of the Faculty of Science.

Close co-ordination has been established between the teaching staff of the Economics departments of the Faculty of Arts and the Faculty of Commerce. Two teachers in the Economics department of the Faculty of Arts took classes in the Faculty of Commerce and four teachers of the Faculty of Commerce taught classes in the Faculty of Arts. Teaching work of the Intermediate, B.A., B.Com., M.A., and M.Com. classes is shared by the two Faculties. In addition, four members of the Faculty of Commerce have teaching work in the Faculty of Technology and Engineering.

Shri R. S. Bhatt, Managing Director, Bombay State Financial Corporation, Bombay, delivered five lectures to the students of the post-graduate Diploma in Banking on 'Problems of Bank investments and Industrial Finance'.

Shri V. C. Patel, Chief Accountant, Central Bank of India, Bombay, gave some lectures to the students of the post-graduate Diploma in Banking on various aspects of Banking Practice.

CHAPTER XII-FACULTY OF MEDICINE

(A) MEDICAL COLLEGE

1. Brief History

The scheme of starting a Medical College at Baroda was sanctioned by the former Baroda Government in the year 1946. A sum of Rs. 40 lakhs was set apart for its building and equipment. The College started working from June, 1949. Though it is a constituent college of the University its financial and administrative control continues with the Government of Bombay.

2. Building

The College is housed in a building situated in the compound of the Shree Sayaji General Hospital. No additions and alterations to the main College building were made during the year.

3. Courses of Studies

The College conducts courses leading to the degree of M.B.,B.S. as well as post-graduate courses in M.D., M.S., D.A., D.L. & O., and M.Sc. The post-graduate teachers in clinical and non-clinical subjects have been recognised since the 15th June, 1954. The first examinations for M.D. (O. & G.), M.D. (Path.), and M.Sc. (Phy.) were conducted in October, 1956 and one M.D. (O. & G.) candidate was declared successful.

- (3) Shri B. B. Bhatt, Research Fellow, resigned from the 4th June, 1956.

3. Library

• The total number of books in the Library during the year was 2087 as against 2076 in the last year. 9 Journals were also subscribed during the year.

4. Museum

During the year, 20 more specimens of fresh medicinal herbs were added to the old 50 specimens making the total number of 70 jars of the fresh medicinal herbs. The new 20 specimens preserved in jars are as below:

- (2) Literary Work: A note on symposium discussions on आमवात and संधिवात has already been published in Gujarati in भिष्मारती of Surat in its April number. Marathi and Hindi versions of the same have been sent for publication in the आयुर्विया of Poona and in the सचित्र आयुर्वेद of Calcutta respectively. Another symposium on ब्रह्णीगंग was held and completed in three sessions. A full note of the discussions is being prepared in three languages viz. Gujarati, Marathi and Hindi for publication in the above mentioned magazines. A third series of symposia on राज्यक्सा has been started.
- (3) The Assistant has been trained in research methods and screening procedures in Pharmacology. He has started work on ajuja bracteosa—an indigenous drug named Nilkanthi for routine Pharmacological Screening. Aqueous, Alcoholic, Petroleum Ether and Chloroform extracts of this plant have been prepared and tested and the aqueous extract has proved suitable for work. The following are the observations made with the aqueous extract:
 - (a) Acute Toxicity Studies: Mice of fairly uniform weight were used. The doses of Nilkanthi ranging from 600 to 2400 mg/kg. were administered by the oral route. The animals were watched for 24 hours after the administration of the drug. No acute toxicity was seen after the extract.
 - (b) Pharmacological actions of the extract on the various organ system are as under:—
 - (i) Effect of Nilkanthi on Skeletal Muscle: The frog's Rectus abdominis was used as the test preparation.

Nilkanthi in a concentration of I/I00 stimulates the skeletal muscle which goes into a contracture. This action is not potentiated by physostigaine nor abolished by d-Tubocurarine or quinine in doses which abolish the stimulant action of Acetyl Choline on skeletal muscle. These observations were adequately confirmed by subsequently repeating the experiment. The graphic records are preserved.

(ii) Action on Smooth Muscle: Isolated pieces of Rat, Rabbit and Guinea Pig intestine were used for testing the aqueous extract for any possible action on smooth muscle. A variable action on intestinal smooth muscle is seen. In some experiment the action was biphasic both stimulation and depression being present. In others it was a purely stimulant action. The stimulant action is antagonised by adrenaline in all cases. Further work is being done which may lead to a finer analysis of this biphasic response.

Systemic action: Administration by intravenous route produces a moderate fall of blood pressure which tends to diminish on repeated administration. Respiration is not much affected.

Investigation that Nilkanthi has some value in the treatment of liver diseases is now being undertaken. Extract of the following indigenous drugs whose pharmacological screening is planned to be undertaken during the coming year are being prepared:

(1) Lajjalu, (2) Mameja, (3) Galu.

On the clinical pharmacological side Punarnava and indigenous drugs of a more or less established diuretic action was given a short clinical trial.

8 patients of cardiac, renal, dietary and any other form of general oedema were admitted to the Ayurvedic Research Ward. Apart from other supportive treatment given by the physicians in charge two drachms of Punarnava extract was administered twice daily. The amount of urine passed by the patient during 24 hours, and its specific gravity, reduction in the weight and abdominal growth of the Patients were taken as indices of the diuretic effect. The studies show that Punarnava has a weak and variable but definite diuretic action.

5. Research

During the year, 47 new students have been examined for determination of Prakruti and the data of this examination has also been recorded.

6. Visits During the year, Shri M. S. Kannamwar, the Health Minister, Bombay State, visited the Unit on the 31st March, 1957. He evinced great interest

in the activities of the Unit. The Head and the Senior Research Vaidya visited the Central Institute for Research in Indigenous Systems of Medicine, Jamnagar, on the 7th, the 8th and the 9th March, 1957.

CHAPTER XIII—FACULTY OF TECHNOLOGY AND ENGINEERING

1. Brief History

The present Faculty of Technology and Engineering is a development of a very old institution popularly known as the Kalabhavan, which was founded in the year 1890. Till the year 1948, it continued to have diploma and certificate courses. The institution was transferred to the University on the 30th April, 1949. Before that the former Baroda Government had passed orders to start an Engineering College in the institution providing courses leading to the degrees of B. E. Civil, Mechanical and Electrical and had provided necessary funds for additional buildings and equipment. The University blended then two institutions into the Faculty of Technology and Engineering.

2. Buildings

The buildings of the Faculty comprise the following:

- (1) Main building accommodating 9 laboratories, 9 drawing halls, 26 class-rooms, 27 staff rooms, students' common room, canteen, auditorium, library and reading room and Dean's office;
- (2) The Hydraulics and Metallurgical laboratories;
- (3) The Gas room;
- (4) The Workshop and Textile Technology and Textile Chemistry premises accommodating:
 - (a) The workshop comprising the carpentry shop, fitting shop, lathe shop and machine shop, smithy, foundry, welding shops and the furniture making shop and the workshop office and stores;
 - (b) Heat engines laboratory;
 - (c) Chemistry and Textile Chemistry department laboratories;
 - (d) Textile Technology department, preparatory weaving and spinning machinery sections and textile testing laboratory;
 - (e) TAIRO Office.

CHAPTER XIV-FACULTY OF FINE ARTS

1. Brief History

The Faculty of Fine Arts is one of the three new Faculties, when the University had to build the whole structure from the very foundations. Early in May, 1949 an Organiser was appointed to do the preliminary arrangements. He was deputed to visit some centres of Fine Arts at Delhi, Nagpur, Banaras, Patna, Shantiniketan and Calcutta. By May, 1950, the syllabi and the schemes of examinations for the degree and the diploma courses were approved, necessary books, furniture and equipment were purchased and some staff was also appointed. The Faculty started working from the 3rd July, 1950.

2. Building

The two storeyed new block accommodates (1) Dean's Office, (2) Photography Section, (3) Lithography Section, (4) Printing Section, (5) Wood-carving Section on the ground floor and (6) Staff Room, (7) Individual rooms for Professors and Readers, (8) Class Rooms for Post-graduate and Post-diploma students in Painting, Sculpture, Applied Arts, Art Education and Art Criticism and (9) Reading Room and Library on the first floor.

