

NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT, 1967-68 INTRODUCTION

The idea of establishing a University at Baroda had started engaging the attention of the former Government of Baroda State since the year 1909. Some schemes for the establishment of the University were framed but none of them materialised. The Baroda University Commission of 1927 made out a strong case for the immediate establishment of a Unitary, Residential University at Baroda having the Faculties of Arts, Science, Technology and Agriculture, Economics, Commerce and Administration. Besides the Faculties, the University was to have the Institute for Oriental Studies, the Institute for Gujarati Studies, the School of Fine Arts, the School of Nursing and the School of Domestic Science. Provision was also to be made for extension Programmes, the Library movement as a University extension movement and compulsory medical examination. Although circumstances at that time were not favourable to the establishment of a separate University, the idea was not given up. The following institutions for higher education were established in Baroda during the two decades that followed :

- 1. The Secondary Teachers' Training College in 1935.
- 2. The Sayaji Golden Jubilee Science Institute in 1937.
- 3. The Pratapsinh College of Commerce and Economics in 1942.
- 4. Government orders were passed for the establishment of Medical and Engineering Colleges which ultimately began functioning from 1949.

In 1947, His Highness Maharaja Sir Pratapsinh Gaekwad revived the idea of the University and appointed a Committee to consider the question of the early establishment of the University. The Committee submitted its report to the Government of Baroda towards the end of the year 1948 and recommended the establishment of a primarily teaching and residential University with power to affiliate mofussil colleges. It favoured among others the tutorial system of instruction. All the existing institutions of higher education including the

His Highness the Maharaja Sir Sayajirao Gaekwad of Baroda

Central Library, the Oriental Institute and the Kalabhavan were to be taken over by the University. The Committee also recommended that the Government should give a block grant of Rs. 25 lakhs annually to the University for the first five years.

The Government of Baroda under their Order No. (R) 169-39 dated the 21st February, 1949, decided to establish a residential University for Baroda and to affiliate to it the Colleges at Visnagar, Petlad and Navsari which were situated in the State of Baroda. Due to the subsequent merger of the Baroda State with the then State of Bombay, the jurisdiction of the University was restricted to the area within a radius of ten miles from the University Office. The University started working on 30th April, 1949 with the following institutions:

- (a) Constituent Institutions under the Management of the University:
 - 1. The Baroda Arts and Science College
 - 2. The Pratapsinh College of Commerce and Economics
 - 3. The Secondary Teachers' Training College
 - 4. The Kalabhavan and the Engineering College
 - 5. The Music College
 - 6. The Oriental Institute
- (b) Constituent College managed by the Government of Bombay:
 - 7. The Baroda Medical College
- (c) Constituent recognised Institutions managed by the Government of Bombay:
 - 8. The Baroda Museum and Picture Gallery
 - 9. The Baroda Sanskrit Mahavidyalaya.

By June 1950, the institutions taken over were re-organised into the six Faculties of Arts, Science, Education and Psychology, Medicine, Commerce, Technology and Engineering. The First Year and the Intermediate classes in Arts and Commerce were organised into a separate institution called the Intermediate College. Three new Faculties, of Fine Arts, Home Science and Social Work were also started from June 1950. The Management of the Baroda Sanskrit Mahavidyalaya and the Gujarati Section of the Old Baroda High School were taken over by the University from the then Government of Bombay in 1951. To start with, the University followed the Bombay University courses and the standards of admissions, examinations, etc. The first examinations of the University were held in March-April, 1951.

Growth of Student Enrolment

Student Enrolment: When the University first started functioning in April 1949, it had as its total strength 2,962 students, of whom 131 were post-graduate

students, 902 degree class students and the remaining reading for the undergraduate, diploma or certificate courses. In the next eighteen years, the total enrolment of students in the University has gone up from 2,962 to 14,235 registering an increase of 11,273 or almost a five-fold increase. The average yearly increase in the student enrolment since 1949 has been nearly 657.

In 1950, the total number of male students was 3,508. This number has increased to 10,906 in 1967-68 registering a rise of about three times. The rise in the enrolment of women students has been more remarkable. Between 1950 and 1967-68 the enrolment of women students in the University has increased from 484 to 3,329, a rise of almost seven times. On an average, the annual increase in the enrolment of women students in the University between 1950 and 1967 has been about 150.