The old buildings accommodate (1) Administrative Office, (2) Lecture Rooms, (3) Art History Department, (4) Store and Record Room and (5) Applied Arts Studio, (6) Painting Studio, (7) Sculpture Studio, (8) Cellar for Pottery and Ceramics, (9) Bronze-casting Shed, (10) Process and Block-making Workshop, (11) Exhibition Hall and (12) Students' Common Room and Canteen—as individual studios and workshops.

CHAPTER XV-FACULTY OF HOME SCIENCE

1. Brief History

The Government of Baroda created on the 17th December, 1948 a Women's Educational Trust Fund with the object of establishing a Women's Home Science College in Baroda. The Trustees of the said Fund offered to transfer the Fund to the University on condition that it should be utilised for the construction, equipment and maintenance of a Home Science College for women. The University accepted the offer and started a Home Science College from the 3rd July, 1950 in one of its old buildings. Soon after the construction of a new building for the College was taken on hand. The new building completed at a cost of Rs. 6.57 lakhs, was occupied by the Faculty in June, 1952.

2. Buildings

The Faculty is housed in a spacious building constructed at a cost of Rs. 6.57 lakhs. The building provides adequate class-rooms, laboratories, workshop, Dean's office, meeting room and library and reading room. In addition, it has a large auditorium and a cafetaria. Chetan Balwadi is accommodated on the west wing ground floor. During the year, a new Home Management practice house was constructed in the compound of the Faculty at a cost of Rs. 64,000. Construction of a first floor over the western wing of the Faculty was also completed during the year at a cost of Rs. 4,500. This wing provided the required facilities for the post-graduate class-rooms and laboratories of the new department of Clothing and Textile to be started in the ensuing year.

3. Courses of Studies

The Faculty provides a four years' course leading to the degree of B.Sc. (Home) and a further two years' course leading to the degree of M.Sc. (Home). In the B.Sc. (Home) course the first two years consist of a core course, which acquaints all the students with the different phases of Home Science. The last two years enable the students to specialize in their own fields of interest. Four Home Science fields are offered as majors viz. (a) Foods & Nutrition, (b) Child Development, (c) Home Management, and (d) Home Science Education. For M.Sc. (Home), two majors are provided viz. (a) Foods and Nutrition and (b) Child Development. For the practical training, special help was received from (I) Maharani

Shantadevi Nursing Home, (2) Home Science Extension Training Centre which trains Gram Sevikas and (3) ladies of the City who participated in adult education classes.

The Child Development department visited the various nursery schools and Child Welfare agencies in Bombay and its suburbs. The Home Science Education department went to Ahmedabad to collect Audio-Visual Aids. Nine staff members and fifteen students attended the third Biennial Conference of the Home Science Association held in Allahabad.
- (2) Socials: The Students' Association organised three socials and one picnic for the staff and the students of the Faculty.
- (3) Sports: Several students took part in the indoor and outdoor games and sports and won prizes.
- (4) Debates: Students organised Inter-house debates in the Faculty and also took part in the Inter-Faculty debates.
- (5) Film Show: Several films were obtained from foreign embassies and Films Division of the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting on various aspects of Home Science and Technical subjects. Ministry of Information and Broadcasting, while preparing a film on Women's education, took several shots of the various departments of the Faculty to explain 'Home Science' to the public.
- (6) Exhibition: The exhibits in the four show cases near the entrance of the Faculty are changed frequently by all the departments. Shrimati K. G. Karandikar displayed the toys, garments and handicrafts prepared by the students of the Faculty at the All-India Home Science Biennial Conference, Allahabad. During the University Week the Faculty arranged an exhibition which was well attended.
- (7) Celebrations: The students took part in N.C.C. and A.C.C. Several students participated in Inter-University

Youth Festival held in Delhi. The Faculty Day was celebrated for four days.

(8) Faculty Magazine: The third issue of the Faculty Magazine was published in March, 1957. Some leading people in the field of Home Science, members of the staff and the students contributed articles in the magazine.

10. Tutorials and Class Work

The Faculty follows a system of grade-credit to assess and evaluate the work of its students in all theory and practical classes. Every teacher maintains a diary or a class record for her subjects, in respect of each student taking the course. The students' performances during a term in the subjects in areas of practical test, regular assignments, term papers, reports, class room work and special projects are evaluated on a four point scale and the grades earned by the student in each area of the sessional work are entered in her class record. All these grades are averaged and count as half of the total grade for the term. The advisory system adopted by the Faculty has helped the students with their scholastic and personal problems.

12. Chetan Balwadi

The department of Child Development conducts a Nursery School for children between the ages 2 to 5. It is located on the ground floor in the west wing of the Faculty and is furnished with suitable furniture, apparatus and equipment for the education of children of this age group. It has a fairly large play-ground. One of the Senior Lecturers in Child Development works as the Superintendent of this School. Besides, there are three trained teachers. The number of children in the School during the year was 60-30 boys and 30 girls. The School serves as a laboratory for the department of Child Development.

13. Home Science Wing

The Government of India, Ministry of Agriculture is conducting an intensive programme of rural development in the country through the Nation Extension Service Blocks for raising the standard of living, health and happiness of the rural population. In this programme the Ministry requires a large number of Gram Sevikas i. e. women village level workers, who are well equipped to work in villages and to help the women there to raise the standard of living in the rural community. With this end in view, the Ministry decided to start 25 centres in the country to train up women workers. One out of the two centres, offered to the State of Bombay, is run on their behalf by the University as 'Home Science Wing' in the University estate of Tara Nivas. Necessary additions and alterations in the existing buildings were made to provide a training Hall with class rooms, laboratory, administrative office and accommodation for the Instructresses and trainees by May, 1956. 1. Brief History

Organisation of the Faculty of Social work was started on the 15th March, 1949. It started working from the 18th July, 1950.

2. Building

No additions or alterations were made to the existing building. The Faculty has received approval and grant from the University Grants Commission for a new building.

3. Courses of studies

As a post-graduate institution, the Faculty offers the degree of Master of Social Work. The curriculum consists of class-room work, field work and research.

4. Field Work, Rural Work, Study Tours etc.

(a) Field Work:

and the transfer of the Agent San Billy become of the The chief emphasis continues to be on practical training and the application of academic knowledge to day-to-day life situations. This year junior students were given group supervision in the first term, and from second term the students continued to be supervised individually. Agencies co-operating with the Faculty in offering valuable practical training to the students are Camp Road Community Welfare Centre, Baroda Certified School, Baroda Central Prison, Government Blind School, Shri Chimnabai Industrial Home for Women, Health Museum, Shri Jamnabai Hospital, Shri Padmavati Sanatorium, Anti-Tuberculosis Clinic, Shri Sayaji General Hospital, The Mental Hygiene and Psychiatric Clinic (Shri Sayaji General Hospital), The Mental Hospital, The Alembic Chemical Works Co. Ltd., Baroda Spinning & Weaving Co. Ltd., Jyoti Ltd., Sarabhai Chemicals, Shri Dinesh Woollen Mills Ltd., Shri Sayaji Mills Co. Ltd., Shri Yamuna Mills Co. Ltd., Government Labour Welfare Centre, Baroda District Industrial Co-operative Sale and Purchase Union, Khadi Prachar Mandal, Government Model Farm, The Atladra Rural Work Centre and The Bil Rural Work Centre. (b) Rural Work:

The Rural Work department of the Faculty of Social Work expanded its activities in Atladra and Bil villages during 1956-57. Four men and two women students were placed in these villages for their field work experience. The main activities that were carried out under the programme were - Medical, Recreational and Social Educational activities among youth and women of the villages.

The medical programme consisting of health education, and family and child welfare work was carried out under the guidance of one health visitor, who is appointed full-time by the Faculty. She also operated a milk distribution programme for children in both the villages in co-operation with the primary schools and panchayats. The Faculty provides milk powder and the milk is distributed five times a week. About 100 children of all ages took advantage of this programme.

The Rural Work department is encouraging the villages to obtain help from Government and other sources towards their village welfare. The department was able to assist the panchayat in Bil to persuade the Padra Primary Health Unit to start a health centre in Bil village. The panchayat, itself has sanctioned Rs. 2,000 for this purpose and has secured contribution of Rs. 1,500 from Bil Co-operative Society to the same cause. The Youth League in this village collected a sum of Rs. 360 which they utilized in renovating the Youth Hall constructed last year.

(c) The Mental Hygiene & Psychiatric Clinic:

The Mental Hygiene and Psychiatric Clinic continues to train students for Psychiatric Social Work and offers skilled services to children and adults who are neurotically and psychotically disturbed.

The full-time personnel remains the same as last year, i.e. two trained Psychiatric Social Workers, one Clinical Psychologist and one Clerk. The Mental Hygiene Consultant from the staff of the Faculty of Social Work and the Head of the Mental Hospital continue to offer their ser vices on voluntary basis.

The type of cases coming to the Clinic continues to be varied; but this year an increasing number of children and University students have taken advantage of their services. As of March 1957, there is a total of 972 cases registered in the Clinic; approximately 80 cases were receiving weekly help out of which 8 were students and 28 children.

The programme of public education in mental hygiene has been in fied. Two pamphlets in English tensified. Two pamphlets in English and Gujarati on the development of the Clinic and on the problems of the Clinic and on the problems of the control of th the Clinic and on the problems of children were distributed to doctors,

teachers and various institutions in Baroda, national as well as international agencies in the field. The responses indicate a steadily growing interest in this field.

In recognition of the work done by the Clinic, the Ministry of Health. Government of India gave an Ad-Hoc Grant of Rs. 10,000 during this year towards expenses of the Clinic. The Jean and Howard Norman Trust Fund of Australia continues to shoulder the major financial responsibility. while the University through the Faculty of Social Work continues to assume responsibility for facilities and services of some of the personnel.

(d) Study Tour:

The study tour was arranged for senior students this year. The students visited Hyderabad to observe the work of different social welfare agencies in the city.

(d) Students' Association and Students' Emergency Loan Fund:

Besides belonging to the University Union, the students of the Faculty run an Association for educational and recreational purposes. Over the past five years, they have built up a loan fund. Every year they add a small amount from the collections received from the members of the staff and students of the Faculty. The sum is set aside for rendering assistance to the needy students of the Faculty.

10. Co-curricular Activities

(a) Socials:

Under the auspices of the Students' Association, debates and lectures were conducted. They participated in the Inter-Faculty debates and competitions. They also organized annual sports and conducted it with enthusiasm. The students of the Faculty were hosts to a group of students from Institute of Social Sciences, Lucknow University when they visited the Faculty in January, 1957.

(b) Film Shows:

The Rural Welfare Centres and the Camp Road Community Welfare Centre arranged film shows as part of their regular programme when educational films on health, sanitation, agriculture and social education were shown. Some films covering subjects taught in classes were obtained from subjects.

- (c) The Faculty competed in an exhibition conducted by A. I. R., Baroda on progress of the country since Independence and was awarded a prize for the same.
- (d) The Fourth issue of the Faculty Magazine was published in May, 1957. It has now taken the shape of a Journal known as 'Social Work Review'. Some well-known people in the field of social work and members of the staff have contributed articles in this issue.

11. Tutorial and Class Work

The method of teaching adopted in the Faculty lays emphasis on class participation of students, and seminar discussions at post-graduate level are encouraged and implemented as far as possible. Individual supervision forms an important part of the Faculty's programme. Each student is assigned to a member of the staff for the purpose of discussing problems arising out of his field work experiences; regular weekly conferences are held for this purpose. By this, the student is helped to learn to put theory into practice. Similarly for research guidance, the students hold regular conferences with their research guides which facilitates a close supervision of the students' day-to-day progress.

12. Social Education Organisers' Training Centre, Samiala

The Social Education Organizers Training Centre is a constituent unit of the Faculty of Social Work, situated at about 8 miles from Baroda on the road to Padra. This Centre is one of the ten Social Education Organisers' Training Centres in the country and is receiving grant from the Ministry of Community Development, Government of India.

This is an in-service training centre for the Social Education Organisers who work as specialists incharge of Social Education in the Development Blocks, along with other specialists in the Community Development Programme. The centre trains two batches a year, each batch consisting of 40 trainees. The trainees are deputed from all over India by the various States.

The training centre was started in January, 1955 exclusively for women who underwent specialised training for three months after the regular training of five months for Social Education Organisers' work. Three such batches were turned out. Later, due to the growing demand for Social Education Organisers in the field and shortage of training centres, the Ministry of Community Development started three more centres

and this Centre was converted into a five months' training centre for both men and women. Till now 69 men and 113 women have been trained at the Centre.

The training consists of orienting the trainees to village life and village problems, and in giving them training in social skills that bring about maximum participation of the villagers in the development programme and sustain an active and continuous interest in them. The training also consists of giving a working social philosophy given to community uplift through community action. Being part of the Faculty of Social Work, the overall training at the Centre has a social work bias and enjoys a reputation for creative programme and work.

13. Other Important Events

- (a) The Faculty is conducting an all India research on 'Survey of the Graduates of the Schools of Social Work' on behalf of the Ministry of Education, Government of India. The object of the study is to assess the extent to which their training was helpful in meeting work responsibilities.
- (b) Services of an American Expert in Social Work, Miss H. Pinkus are made available by the T. C. M. to the Faculty for a period of two years from October, 1956.

14. Miscellaneous information

- (a) Shri Manibhai Amin of the Sanitex Chemical Industries Co. Ltd., continued the donation of vitamin and other pills for the subsidiary diet programme conducted at the Camp Road Community Welfare Centre.

- (c) The Staff of the Publicity Department of Municipality and the Five Year Plan Publicity Office gave full co-operation in organising educational film shows at the various field work centres.

CHAPTER XVII—ORIENTAL INSTITUTE

1. Brief History

The Baroda Central Library, which was established by the former Government of Baroda in 1910 had a Sanskrit section consisting of manuscripts and printed books. In 1915 this section started publication work under the Gaekwad's Oriental Series. The work of this Sanskrit section gradually expanded and in 1927 it was separated from the Central Library and made an independent institution. It was named as Oriental Institute and placed in charge of a Director with necessary technical and administrative staff. In 1931, the Translation Branch of the office of the Commissioner of Education, which was publishing books in Gujarati, Marathi and Hindi, was transferred to the Oriental Institute. When the Institute was taken over by the University in 1949 it had a splendid record of publications—109 volumes in the Gaekwad's Oriental Series and 516 other books.

2. Building

The Oriental Institute is accommodated on the first floor of the Government building called the Record Tower Building, where the accommodation is leased to the University on a nominal rent of Re. 1 per year.

3. Staff

During the year, the staff consisted of I Director, I Deputy Director, 3 Superintendents, I Translation Assistant, 9 Class III and 5 Class IV servants, as also the temporary and permanent members of the Ramayana Department, which has 2 Superintendents, 4 Ramayana Assistants and 33 part-time workers.

4. Work of the Institute

The main work of the Institute is research and publication carried fundamentally with the help of the big manuscripts collection and the collection of printed books bearing on all subjects related to Indology. The publications are under the following titles:

The Institute arranges the sale of these publications as well as of the publications of some Faculties and Institutions of the University.

12. Critical and Illustrated Edition of the Ramayana.

Since 1951 the University has undertaken through the Institute the publication of a Critical and Illustrated Edition of the Valmiki Ramayana. The Director is preparing the Critical Edition of the Balakanda. A specimen of the proposed Critical Edition was printed and sent to the members of the Editorial Board and well known scholars in India and abroad for opinion. The tentative edition was well-received. The work of reconstructing the text of Balakanda is progressing in right earnest.

5. Post-graduate Teaching

Besides the above, as a part of the scheme of co-ordination of the teaching of 14 Shastras of Sanskrit in the University, five members of the Institute are recognised as post-graduate teachers in Sanskrit for M.A. The Director who is recognised for guiding Ph.D. students in Sanskrit was guiding 6 Ph.D. students of the Faculty of Arts. During the year, a thesis on 'A Critical Study of Magha's Shishupalavadha' by Shri M. T. Buch, was accepted for the Ph.D. degree. Two more thesis, one on 'Cultural History from the Matsyapurana' by Shri S. G. Kantawala and the other on 'Origin and Development of the Dattatraya Worship in India' by Shri H. S. Joshi, are under preparation and nearing completion. The Deputy Director is also recognised as a post-graduate teacher for M.A. in Sanskrit and Prakrit, and for Ph.D. in Sanskrit and Prakrit and Ancient Indian History and Archaeology. During the year, 2 students are working under him, one, Shri H. G. Desai on 'A Cultural Study of Jayakhyasamhita' and Shri S. K. Dave on 'A Cultural Study of the Vamana Purana'. During the year, he has given guidance to one M.A. student in Sanskrit (offering Epics and Puranas as an optional subject). R24

6. Library and Reading Room

The Library of the Institute has two Sections:

(i) The Manuscript Section and (ii) The Printed Books Section.