Student-Enrolment in Post-graduate Courses: The enrolment of students in various post-graduate courses provided in the different Faculties and Institutions of the University has been showing a steady rise right from 1950. In 1950-51, the enrolment in the post-graduate courses was 303, which has gone on increasing year by year and has become 1518 in 1967-68, registering an overall increase of 1215 or 400.9 percent. The average annual increase in the past eighteen years has been about 68 students. The number of post-graduate men students has increased between 1950-51 and 1967-68 by 847 about 320 per cent, and the women students by 367 or 907.5 percent. Growth of Enrolment in Degree Courses; In 1950-51, there were 2,437 students reading in the under-graduate classes of the different Faculties and Institutions of the University. The figure for 1967-68 is 10,741. Thus, the under-graduate student population of the University has increased by 8,304 showing a three and a half times increase between 1950-51 and 1967-68. The increase in the case of men students and women students during the same period is 6,023 (or about 318 per cent) and 2,557 (or about 944 per cent) respectively. It will be seen that the growth in the number of women students in the University in the past eighteen years has been noteworthy.

University Teachers

University Teachers and the Staff-Student Ratio: The total number of teachers (including Assistant Lecturers and Part-time Lecturers) in the Faculties and the Institutions of the University during the year under report is 874 as against the total student enrolment of 14,235. This gives an over-all teacher-student ratio of 1:16.2. The corresponding strength of the university teachers and the staff-student ratio over the last five years is indicated below:

Hostel and Health Services

Halls of Residence: With a rapid increase in student enrolment, the pressure of demand from students for residential accommodation in the University Halls of Residence has been on increase. The University has been taking all possible steps to increase the hostel facilities for the students. At its start in 1949, the University had accommodation for only 400 men students and no accommodation for women students. At the end of the year under review there were 10 halls for men and 4 for women students. There were 2,059 men students and 757 women students in different halls. The percentage of students residing in the University hostels works out to be 19.8. The corresponding figures for the last five years are as under:

In the last eighteen years of its existence, the Faculties and the Institutions of the University have made considerable progress. The courses have been thoroughly revised keeping pace with recent advancements in various fields of knowledge; special emphasis continues to be laid on tutorials, seminars and home assignments consistent with the special requirements of a teaching university; efforts are being made to improve conditions, academic and physical, obtaining in the Faculties and Institutions; new departments and new programmes of training and research are being added; provision of adequate staff, improvement of old buildings, addition of new buildings, increased grants for equipments and teaching aids, provision for a closer contact between the teachers and the students, the creation of a good academic climate, development of library and laboratory facilities for the staff and the students, increasing the research output, introducing innovations in teaching and examination procedures and the maintenance of the quality of student discipline—these have continued to receive the closest attention of the University authorities.

The University's record of achievements and innovations over the past eighteen years is impressive. New Faculties—of Fine Arts, Home Science and Social Work were established in the year 1950 and the Faculty of Law in the year 1961. A new College—Shri Manibhai Kashibhai Amin Arts and Science College and College of Commerce—was started at Padra in the year 1965.

With the help of financial assistance from the University Grants Commission, the University was able to strengthen and consolidate the teaching and research activities in the various departments of Humanities, Social Sciences and Sciences. The University also started the three year first degree course in Arts, Science and Commerce, and post-graduate courses in Bio-chemistry, Microbiology, Geology and Home Science. The Departments of Archaeology and Ancient History, and Museology were also developed with the help of the grants received from the University Grants Commission. The Department of Education in the Faculty of Education and Psychology has been up-graded as a Centre of Advanced Study in Education (CASE) to carry on researches on problems of education on an All-India basis. The Students' Counselling Centre and the Examination Reform and Research Unit were established in the Second Plan. Some buildings for teaching purposes, and residential accommodation for students and teachers were constructed with the help of substantial grants from the University Grants Commission in the Second and the Third Plan periods.

On account of an expansion scheme in each of the Second and the Third Plan periods, the Faculty of Technology and Engineering increased the yearly intake capacity of the students from 75 to 300 in the degree courses in Civil, Mechanical and Electrical Engineering. Two new Departments viz. Chemical Engineering and Metallurgical Engineering were established in the year 1963 and 1966 respectively. The Faculty has also been recognised by the Ministry of Education as a Teacher Training Centre for lecturers of Engineering subjects. It has also started 9 post-graduate courses in the different branches of Applied Mechanics and Civil, Mechanical and Electrical Engineering, for which grants are being provided by the University Grants Commission. A new institution, called the Polytechnic was established in the year 1957 to conduct diploma courses in Civil, Mechanical and Electrical Engineering. Two schemes approved by the All-India Council of Technical Education and the University Grants Commission enabled the University to raise the intake capacity of students in diploma classes at the Polytechnic from 180 to 360. The Extended Diploma Courses in Civil, Mechanical and Electrical Engineering with an intake capacity of 100 students were started in the Polytechnic in the year 1963.