(a) Manuscript Section:

This Section has a collection of 14,255 manuscripts in Sanskrit, Pali, Apabhramsa and other classical Indian languages of which 36 were added during the year. Of these, 13 were purchased, 22 were presented by the Deputy Director and I by Shri J. B. Shukla of Baroda. During the year, 36 MSS. were lent to outside institutions, 800 were issued to different scholars for work on the premises of the Institute and 3 MSS. were borrowed from outside institutions during the year.

(b) Printed Books Section:

This Section has a collection of 18,097 books of the value of Rs. 1,79,000 approximately of which 737 books were purchased during the year, at the cost of Rs. 5,840.91 out of which Rs. 2,851.86 were spent for the purchase of books from the grant sanctioned by the University Grants Commission. During the year, 368 books were received as gifts and on exchange basis. The Library has open-helf system. 1,380 books were issued to students and 380 to teachers during the year. The Library is open to the public. On an average, 35 students and 21 teachers made use of the Reading Room every day. Besides the facility of referring to manuscripts and for reading printed books, the Library provides 135 Journals. Since the time when the Sanskrit Division was separated from the Baroda State Central Library and the Oriental Institute came into being, this Library of the Oriental Institute has been of great help to scholars and students of Ancient Indian Culture and Literature, besides being immensely helpful to and indispensable for the progress of research work carried on by the staff and the students of the Oriental Institute.

7. Gaekwad's Oriental Series

Editing and publication of the Series is one of the main activities of the Institute. The Director works as the General Editor of the Series. 126 volumes have already been published under this Series. During the year, five more volumes were in the press and twenty-nine new works and ten re-prints of works already published were under preparation. The following works were under print during the year:

The sale proceeds of all these and the publications of this branch and of publications by late Professor B. K. Thakore came to Rs. 4,338.88 during the year.

9. Ramayana Department

The Department with the necessary staff of two Superintendents, 4 Ramayana Assistants, I Artist for Ramayana Pictures and 33 parttime workers continued the work for the Critical and Illustrated Edition of the Valmiki Ramayana.

A tentative Edition of the first Kanda of the Ramayana was printed and circulated amongst scholars for opinions. The constituted text of the Balakanda is being printed in the University Press and it is proposed to publish the first fascicule of some Sargas in December, 1957.

The collation of Ayodhyakanda was taken up after selection of 41 Ramayana MSS in different scripts. This work is nearing completion. Its editing has been entrusted to Dr. P. L. Vaidya, Poona (now Director, Mithila Research Institute, Darbhanga). The collation of Aranyakanda was taken up.

Critical Apparatus Section:

The first fascicule of the constituted text of the first Sarga of Balakanda was circulated amongst the members of the Editorial Board, Board of Referees and scholars in India and abroad. In the light of the opinions and suggestions of scholars on the 1st fascicule of the Bala-kanda some changes were adopted for the revision of the constituted text. 4 more Ramayana MSS were added for the Critical Apparatus.

The text of Sargas 1-25 was constituted and the text of further sargas is being constituted. Three formes of stanzas upto 1-2-17 were printed. The proofs of the 4th forme of stanza upto 1-3-19 are being revised and the forme II was in final stage. The press-copy of the 6th Sarga was also under revision and the readings etc. were being noted down.

The work of concordance of the four principal printed editions of the Ramayana and the Index of the Quarter verses of the Bombay edition were also under progress.

During the year, the Ramayana Artist working in the Faculty of Fine Arts had prepared two Ramayana pictures and they were sent to the Press for preparing blocks. Further pictures were under preparation.

A Facsimile of the oldest Newari MS. and Maithili MS. for the Critical Edition was prepared and got ready for block-making.

10. Journal of the Oriental Institute

The Institute publishes a Quarterly Journal. During the year, Vol. V No. 4 and Vol. VI Nos. 1, 2 and 3—in all four numbers were published. Many institutions and learned societies continued their exchange relations with the Journal. The number of subscribers to the Journal was 64 and the sale proceeds during the year came to Rs. 578-03.

CHAPTER XVIII-COLLEGE OF INDIAN MUSIC, DANCE AND DRAMATICS

1. Brief History

The School of Indian Music was first started in 1886 by the former government of Baroda. Later on it was designated as College of Indian Music. It was taken over by the University in 1949. At the time it offered a diploma course in vocal and instrumental music. The University introduced a four years course leading to the degree of B.Mus. in vocal and instrumental music from July, 1950. Degree and Diploma courses in Dance and Dramatics were started from June, 1951. The College was provided with a suitable independent building from June, 1952.

2. Building

The present building of the College of Indian Music, Dance and Dramatics at Sursagar was occupied by the College in June, 1952. The Gymnasium of the College was converted into an Open Air Theatre during the year.

3. Courses of Studies

The College offers the following courses:

- (1) Two years' post-graduate degree course leading to the degree of Master of Music (M.Mus.)
- Four years' course in Music (Vocal and Instrumental,—Sitar, Violin, Dilruba, Bansari and Tabla), Dance (Bharat Natyam and Kathak) and Dramatics leading to the degree of Bachelor of Music
- (3) Two years' post-diploma course in Dancing
- Five years' course in Vocal Music, Sitar, Dilruba, Violin, and Tabla leading to the Diploma in Music (Dip. Mus.).
- (5) Three years' courses leading to the Diploma in Dance (Dip. Dance) and Diploma in Dramatics (Dip. in Dramatics).
- (6) Three years' S. S. C. course in Vocal Music

- (I) The students of the College took part in the Drama Contest at the University Week during the year 1956-57 as a non-competition team.
- The students and the staff of the college took part in the variety entertainment programme at the Sports Pavilion on the 2nd October, 1957 arranged by the University Students'
- An educational tour to Ahmedabad was arranged in the month of December, 1956 for the students of degree and the diploma courses.

10. Tutorials and Class Work

As the majority of the subjects are of a practical nature, weekly tests were arranged in the class rooms. At the end of the month they were recorded on the tape-recorder and played before the students and their defects and good points were discussed with them.

This method proved of great help to the students and checked many faulty developments. Besides this, fortnightly written tutorials were given regularly in the theory subjects and the students were given grades which were taken into consideration at the time of the annual test.

CHAPTER XIX-BARODA SANSKRIT MAHAVIDYALAYA

1. Brief History

The institution was established by the former Baroda Government in 1915. With the passing of the Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda · Act it became a constituent recognised institution of the University but its management continued with the Government. The University took over the management of the institution from the Government on the 18th June, 1951.

2. Building and Hostel

The institution continued to be housed in the building called 'Temple of Radhavallabh' which belongs to the Devasthan Department, on a monthly rent of Rs. 70. It has a hostel in a hired building to accommodate 15 students. Number of students in the hostel during the year was 10.

3. Courses of Studies

The institution offers courses in three stages as under:

(1) Uttama Kaksha or Special Pandit Course of four years' duration is split up into two courses—the Shastri Course (Degree Course) extending over first two years and Acharya Course (Post-graduate Degree Course) extending over the last two years in the subjects of (i) Vyakarana Shastra, (ii) Jyotish Shastra, (iii) Dharma Shastra, (iv) Sahitya Shastra, (v) Nyaya and Vaisheshik Darshan, (vi) Samkhya Yoga and Vedant Darshan, and (vii) Purva Mimansa Shastra.

Only first four branches worked during the year.

- (2) Madhyama Kaksha or Diploma Course of five years' duration leads to the Diploma of 'Visharada' in each of the two branches of (i) Grammar and Literature and (ii) Astrology and Astronomy with English upto the S.S.C. standard compulsory for both the branches.
- (3) Prathama Kaksha or Certificate Course is of three years' duration in each of the branches of (i) Yajurveda Yajniki, (ii) Rugveda Yajniki and (iii) Purana with Grammar and Literature compulsory for all branches.

CHAPTER XX-INTERMEDIATE COLLEGE

1. Brief History

The College was started by the University from June, 1950.

2. Buildings

During the year 1956-57 the Intermediate College continued holding its classes in the rooms of the Faculties of Arts and Commerce. The Intermediate Arts Class was divided into two groups A & B in subjects like English, Logic, World History and Politics where the total strength of the undivided class was likely to be more than 100. For other subjects, where the numbers of students were small, the classes was not divided.

3. Courses of Studies

The College offers courses leading to Preparatory Arts and Intermediate Arts as well as Preparatory Commerce and Intermediate Commerce Examinations.

The year under report was the second year after the introduction of Preparatory Courses in Arts, Commerce and Science. As the students joining the Preparatory classes were not well up in English and Hindi, the classes were divided into small groups of about 60 each for more intensive teaching of these subjects. Each group was in charge of a teacher who was able to teach more effectively and efficiently than it is possible in a big class of more than 100 students. This also enabled the teacher to know the students in his group more intimately.

Medium

As the students joining the Preparatory Courses were likely to have studied English for four years only in the schools, the University allowed the students of the Preparatory Arts and Commerce Courses to answer their examination papers in English, Gujarati or Hindi. Teachers were instructed to lecture in any of these languages to make the subject properly understood by the students. In lecturing to the classes the teachers follow ed these instructions very scrupulously. One of the Preparatory Arts and Commerce divisions contained only Gujarati-knowing students and in these classes the teachers generally lectured in Gujarati while in other div isions, where students speaking different languages were included, the teachers used to lecture partly in Hindi and partly in English. The stuff dents wrote their tutorials and the terminal examination papers in one of the three languages mentioned above. The teachers, however, maintained a uniform standard of marking the answers written in different languages.

The teaching staff is attached to the Faculties of Arts and Commerce. The other staff continued to be of 4 Class III and 10 Class IV servants.

6. Library and Reading Room

The College Library and the Students' Reading Room are housed in a room near the College Office. The Library and the Reading Room were kept open from 11-00 a.m. to 1-30 p.m. on all working days. Certain days in a week were allotted to different classes for issuing books from the Library owing to the small space available. A very large number of students borrowed books from the Library. The Principal used to go to the Library from time to time and recommend books of general interest. A large number of the students of the College were members of the University Library and regularly borrowed books from there also.

The Reading Room was maintained out of the College Association fees collected from the students. A large number of dailies and periodicals in Gujarati, Hindi, Marathi and English were subscribed for. More than 250 students read in the Reading Room every day. A room adjacent tnan 250 students to the Reading Room was provided for women students as their Reading Room.

7. Co-curricular Activities

(I) Auxiliary Cadet Corps:

A. C. C. training is compulsory for all students of the College. The men students had their A. C. C. activities thrice a week on the ground in front of the Faculty of Technology and Engineering. The women students staying in the city area had these activities thrice a week on the same ground in the mornings, while women students staying in the University Halls of Residence and the area near the station had their A. C. C. activities in the evening thrice a week on the ground of the Faculty of Home Science. In addition to drills and callisthenics, the cadets played Volley Ball, Basket Ball and Indian team games.

Many students of the College participated in the work of digging and levelling the open auditorium in front of the stage of the Open-Air Theatre in the Faculty of Education and Psychology.

(2) National Cadet Corps:

The students of the College joined the N. C. C. in large numbers. Out of 470 cadets in the N. C. C. about 90 students were from the Intermediate College. A majority of these students joined the annual N. C. C. Camp at Nasik. Similarly 25 women students of the College joined the N. C. C. Girls' Troop and they attended the annual camp held at Khadakvasala during December, 1956.

(3) Games:

The College students took a very keen interest in major games like Cricket, Foot Ball, Hockey, Badminton etc. during the year. They also took a prominent part in athletics and indoor games. The College Association organized tournaments in Badminton, Table-Tennis and Carrom. In the Relay Race Competition held during the University Week, the College won the championship. The College also won the championship in the University Chess Tournaments. Several of the College students were included in the University Team for Inter-University Cricket Tournament held in Baroda.

(4) The College Students' Representative Council:

The College Students' Representative Council was extremely helpful throughout the year and there were most cordial relations between the students and the teachers. The difficulties of the students were removed as far as possible.

(5) The Debating Society:

The Debating Society organized two debates, one of which was an extempore speeches competition. A large number of students participated in them and prizes were awarded to the best speakers. The College participated in the several debates organized by the University Union. The College won the second prize in the Wadia Trophy Debate and in the Majmundar Trophy Hindi Debate. Shri C. D. Amin who won the second prize in the Hindi Debate represented the M. S. University of Baroda at the All-India Hindi Trophy Competition held by A.I.R.

8. Tutorials and Class Work

The Tutorial system worked very satisfactorily during the year. The newly admitted students were explained the importance of the tutorials. It was found that the students realized their value because they prepared at home for the tutorials and attended them regularly. The portion of studies to be covered by a tutorial was announced to the students at least a week in advance, but the actual topic was given only at the time of the tutorial. This prevented any cramming on the part of students and thus the tutorials tended to become a real test. The Terminal Examination was considered as an additional tutorial. The themes of the tutorials were given by the teachers to the tutors who examined the tutorials, prepared the record of the marks and found the average marks in their subjects for submission to the University at the end of the year. To enable the tutors to maintain a proper standard, the teacher in year. To enable the charge of a subject examined about 10% of the tutorial exercises. The tutors called the students in batches and explained their mistakes and solved their difficulties. At the end of the year the tutorials records were shown to the students.

CHAPTER XXI-UNIVERSITY LIBRARY

1. Acquisition Notes

(i) Books:

The Library received a grant of \$ 5,000,00 from India Wheat Loan Educational Exchange Programme during the year. This grant was specially given for books on Science and Technology. The orders for these books were placed and some books have been already received.

The Library received a grant of Rs. 20,000 from the University as usual and it has been fully utilized.

The Library also received a grant of Rs. 40,000 for books and back volumes of periodicals in Science and Technology and Rs. 50,000 for the books and back volumes of periodicals in Humanities from the University Grants Commission. Both these grants have been fully utilized.

There have been some noteworthy acquisitions during the year, viz: a latest set of Encyclopaedia Britannica, 24 Vols.; Encyclopaedia of Labour Laws and Industrial Legislation, 5 Vols.; Historians' History of the World, 27 Vols.; Thorpes Dictionary of Applied Chemistry, 12 Vols.; Cambridge Modern History, 13 Vols.; Unrepealed Central Acts of the Government of India, 10 Vols.; Flora of British India, 7 Vols.

The University Library and libraries of the institutions were lacking in some volumes of scholarly periodicals. To fill this gap back volumes of some valuable periodicals have been acquired, viz. as follows: Advances of Enzymology and related subjects of Biochemistry, 15 Vols.; Annual Review of Biochemistry, 24 Vols.; Annual Review of Microbiology, 10 Vols.; Journal of Organic Chemistry, 16 Vols.; Econometrica, 22 Vols.; Journal of Oriental Society, 76 Vols.; Journal of Politics, 15 Vols.; Political Science Quarterly, Vol. 25-69; Proceedings of American Society for testing Materials, Vol. 33-48; Transactions of American Society of Civil Engineers, Vol. 97-113; Transactions of American Institute of Electrical Engineers, Vol. 52-73; Science, Vol. 14-124; Proceedings of the Royal Society, Series A, Vol. 192-218.

From the current year the purchase of books for the University

Under the India Wheat Loan Educational Exchange Programme, the University Library has acquired a Tape-recorder for maintaining the records of research into the linguistics, folk-lore and fine-arts in the University. A microfilm reader has also been acquired to facilitate the use of microfilms in the University Library.

(ii) Periodicals:

The total number of periodicals and scholarly journals subscribed for now stands at 511. The Library decided upon the policy of getting the scholarly periodicals bound and accordingly 460 volumes of bound periodicals were added. The compilation of a catalogue of the holding of the bound periodicals is going on.

2. Cataloguing and Classification Section

(a) There was an arrear in classification of about 10,000 books at the end of last year. This work, plus the work of classification and cataloguing of 15,273 books newly acquired in the University Library and Faculty Libraries, was undertaken during the year with the help of the temporary staff appointed for the purpose. All the work, except classification and cataloguing of about 10,000 books from new acquisitions has been finished.