The development activities during the preceding years are described in the Eighteen Annual Reports that have been published so far. This Nineteenth Annual Report covers the period from the 1st April, 1967 to the 31st March, 1968 and is submitted to the Senate in accordance with Section 24(2) of the Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda Act as amended up-to-date.

Second meeting (15th October, 1967) (b)

The following business was transacted:

The elections of the Pro-Vice-Chancellor and of a teacher on the Council of Post-graduate Studies and Research were held. Three fellows were assigned to the Faculties. Lapsed grants amounting to Rs. 51,500/- in the Capital Budget and Supplementary grants amounting to Rs. 3,03,814/- in the Revised Budget were sanctioned. Proposals for amendment of Statutes 91, 125, 136, and 209A were considered and passed. The Eighteenth Annual Report and the Eighteenth Annual Accounts for the year 1966-67 were passed and the excess of expenditure over the revised estimates for the year 1966-67 was also approved. The report of the Board of Accounts for the years 1965-66 and 1966-67 was considered and passed. The proposal to institute 2 posts was considered and passed.

Third meeting (31st March, 1968) (c)

Two fellows were assigned to the Faculties. Replies to questions were given. The Annual Financial Statement comprising of the re-

vised estimates for the year 1967-68 and the estimates for the year 1968-69 was considered and passed. The proposal for amendment of Statute 193 was referred back to the Syndicate. Proposals for amendment of Statutes 199 and 200 were considered and passed Ordinances relating to the Examinations, Syllabi, Standard of passing etc. for the Faculties of (i) Arts, (ii) Technology and Engineering and (iii) Home Science and the List of text-books prescribed were considered and passed. The proposal to institute 29 posts was considered and passed.

1. Council of Post-graduate Studies and Research

The Council of Post-graduate Studies and Research met twice during the year on 12th August and 14th December, 1967 and considered in all 57 items referred to it. The following are the main items considered and recommended by the Council and approved subsequently by the Syndicate.

(1) Recorded the progress reports of the previously approved research schemes and recommended their continuation where necessary. It also considered and recommended some new research schemes for implementation during the year 1968-69. The titles of the schemes are given in Chapter VI-Research Work in the University.

(2) Recorded the 32nd and 33rd half-yearly progress reports of the Critical Editions of Old Gujarati Texts (Prachin Gurjar Granthamala).

(3) Recommended that (i) The Central Institute of English, Hyderabad, (ii) The Institute of Tropical Meteorology, Poona, (iii) The Institute of Mathematical Sciences, Madras and (iv) The Engineering Research Institute, Gujarat State, Baroda be recognised as Institutes for research for the Ph.D. degree for eligible students of this University and for persons deputed by this University for conducting research for the award of the Ph.D. degree.

(4) Recommended the recognition of 20 more teachers as post-graduate teachers in different subjects.

(4) Faculty of Education and Psychology:

A brief summary of the important business transacted by various Boards and Committees, during the year, is given below:

CHAPTER V-OTHER BOARDS AND COMMITTEES

1. University Board of Sports

•

General

Two meetings of the University Board of Sports were held during the year. The Board appointed a Committee to select (i) teams for participating in All-India Tournaments, (ii) the coaches-(a) Shri G. Kishanchand for Cricket, (b) Shri J. M. Ghorpade for Tennis, and (c) Shri Y. S. Yadav for Kho-Kho (men and women). It recommended the purchase of a Suction Sweeper for the University Swimming Pool. It also considered various points about the working and development of the Physical Education Department.

2. Student-Welfare Board

A meeting of the Board was held on 8th September, 1967. The Board recommended that (i) one room in the Halls of Residence in each of the three areas, viz. Girls' Halls, Boys' Halls and Boys' Halls near the Polytechnic be kept vacant for the use of sick students, (ii) a "Suggestion Box " for inviting suggestions for the improvement of students' welfare be put up in all the Institutions, (iii) a good Canteen with a hall be developed for rest, recreation and meeting for day students on the campus of the Commerce, Arts, Science and Education and Psychology faculties and (iv) a Gymnasium be considered to be built.

3. Publication Board

The Board met on 29th July, 1967. It considered and recommended the publication of the following works:

(i) The Fratricidal War-by Professor Henry Wells, (ii) "Museums Today "-by Dr. Grace Morley, (iii) "Gujaratana Jatikuloni Mimamsa" -by Shri P. G. Shah, (iv) "A Study of the Growth and Development of the Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda "-by Professor D. M. Desai and Kumari Saraswati Pandit, (v) "Ethics of Shikshapatri "-by Dr. B. G. Desai.