(b) The cataloguing and reclassification of 87,211 books was finished in 1955-56. The work of typing of the catalogue cards, filing of index cards in the catalogues and labelling and shelving of these books as well as of the new books was undertaken during the year with the help of temporary staff, specially appointed for this purpose. (c) Separate Name and Subject Catalogues, along with the subject index to the Subject Catalogue, were handed over to five Faculty Libraries of the Faculty of Technology, Fine Arts, Music College, Home Science and Social Work. In addition to this, Union Catalogue showing the resources of these libraries, is kept in the University Library. For Libraries of Faculty of Education and Psychology, Intermediate College, Commerce, Arts, which are merged with the University Library, a separate Name and Subject, Catalogue along with the Subject Index is kept in the University Library.

3. Lending and Reference Services

The Library remains open from 8-00 a.m. to 8-00 p.m. on all week days except Saturdays when it remains open from 2-00 p.m. to 8-00 p.m. It is also kept open on Sundays and holidays during the months of annual examination in order to give more facilities to the students.

The Library is maintaining a vertical file of important pamphlets received.

5. Personnel

The reclassification and calaloguing of the libraries of the Faculties of Arts, Science, Commerce, Education and Psychology and the Intermediate College was completed. The reclassification and cataloguing of other Faculties had to be done and an amount of Rs. 32,240 was sanctioned to complete this operation.

6. Building

The ground floor of the new building was ready for occupation and the Libraries of the Faculties of Arts, Science, Commerce, Education and Psychology and the Intermediate College have been brought there and are integrated. M/S. Office Equipment Co. of India who are making steel racks for the Library have put up an improvised assembly and paint shop on the premises and the steel racks are being delivered in instalments. The design of the furniture for the new building has been finished in consultation with Professor M. B. Dave, the Architect, and the orders are placed with the Kalabhavan Workshops. The work of electric installation is going on. It is anticipated that the whole building would be ready for occupation by December 1957.

7. Other Important Events

The Diploma in Library Science Class was inaugurated by the Vice-Chancellor on the 2nd July, 1956. As already mentioned, eleven graduate employees were admitted and all of them have come out successfully.

Dr. C. D. Deshmukh, Chairman, University Grants Commission, visited the University Library on the 14th February, 1957.

The University Librarian, Dr. C. P. Shukla, was invited to participate in the Symposium on 'American Arts and Letters' jointly conducted under the auspices of the Bombay University and the United States Information Service.

CHAPTER XXII—THE M. S. UNIVERSITY OF BARODA PRESS (SADHANA PRESS)

1. Building

Since the date of its purchase viz: the 18th May, 1953, the University Press is housed in a rented building in Raopura, Baroda. The present premises are too congusted. Plans of a new press building are approved by the Syndicate and it is proposed to construct it in the premises of the Old Kalabhavan hostel on the South of the Faculty of Technology and Engineering.

2. Staff

During the year, the staff of the Press consisted of a Manager, Assistant Manager, Accounts clerk and Proof-reader. There were 32 permanent press workers. Additional workers were employed on daily wages when required.

3. Machinery

Due to the expansion of the publishing activity of the University, purchase of a monotype machine with English and Gujarati matrices was sanctioned but due to import licence difficulty the arrangement for import could not materialize and installation of the same was delayed.

4. Printing Activities

The press printed 100 papers for October, 1956 University examinations and 455 papers for March-April, 1957 University examinations. Besides, it printed for the University, Syndicate and Senate proceedings, annual report, annual accounts, budget, establishment list, pamphlets, University certificates, sundry printed stationery and general forms. Faculties and Institutions were also supplied with their requirements of forms and printed stationery. Over and above this, prospectuses, questionnaires and magazines of the Faculties and Institutions were printed during the year.

5. Stationery Section

The Press also managed the purchases and distributions of stationery required for the use of the University during the year. A special staff of one clerk, one attender and one distributor was provided for the work of purchase and distribution. Ordinarily stationery was distributed to the institutions and departments every quarter on the basis of quarterly indents collected. About 172 items of stationery were handled by the stationery section. This section is a service department of the University and service charges are recovered over and above the actual cost of materials.

The Debating Society of the Union was very active throughout the year. It organised a good number of debates during the year. Our students also participated in various Inter-University Debates. A Debate in Gujarati was arranged on the 8th December, 1956 to select two teams consisting of two students in each team to represent the University at Mahadev Desai Trophy Debate at Ahmedabad and at the Inter-University Gujarati Debate organised by All India Radio, Baroda-Ahmedabad. Amin, Intermediate College, for Hindi Debate, while Shri Prakash Desai, Faculty of Science, and Shri Vrushank Majmudar, Faculty of Arts, represented the University in the Gujarati Radio Debate at Baroda. All the speakers gave a good account of themselves at various debates.

On the 31st January, 1957, the Pro-Vice-Chancellor Trophy Debate in Gujarati was held behind the Baroda College Central Hall. Shrimati Hansa Mehta, Vice-Chancellor, presided over the Debate. Shri Vrushank Majmudar was awarded the first prize and the Pro-Vice-Chancellor's Trophy. Kumari Anila Chhaya and Shri Rumy Mistry won the second and the third prizes respectively.

The Prize distribution function during the year was held on the 5th March, 1957 in the Table Tennis Hall. It was presided over by Dr. C. S. Patel, the Pro-Vice-Chancellor and Shri Ashfaque Hussain, Joint Secretary, Ministry of Education, Government of India, distributed the prizes.

(4) Reading Room and Library Committee:

The Committee started its work with a meeting which was held on the 15th September, 1956. The list of newspapers and periodicals was overhauled. Some magazines which were of little use were replaced by the magazines having more usefulness and demand. The Union Library is a centre where the students of different Faculties gather to-gether and enrich their knowledge with the help of the books and magazines on various subjects. No entertainment is so inexpensive and no pleasure is so lasting as reading.

The Committee decided to continue the lending Library Scheme. The scheme which was brought out last year but which did not work was suitably modified. No membership fees were charged as it was thought that all the students should be given a chance to use it.

(5) Variety Entertainment Committee:

As special features of the activities of this year the programmes presented by the Entertainment Committee were marked by the innovations introduced in the latter part (Second term) of the last year when the Committee decided to stage an open air entertainment programme on the Republic Day in front of the New Pavilion.

Two programmes were staged under the auspices of this Committee. A performance of Dance and Songs was given in the celebration of the 2nd October, the birth-day of Mahatma Gandhi. The items were Group Songs, Dances (Bharat Natyam) by Kumari Pratibha Pandit, devotional songs, Musical Orchestra and some songs by the well-known Shayar Shri S. Palenpuri.

The Committee also staged a programme on the 26th January, 1957 the Republic Day, in collaboration with the N.C.C. who enlivened the programme with Boxing Bouts. The features were dances and a Group Dance which was highly appreciated at the Inter-University Youth Festival and which was composed by Kumari Pandit. Vocal recitals by Shri R29

Ramesh Dani, and musical items by Shri Khushru Hakim and party were highly appreciated.

As the programmes were staged in the open, the Committee was not faced with problems of accommodation and of imposing order on a congested audience. The performances were carried out in a peaceful atmosphere of attentiveness and appreciation.

(6) Social Service League:

It has become an accepted fact that one of the chief activities of the league has been the circulation of books and magazines in the hospitals. Those patients, who are undergoing long term hospitalisation or convalescing after an operation, show very keen interest in such a programme as this relieves to some extent the monotony of their bed-ridden condition. Although Shri Sayaji General Hospital has a library of its own, there is a real dearth of books in local languages. Hence the S.S.G. Hospital made organised attempts to secure as many books and magazines as possible in languages like Gujarati, Marathi and Hindi. While doing so, they also skilfully interpreted the aims and objectives of the league to the leaders of the Community. The Wardens of the various Halls of Residence have also donated generously the old magazines to the league. Consequently, the league has now a very good collection of magazines which are found to be very popular to the patients. The league also bought sixty rupees worth of books from the budget of 100 rupees granted by the Union. Books and magazines have also been lent to Jamnabai Hospital, Padmavati T. B. Sanatorium, Remand Home, Certified School and other institutions. Students of the Faculty of Social Work have worked hard in making this activity a great success.

The outstanding achievement of the year's activity had been the active campaign launched by the members to enrol blood donors from amongst the students of the University. Since there seemed to be considerable misapprehension regarding blood transfusion, and blood donation, it was thought desirable to have this cleared by persons working in the field in order to enlist maximum co-operation from students. At the invitation of the League, Dr. J. Mordecai, the Head of the Pathology Department of the Medical College, spoke to the students on two occasions, once at the Faculty of Social Work and another at Shrimati Sarojini Devi Hall of Residence for Women Students on the process of blood transfir sion and blood donation. This had a positive effect. Students came

forward to enrol themselves as blood donors. Out of these enlisted twenty-three have already donated blood.

The Union entrusted the league with the sale of flags during the Flag Day Week Celebrations. The members collected a sum of Rs. 50 under the auspices of the Baroda Branch of the Anti-Tuberculosis Association. Members actively canvassed for the T. B. Seals and achieved gratifying results.

(7) U.N.O. Society:

During the year, under the auspices of the Committee, a Symposium was held on the subject specified by the Ministry of Education on the celebrations of HUMAN RIGHTS DAY.

The programme was attended by a large number of students and staff members of the University and was highly appreciated.

(8) Poor Boys' Library Committee:

The Committee helped poor students in getting books which they could not get from the market. Last year 116 students were given books. During the year books were given to about 150 students.

(9) Union Co-operative Stores Ltd.:

The Union Co-operative Stores continued to supply text-books and note books to the students this year also.

(10) Hiking Club:

In October, 1956, a hike had been arranged to Lonavla near Poona. A batch of seventeen students was selected out of forty that applied. The team had also been to Valvaldam, Karla, Tiger's lip Valley and Shivaji Navy School. The team had the opportunity to visit the National Defence Academy, Khadakvasla, and also the National Chemical Laboratory, Poona.

(II) Film Club:

During the year, the Club tried to present to the members good pictures in Hindi and in English. In all eight pictures—five Hindi and three English, were shown till the beginning of December, 1956. The following is the list of the pictures shown during the year:

The University Week Celebrations now constitute a regular feature of the yearly activities of the Union.

The University Week is the biggest University Festival. It stretches over a week and its programme is highly diverse. It includes Physical and Military displays, Sports and Exhibition Matches, Debates, Poetry Recitation, Competitions in Drama, Group Dance, Group Song and Garba, Academic and Cultural Exhibitions in the different Faculties of the University and public entertainment for the students. Almost every important item of the programme carries a silver trophy and a number of prizes.

During the year a silver shield for group song was donated by Dr. Manubhai D. Patel, an eminent surgeon and nominated member of the Executive Committee of the Union. The Seventh University Week was indeed a great success not merely in terms of competitions. Of course the competitors put up a much higher standard of performance than before, and more than that, displayed a spirit of emulation without ill-feeling which should be the guiding principle of all competitions. The competitors helped one another and created an atmosphere of delightful camaraderie.

Besides these competitions, there were a few noticeable features of the University Week which deserve mention. There was a more spontaneous collaboration between the students and the staff. Indeed the whole

programme evolved itself almost organically without falling into compartments. The pleasure therefore was continuous and cumulative.

A new experiment in the organisation of the entertainment programme was tried this year successfully. An Open Air Stage was erected for an audience of about five thousand students and all the items of the trophy competitions were put on the boards. The programme was widely appreciated. This is an indication that with a mobile stage we can in future entertain the University community on the Pavilion Grounds.

This is a very fortunate University in the sense that the Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor, the Pro-Vice-Chancellor and the members of the Syndicate take a lively interest in the cultural life of the students community. For example, this week was inaugurated by the Chancellor, while at the end the prizes were distributed by Dr. Jivraj Mehta, Finance Minister of Bombay State, who is also a Syndic of the University. It was very gracious of Dr. Jivraj Mehta to have spared the time for the prize distribution inspite of a crowded schedule of engagements.

CHAPTER XXV-STUDENTS' WELFARE ACTIVITIES

1. University Halls of Residence

(I) Buildings:

+

During the year, two more Halls of Residence were constructed and have come into use from the new term. There was a heavy demand for seats in Shrimati Sarojinidevi Hall of Residence and hence it was found necessary to build a Hall for women students of the University. The new Hall of Residence for Women is appropriately named after the Vice-Chancellor, Shrimati Hansa Mehta and the Hall for men is named Shri Kanaiyalal Maneklal Munshi Hall of Residence. During this year 911 students were in residence. In all there are now 9 Halls of Residence, including Shri Keshavprasad Hostel, a rented building. However, it needs to be stressed that a large number of students who were admitted to different courses could not be admitted because of want of space. It is hoped that more seats would be available in the course of years.

(2) Number of Students in the Halls:

The total number of students in the Halls at the end of the year 1956-57 was 911 against 804 in the last year as shown in the following statement:

(3) Administration:

Administration of the Halls was carried on by the Syndicate on the advice of the Supervisory Council for the Halls of Residence and the Wardens' Committee. One of the Wardens continued to work as Convener of the Wardens' Committee, who from this year, is designated as the Chief Warden. It was decided to set up Central Committees for various activities and general direction of resident students. This year six committees were functioning to look after and to organise student activities viz. (I) A Central Committee, (2) A Central Food Committee, (3) A Central Committee for Cultural Activities, (4) A Central Sports Committee, (5) A Central Committee for Accounts and Auditing and (6) A Central Committee for Students' Health. The formation of these committees has considerably helped the organisation and regulation of student life because these committees have introduced the principle of self-government in the Halls of Residence under the guidance and supervision of the Wardens' Committee.

(4) Recreation and Other Amenities:

All the Halls have been provided with well-equipped reading-rooms. They have small libraries also. Students are substantially contributing towards the purchase of newspapers and magazines. The University has appointed two Honorary Medical Officers-one for Men's Halls and the other for Women's Halls. These medical officers visit each Hall twice a week and give free medical advice to the students. Arrangements are also made to dispense ordinary medicine to the students on a nominal charge.

(5) Cultural and Social Activities:

As in the previous years, the cultural and social activities play an important part in the building of the character of students. These activities are carried out by the following committees with the approval of the Central Committee:

- I Food Committee
- 2 Sports Committee
- 3 Entertainment and Debate Committee
- 4 Reading Room and Library Committee
- 5 Health and Sanitation Committee

In each Hall, meetings and talks are arranged; sometimes musical evenings are organised. The small groups for study purposes meet in the Common Room; Games Tournaments and Debates are held. During the

year, Inter-Hostel Debate on the 27th January, 1957, Independence Day celebrations on the 15th August, 1956 and Annual Day of the Hostels on the 9th December, 1956 were the high lights of the co-operative life of all the students. Following are some of the important items of interest:

- (i) A Dinner party in honour of Dr. C. D. Deshmukh and Shrimati Durgabai Deshmukh in Dr. Jivraj Mehta Hall.
- (ii) Smt. Laxmi Menon, the President of All-India Women's Conference visited Shrimati Sarojini Devi Hall on the 9th January, 1957.
- (iii) The delegates to the All-India Mathematical Conference came to stay in Maharshi Arvind Hall during winter vacation,
- (iv) Dinners were arranged in honour of the members of the General Education Conference in all the Halls of the Residence.
- (v) A show known as the Invisible City was held in Maharshi Arvind Hall for the students of the Halls of Residence.
- (vi) Meetings of the Central Committee were regularly held in all the Halls by rotation at least once a month.

2. Medical Examination of Students

The University arranges during the first term of every academic year a medical check-up of all the newly admitted students of the University and of all those who are required to undergo the follow up work according to the previous year's report. The check-up is conducted by a board of specialists in Shri Sayaji General Hospital, Baroda in July-August every year. The results of the examination are recorded in a special form maintained for the purpose and communicated to each student on a report card. Cases requiring regular medical attention are separated and referred to the respective specialists for examination and advice. These cases are reported to the respective heads of institutions to help the students in getting proper treatment and attention.

3. Physical Education

(A) Staff:

This University has a separate department of Physical Education to organise and conduct various physical education activities such as A. C. C., Major Games, Sports, Boating, Youth Camps, and Campus Work Projects. At present four qualified Physical Instructors including one Lady Physical Instructor are working in this department under the supervision and guidance of the Superintendent of Physical Education. The Superintendent also acts as the Ex-Officio Secretary of the University Board of Sports.