Besides the above, the Board approved the programme of publication of four works under the Gaekwad's Oriental Series.

4. Board of Extra Mural Studies

The Board met on 16th September, 1967 and recommended a programme of extension lectures by University teachers and outside experts. An amount of Rs. 9,050/- was sanctioned for the purpose.

The Committee met on 15th April, 1967. It approved the terms and rates for the supply of books by the approved vendors for the year 1967-68 and also approved the procedure to be adopted for the purchase of books etc. from the vendors.

6. Building and Planning Committee and University Buildings Committee

A meeting of the University Building and Planning Committee was held on 13th December, 1967. It recommended that (i) the works of 100% grants from the University Grants Commission be taken up on hand soon and the works of sharing grants be executed subject to the Gujarat Government's concurrence and assurance of funds, (ii) the ordinary and special repairs to the various buildings of the University be carried out and (iii) a provision of Rs. 25,200/in the revised estimates for the year 1967-68 be made for making necessary arrangements for the water supply scheme in the University Campus.

7. Standing Committee on Equivalence of Examinations

The Committee met on 14th December 1967. It considered various items regarding equivalence of various examinations and cases of eligibility of students. It also considered various recommendations of the Inter University Board of India and Ceylon regarding equivalence of examinations. It recommended that status quo be maintained and O. 173 governing the conditions of recognition of examinations be not amended for the benefit of external candidates for joining higher courses of studies in this University. It also recommended uniform conditions of recognition for the recognition of Oversea School Certificate, General Certificate of Education (Ordinary-Level) and Indian School Certificate examinations of the Cambridge University and of other examining bodies in U.K.

8. Board of Visitors

Meetings of the Board of Visitors for the Faculties of Arts, Science, Technology and Engineering, Medicine and the Polytechnic were held during the year. Their recommendations and the reports of the meetings were submitted to the Syndicate. Some of the important recommendations made by the Boards and approved by the Syndicate were as under:

(1) Faculty of Arts: The Board met on 25th September, 1967 and recommended that (i) the introduction of compulsory one year classes in Modern European Languages for M.Sc. students as prescribed for M.E. students be referred to the Board of Visitors for the Faculty of Science, (ii) the post of Lecturer in German be converted into that of Reader in German, (iii) the purchase of a typewriter with Russian letters be approved, (iv) urgent steps be taken to provide additional equipments, books and staff as approved by the University Grants Commission in the IVth Five Year Plan.

(2) Faculty of Science: The Board met on 27th September, 1967 and recommended that (i) the subjects of Neuro-Chemistry and Plant Bio-Chemistry be introduced, (ii) the evening Diploma Course in Laboratory Techniques be started if the industries support it fully, (iii) one of the vacancies in the teaching post of a Lecturer in Botany be filled up with Soil Microflora Specialisation, (iv) the Geology Department should concentrate on development of studies in Petroleum Geology, (v) the need for the course in Engineering Geology as an elective subject at final year B.E. (Civil) Course be explored, (vi) the two posts of Laboratory Assistants in the Zoology Department be re-designated as Laboratory Technicians.

(3) Faculty of Medicine: The Board met on 20th November, 1967 and recommended that (i) necessary equipments required for running of the courses of D.O. and M.S. (Opth1) be provided as the Department is not properly equipped as required by the Medical Council of India. In case this is not done, the teaching of these courses may have to be discontinued, (ii) the Clinical Units be properly equipped to facilitate the teaching of undergraduate and postgraduate courses, (iii) the new Surgical Block be fully and urgently equipped with modern equipments before it starts functioning and the Dean's proposals in the matter be implemented, (iv) there should be full six Units in each of the Clinical subjects. All the Clinical Units need not be headed by full-timers, in view of the past experience that there are many frequent changes therein. Hence some of the Clinical Units be headed by part-timers (meaning thereby 5 to 6 hours work in the hospital and college and private practice allowed outside their duty hours) besides those headed by Honoraries and full-timers to ensure availability of good teachers, (v) the term of appointment of Honoraries should be five years at a time in order to ensure confidence for proper performance of their duties. No one should be appointed as Honorary or Assistant Honorary unless he has put in 10 years' experience in the field in the place concerned, (vi) more X-ray plates, medicines and equipments be provided, (vii) the post-graduate Departments be recognised with an additional full-time person as its Head/ Director in order to develop a good research programme in course of time, (viii) the library grants be increased substantially in view of increased prices of books and journals on account of devaluation, (ix) the hours and days for which the library remains open be extended from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. as on the lines of Shrimati Hansa Mehta University Library, (x) A non-M.B. B.S. student of M.Sc. Courses in Medical Sciences like Anatomy, Physiology etc. should undergo a training of 3 to 31 years as recognised by the Medical Council of India, (xi) Non-medical persons qualified with Post-graduate degrees in basic medical sciences would stick to the department as teachers and hence the admissions of non-medical students be continued, (xii) from amongst the first five students who have passed I M.B. B.S. Examination, the State Government be requested to give sufficient incentives to them to take up a basic Medical Science degree of B.Sc. (Hons.), (xiii) the proposal for starting a Diploma course in Pharmacy at the Medical College, Baroda, be approved, and the matter be pursued with the State Government by the Dean, (xiv) the proposal to start Post-graduate Doctorate Course in Preventive and Social Medicine be generally approved and steps be taken to obtain the services of Specialists in Mathematical Epidemiologist and Medical Entomologist which might mean an additional cost of Rs. 2,000/- per year for the College.

(4) Faculty of Technology and Engineering: The Board met on 3rd October, 1967 and recommended that (i) the Geological Engineering be introduced as an optional subject at the degree level and be referred to the relevant Board of Studies, (ii) the Post-graduate Diploma course of one year duration in Dock and Harbour Engineering as in Indian Institute of Technology, Bombay be introduced and be referred to the relevant Board of Studies, (iii) the State Government be requested to expedite sanction about their share of the matching grants so that the University may give the necessary undertaking to implement the pending schemes, (iv) the teachers be encouraged to engage themselves more in Research Projects.

(5) *Polytechnic:* The Board met on 29th September, 1967 and recommended that (i) arrangement may be made to keep the Polytechnic Library open from 8-00 a.m. to 10-00 p.m., (ii) admissions in the First Year Diploma Classes be restricted to not more than 400 students.

9. The Academic Committee

The Committee met on 10th August, 1967. It considered the proposal contained in the D.O. letter of the Secretary to the Government of India, Ministry of Education, for introducing Compulsory N.C.C. Training in the First Year of the undergraduate courses and not in the Preparatory Unit Courses where there is a lot of wastage and recommended that the *Status-quo* be maintained. It also considered the Report of the Review Committee set up by the University Grants Commission on the introduction and development of Military Science as a course of study in Universities and Colleges and recommended that it is not in favour of introducing such a course in this University. It also recommended that it is not possible to introduce military history and war strategy as subjects of study at Undergraduate or Post-graduate level in this University, as suggested in the minutes of the meeting of the Standing Committee of the Inter-University Board of India.

10. The Preparatory Courses Committee

The Committee met on 3rd April, 1967 and recommended the introduction of a course in German Language at Preparatory level on par with other second languages from the academic session 1967-68. It also recommended appointment of members in the Sub-Committees for smoothening the work of admissions to Preparatory Courses in Arts, Science and Commerce in the session 1967-68. It approved the changes in the Text-Books for English, Hindi, Gujarati and Pali as well as the syllabus in General Science for students of the Preparatory Arts and Commerce Courses.

11. Deans' Meeting

Four meetings of the Committee of Deans of Faculties and Heads of Institutions were held during the year. The Committee recommended as under:

- (i) The follow-up work of the medical inspection of the students be carried out thoroughly as formulated by the Medical Inspection Board.
- (ii) The rules for granting exemptions from N.C.C./Physical Training be observed scrupulously.
- (iii) The N.C.C. camps be held during Winter Vacations.
- (iv) The cover page and format of the prospectuses of the Faculties and Institutions be on the lines of the prospectus of the Faculty of Fine Arts.
- (v) All the students of the University, especially those taking their examinations, must always carry with them their identity cards.
- (vi) Any person, not taking his examination at a particular examination centre or not connected with the conduct of the examinations at that centre and yet found loitering in the buildings where the University Examinations are being conducted should be seriously dealt with by the Senior Centre Supervisor. If such a person is a student in the University, he may be at once suspended from his studies and if he is a non-student, he may be even handed over to the Police as a trespasser by the Senior Centre Supervisor.
- (vii) The University examinations may be held only during a vacation period.
- (viii) Arrangement of supervision work by teaching staff-members for conducting the test examinations efficiently be approved.
- (ix) The question of increasing the number of working days in the University as recommended by the Kothari Commission was considered and suggestions were invited from the Deans and the Heads.

12. Finance and Establishment Standing Committee

Nine meetings of the Committee were held during the year. The Committee considered several items concerning requests for additional establishment grants, purchase of equipments, approval of plans, estimates and tenders for construction work, contracts for supply of petrol, servicing of vehicles, cleaning and adjustment of typewriters etc., and requests from members of the staff regarding the study leave, the leave without pay for study abroad and the extension of leave, etc. The recommendations of the Committee were placed before the Syndicate.