(B) Auxiliary Cadet Corps:

A. C. C. training is compulsory for all the First Year and Second Year students of this University except those who are selected for Major Games, Boating and N. C. C. In all 1,220 students including 294 girl students were given training in Marching, Drill, P. T., Games, Mass P. T., Road March and Manual Work. Special Training was also imparted to selected Boys Cadets in Gymnastics, Vaulting and Tumbling.

During N. C. C. Week and University Week celebrations, 500 A. C. C. Boys and Girls Cadets took part in the Ceremonial Parades. A special Mass P. T. demonstration was also put up by these selected cadets at the time of the inauguration of the University Week by H. H. Shrimant Maharaja Fatehsinhrao Gaekwad of Baroda, the Chancellor of the University.

Throughout the year the A.C.C. training was imparted by the trained staff of the department, 8 A. C. C. Officers, and 69 student leaders under the command of the Officer Commanding, 6th Bombay Battalion N. C. C., Baroda.

(C) Major Games and Boating:

In all 310 students of various Faculties and Institutions participated in major games such as Cricket, Hockey, Foot Ball, Volley Ball, Basket Ball, Kho-Kho, Hu-tu-tu, Tennis, and Badminton. In addition to this, 121 students took part in Boating.

These activities were supervised and conducted by the Physical Instructors of the department and the Officers-in-charge of Cricket, Tennis, Badminton and Boating.

(D) University Teams:

Special training was given to the University Cricket, Hockey, Foot Ball, Volley Ball, Kho-Kho, Tennis and Badminton teams by the Physical Instructors and Officers-in-charge of respective games. Some Coaches were also appointed to train the University teams in Cricket, Hockey, Foot Ball and Kho-Kho.

(E) Annual Sports:

As a part of the University Week celebrations, Annual Sports were held on the 11th, the 12th and the 13th December, 1956. In all 455

dents including 110 women students from various Faculties and Institutions participated in different Track and Field events with great deal of interest. Separate competitions for the members of the staff (Teaching and Administrative) were also held.

The individual Athletic Championship for men was won by Shri N. M. G. Bhaktan of the Faculty of Science and that for women was won by Kumari Lalita Gore of the Faculty of Technology and Engineering.

Dr. Jivraj Mehta, Finance Minister, Bombay State, gave away the prizes to the winners of the various competitions.

(F) Local Tournaments:

The University Cricket, Hockey, Foot Ball, Volley Ball, Tennis and Badminton teams participated in the Local League and Knock-out tournaments. The Volley Ball team won two Championship shields viz. Shri Maganbhai Shankerbhai Patel Shield at Baroda and Late Shri C. M. Soni Shield at Godhra. The Foot Ball team were runners-up in the Late F. Kekobad Memorial Shield Foot Ball tournament and were awarded a cup. The University Table Tennis team also participated in the All Baroda T. T. Tournament and won the H. H Maharani Shantadevi Gaekwad Trophy. The individual Championship was won by Shri R. A. Jhirad, a student of the Faculty of Commerce. In addition to this, the University teams played several matches with local and outside teams.

(G) Inter-Faculty Tournaments:

Inter-Faculty Hockey, Foot Ball, Volley Ball, Kho-Kho, and Hu-tutu Tournaments were held in the Second term. All the Faculties participated in these tournaments.

The Faculty of Science won the Volley Ball and Kho-Kho tournaments and the Faculty of Technology and Engineering won the Foot Ball and Hu-tu-tu tournaments. The Faculty of Arts were winners of the Hockey Tournament.

(H) Inter-University Tournaments:

This year the University teams participated in the Inter-University Cricket, Tennis, Badminton, Volley Ball and Kho-Kho (Men & Women) tournaments. The Cricket team defeated Andhra and Osmania Universities but lost to Mysore University in the third round. The Kho-Kho team (Men) defeated Nagpur but lost to Poona in the finals, R3I

The Inter-University Cricket Tournament (South Zone and All India Finals) was held at Baroda from the 23rd December, 1956 to the 19th January, 1957 under the auspices of the M. S. University of Baroda. In all twelve Universities participated in this Tournament. The All India Finals between Bombay and Delhi was the most interesting and exciting match and it lasted for more than seven days. In all 1820 runs were scored during this match.

(I) Coaching Training Camps:

This year Shri V. R. Naidu was deputed to attend the Coaching Camp in Hockey which was conducted at Lucknow by the Government of India (Ministry of Education). In all six selected Staff members of the University have attended such Coaching Training Camps.

(J) Campus Works Projects:

As per the Campus Works Project scheme of the Government of India (Ministry of Education) the manual work of the Open-Air Theatre was taken up in the beginning of the Second Term and within a period of about one month, the work was completed. More than 1,500 students from various Faculties and Institutions contributed their labour in completing this project.

(K) Participation in National Tournaments:

This year seven University students participated in the National Championships as under :-

4. National Cadet Corps

During the year, the N.C.C. activities at the University were much expanded. The 6th Bombay Battalion, N.C.C. which was a two Company Unit was expanded into a three Company Unit. The 5th Bombay Girls Troop, N.C.C. which was working during the last year as a two sub-troop unit became a full-fledged Troop with three sections. Bombay Medical Company, N.C.C. having been finalised these two units commenced regular work during the year.

(I) 6th Bombay Battalion, N.C.C.:

This N.C.C. Unit continued its activities during the year. The unit functioned as two Company Battalion upto the 30th September, 1956, and was having its full strength of 315 cadets. From the 1st October, 1956 an additional Company was given to the Unit in expansion programme and the full strength of 470 was completed by enrolling the cadets. Due to this expansion there was a proportionate increase of N.C.C. Officers. Regular parades were held twice a week on Sundays and Wednesdays.

Ceremonial parades were held on the 2nd December and the 9th December, 1956 respectively in connection with N.C.C. Week and University Week at which Shri R. M. Desai, Collector, Baroda and H. H. Fatehsinhrao Gaekwad, Maharaja of Baroda took salute respectively.

The Unit presented a Guard of Honour to Dr. John Matthai, Vice-Chancellor, Bombay University who was the Chief Guest at the 6th Annual Convocation of the M. S. University.

All the cadets were given extensive training in courses leading to B & C Certificate Examinations. 61 and 12 cadets had appeared and 29 & 4 passed respectively. 5 cadets were sent for selection at N.C.C. Course, at which 2 were selected. They have completed training and have been granted permanent Commission in the Army.

One N.C.C. Officer and 20 cadets attended the Combined Cadre (N.C.C. NCOs.) at Belgaum organised by No. 1 Circle CC from the 20th October to the 31st October, 1956.

Annual Training Camp of the Unit was held at Nasik, near Bhonsale Military School, from the 24th December, 1956 to the 6th January, 1957. 7 NCC Officers and 390 cadets attended this camp along with permanent staff of the Unit. The camp was a grand success, and was visited by the following dignitaries:

Two Officers and 85 cadets of this unit participated in the 6th Combined Cadre and Social Service Camp conducted by No. I Circle at Nasik from the 6th May, 1957 to the 19th May, 1957. They carried out Social Work in the form of digging cannel, constructing approach roads, improving the local market ground and reclaiming the ground on the banks of river Godavari. These cadets along with those from Gujarat earned a very good name by their exemplary discipline and team work during the camp period. Variety entertainment programme presented by these cadets was largely appreciated by all concerned during the camp. Along with these cadets about 25 non N.C.C. Students of M. S. University also participated in this camp and carried out Social Work along with the cadets. They enjoyed the camp life thoroughly.

The Unit held a training camp for A. C. C. Teachers drawn from all Gujarat and Saurashtra region at Vallabh Vidya Nagar from the 14th May to the 26th May, 1957. 210 teachers including 10 women teachers attended this camp and they were acquainted with the new syllabus introduced for the A. C. C. with effect from 1957.

(2) 5th Bombay Girls Troop, N.C.C.:

The Unit carried out its activities for the second year during the period. The unit separated from the parent unit with effect from the 3rd July, 1956 under the Command of Troop Commander 2/Lt. Kumari S. A. Nachane.


One Sub-Troop was added with the commencement of the academic year transforming the unit into a full troop of 90 cadets and three officers.

5. Students' Common Hall

The common room provides reading materials like dailies, periodicals and a small collection of books and facilities for certain indoor games such as carrom, draught, chess and table-tennis. It has also a cafeteria. hall is used for holding meetings of various students' associations, lectures and indoor games tournaments.