The Committee met as the Budget Committee on 18th January, 1968. It submitted to the Syndicate the revised estimates for the year 1967-68 and estimates

for the year 1968-69 after scrutinising various proposals received from the Faculties, Institutions and the Office of the University. It also recommended to the Syndicate to appoint an Economy Committee to suggest ways and means to effect economy in the working of the University and to give their report for consideration by the Syndicate. Seven meetings of the Economy Committee were held and three interim reports were submitted to the Syndicate.

13. The Investment Committee

The Committee held five meetings during the year. The recommendations of the Committee concerning the investment etc. of the University Funds were approved by the Syndicate.

14. The Press Supervisory Committee

Six meetings of the Committee were held during the year. They considered the monthly reports of the Manager regarding the work of the Press, the Stationery Unit and the Publication Sales Unit and also the printing programme, and made recommendations regarding the purchase of paper, stationery, equipment etc.

15. Shri Sayaji Sahityamala Publication Committee

The Committee met on 16th August, 1967 and recommended the publication of the following works:

(i) આકાશના દીવા-by Shri Rajnikant Modi, (ii) ખેતી સુધારણાની યોડીક વાતો -by Shri Y. I. Pandya, (iii) પંચતંત્રની વાર્તાઓ ભાગ ૧-૨ અને હિતોપદેશની વાર્તાઓ ભાગ ૧-૨, બીજી આવૃત્ત-by Shri Chandrashankar M. Bhatt.

16. Sir Sayajirao III Memorial Research Prize Fund Committee

The Committee met on 16th August, 1967 and declared the award of the Essay Prize of Rs. 300/- to Shri Vasantkumar Somabhai Parekh for his essay on ' अर्थायीन सारतीय छतिछासमां श्रीम'त सयाछराव गायडवाउनुं महान '. It also decided to invite essays on the subject ' धार्मिंड मूक्यो अने समझादान छवन ' for the year 1967-68.

17. The Advisory Committee for the Halls of Residence

The Committee met on 1st August, 1967 and considered the possibility of having the "approved houses of categorised types" for students who do not secure admissions in the Halls of Residence.

18. The Wardens' Committee

Two meetings of the Committee were held during the year. It approved a general scheme for the revival of the Central Committee for Halls of Residence and the revised application forms for the new and old students. The revised budget for the year 1967-68 and the estimates for the year 1968-69 were prepared and submitted to the Syndicate for approval.

19. The Advisory Committee of the Students' Health Centre

The Committee held two meetings during the year. It recommended appointment of two honorary physicians, an honorary lady gynaecologist and an honorary eye-surgeon in the Health Centre for extending facilities to staff members and students of the University.

20. The N.C.C. Senior Division Advisory Committee

The Committee met on 15th November, 1967 and recommended that necessary water taps be installed for drinking water for cadets on parade grounds. It also decided that the Deans should call all the defaulter cadets of their Faculties and explain to them the need of attending the parades regularly.

21. The Advisory Board for the University Journal

The Board met on 21st August, 1967 and recommended appointments of members on three Editorial Boards of the Journal for (i) Humanities Number, (ii) Social Sciences Number and (iii) Science Number; and an editor of each number.

22. Sheth U. P. A. R. Unit Committee

The Committee met on 17th July and 25th August, 1967 and recommended appointment of a Sub-Committee to submit recommendations to the Committee regarding the ways and means for carrying out researches on theory of Ayurveda and other objectives of application in the use of Indian Medical Plants.

23. The Manuscripts Purchase Committee

The Committee met on 16th December, 1967 and recommended purchase of four manuscripts and paintings amounting to Rs. 1,828/-.

24. Selection Committees

During the period from 1st April, 1967 to 31st March, 1968, there were 12 meetings of the Selection Committees appointed under Section 48 (2) of the Act and they recommended 12 candidates for appointment to the posts of Professors and Readers in various Faculties and Institutions in the University. There were 14 meetings of the Standing Selection Committees for junior posts and 34 meetings of the Standing Selection Committees for Class III posts and 63 and 61 candidates respectively were recommended by these committees for appointment to different posts in the University.

25. The M. S. University Students' Aid Fund

The Committee met on 9th October, 1967. The total amount of help given to the students by way of tuition fees, examination fees, books, education given to the given

CHAPTER VI-RESEARCH WORK IN THE UNIVERSITY

A Straight Barrier

During the year, post-graduate teaching and research work was carried on in almost all the Faculties and Institutions of the University. The 417 students, who were registered for the Ph.D. degree in previous years, continued work on their research dissertations. The 58 new students (15 in Faculty of Arts, 29 in Faculty of Science, 9 in Faculty of Education and Psychology, 3 in Faculty of Medicine, 1 in Faculty of Technology and Engineering and 1 in Faculty of Fine Arts) were registered for the Ph.D. degree during the period under report.

Out of the University Grants Commission unassigned grant of Rs. 27,000/-, an amount of Rs. 12,000/- was earmarked for purpose of awarding travel grants to University teachers, research scholars and technical staff for research, higher training, etc. in University Departments, National Laboratories, Centres of Learning and Institutes of repute attending Conferences etc. The following 28 staff members were awarded the travel grants and an expenditure of Rs. 10,249-30 was incurred in the year 1967-68.

7. Literary, Cultural and other Activities

CHAPTER X-FACULTY OF EDUCATION AND PSYCHOLOGY

1. The new system of organising courses of study and evaluation semester-wise and the new scheme of comprehensive and internal assessment in all subjects that are taught in the Derartments of Education and Educational Administration were implemented during the year of reporting. Three features of this innovation deserve mention. Courses were assigned credit-points on the basis of the number of hours of study per week allotted to them. Secondly, each course was framed by the teacher responsible for teaching it and thirdly, students' achievement in the course was assessed by the teacher on a continuous basis according to a scheme of evaluation developed by the staff on an agreed basis. The assessment was done on an eleven point-scale. Eighty per cent attendance by the student in each course is a required condition. A Viva-voce Committee appointed by the University on which one or two external examiners sit finalises the results of the candidates on the basis of the internal records.

4. Staff

During the year, the staff of the Faculty consisted of 3 Professors, 6 Readers, 15 Lecturers, 4 Assistant Lecturers, 12 Class III and 7 Class IV servants. In addition to the above, a Co-ordinator was in charge of the Department of Extension Services in Secondary Education.

5. Library

The Faculty Library is amalgamated with Smt. Hansa Mehta Library and all students make use of that library. There is a separate post-graduate library attached to the CASE for the use of the post-graduate students and staff. The library has a collection of 4,746 books and it also subscribes to journals of high educational standard.

6. Museum, Laboratory, etc.

The Faculty has a fully equipped museum, which contains all modern teaching aids for the use of the student-teachers. The equipments designed and made as 'Projects' by students under training are kept here for use.

Similarly the Faculty also maintains a laboratory with equipments for trying out experiments to be taught to pupils in the class. The Psychological laboratory is also well equipped for conducting tests, etc. by students.

Audio-Visual Programme ;

The Unit of Audio-Visual Education organized a number of film-shows for the staff and students of the Faculty. The mobile units of the United States Information Services, Bombay, and the British Information Services, Bombay, screened about 12 documentary films at the Faculty.

The Unit also helped the Department of Extension Services and CASE arrange educational exhibitions, both at the Faculty and in the local schools. It organised the training programme in manipulation of audio-visual aids for the students of the B.Ed. and Dip.Ed. classes and helped the English Teachers The students for the primary teachers of Baroda conducted in the Faculty.

Degree Programme of the University with specialization in Rural Community Education. The field-training of the students was confined to two villages of the Baroda District, Itola and Koyali. The training programme being interdisciplinary in nature, assistance was obtained of some staff members of the Faculties of Arts and Social Work and Shri V. T. Krishnamachari Institute of Rural Development.

The Centre worked on developing research tools indentifying community leaders and for collecting the perceptions of community leaders, teachers and school students on the best ways to develop community-oriented schools.

CHAPTER XII (B)—SHETH UJAMSHI PITAMBERDAS AYURVEDIC RESEARCH UNIT

1. Staff

The staff of the Unit consists of a Head (Honorary), one Senior Research Vaidya, two Junior Research Vaidyas, one Research Medical Officer, one Research Assistant in Pharmacology, one Research Assistant in Chemistry, four Class III and seven Class IV servants. Dr. A. D. Joseph, Dean of the Medical College, Baroda worked as the Honorary Head of the Unit upto November, 1967. From December, 1967 Dr. T. V. Patel, Dean of the Faculty of Medicine worked as the Honorary Head of the Unit during the year.

2. Functions of the Unit

Research in Ayurveda is the sole object of this Unit. The Unit has a Library, a Museum of Indian medicinal herbs and minerals, a clinical laboratory, a Rasa-Shala and an Out-patient Department. Twelve beds at the S. S. G. Hospital have been placed at the disposal of the Unit for Ayurvedic clinical research and inpatient treatment.

3. Library

The total number of books is 2,629. Nine Ayurvedic Journals were subscribed to during the year.

4. Museum

Fifty groups of available medicinal herbs, each group consisting of 10 drugs according to the Pharmacological Classification of Charak are arranged and maintained in the Museum. Specimens of minerals and other useful medicines have also been kept A section on Ayurvedic Pharmacopacial medicines is also maintained. There are about 1,000 Ayurvedic specimens, 54 herbarium frames, 75 specimen jars of fresh herbs preserved in solution, 16 charts and maps. About 300 specimens have been collected for the Herbarium and are classified. A relief map of India showing the distribution of important medicinal plants in India is exhibited in the Museum.

5. Research

(1) Out-patient Department :

During the year 30,640 patients attended the Unit for treatment.

(2) In patient Department :

Twenty-nine patients were admitted and investigated during the year.

(A) Clinical trials of well-known Avurvedic remedies :

(i) The work on evaluation of the effects of "Samshamni No. 1" as an anti-hypertensive drug has been concluded. Twenty cases have been studied.

(ii) Evaluation of the effect of the oil of semicarpus anacardium in cases of ankylostomiasis. Forty cases have been studied.

(iii) Evaluation of the effects of "Amrit Bhallataki Avaleha" in cases of rheumatoid arthritis. Five cases have been studied.

(iv) Evaluation of the effects of "Daryadi-Quath-Ghanavati" in cases of dysmenorrhoe1. Five cases have been studied.

(v) Clinical trial of "Ekhara-Beej = Hygrophila spinosa" in cases of male sterility. Twenty cases have been studied.

(vi) Clinical trial of "Rasavanti = Berheris Asiatica" in cases of leucorrhoea. Three cases have been studied.

(vii) Evaluation of the effects of "Lashuna-Yoga" in cases of bronchial asthma. Seventeen cases have been studied.

(B) Research in the fundamental theories of Ayurveda:

The work of Prakriti-Vinischaya in relation with haematological studies is in progress. Fifty normal subjects have been examined.

(C) Pharmacological Research:

Anti-inflammatory activity of Guggul:

Mahayograj Guggul is used extensively as anti-rheumatic remedy in the Ayurvedic practice of medicine. Mahayograj Guggul contains some 24 ingredients. In view of this it seemed of interest to test the efficacy of one of the chief ingredients viz. Guggul for its anti-rheumatic anti inflammatory activity against experimentally induced inflammation. Dexamethasone and indomethacin were used as reference compounds.

Anti-inflammatory activity experimentally studied in male albino rats weighing 200 to 250.0. g, by the cotton pellet implantation method described by Robinson & Robson (1964).

6. Rasa-Shala

Amrit-Bhallatak-Avaleha for clinical trials in rheumatoid arthritis and Deva-darvyadi Quath-Ghanavati for clinical trials in gynaecological diseases were prepared in the Rasa-Shala.

7. Garden

50 Ayurvedic herbs are maintained in the garden for fresh juices and quaths that are used in Pharmacy preparations and clinical trials.

(5) A study tour for the students and the staff of the Faculty was arranged to Ajanta and Ellora during December 1967.

(3) The teachers of the Faculty participated in various group shows of Paintings, Sculptures, Textiles etc. and held one man shows and individual shows at various Centres.

(4) Shri Jeram Patel, Reader in Applied Arts was elected to the Lalitkala Akademi to represent artists' organisations of Gujarat, Professor N. Chaudhuri and Professor K. G. CHAPTER XVI-FACULTY OF SOCIAL WORK

1 Courses of Study

Post-graduate Degree in Social Work - M.S.W.

The training programme of the Faculty consists of three major components :

(1) Class Room Work

The courses of study aim at preparing competent workers for variety of positions in the fields of social welfare. Since the establishment of the Faculty in 1950, its policy has been to provide generic training in Social Work. In regard to theory courses the system of electives was introduced during the academic year. This system enables students to select field courses according to their specialization.

(2) Field Work (Practical Training)

In any professional training the theoretical knowledge should be supplemented by practical training in the field. Therefore, an increasing emphasis is being placed on the field work experience of the students. On an everage the students put in 15 hours a week for their parctical training. There are five agencies cooperating with the Faculty and participating actively in providing good learning experiences to the students.

In the initial years there were no suitable agencies for offering field experiences in the fields of Rural Social Work, Urban Community Welfares and Psychiatric Social Work. The Faculty took the initiative and established the following three agencies with the primary purpose of training the students :

(i) Rural Community Welfare Centres:

At present, the Faculty is running two Rural Community Welfare Centres at villages Bhaili and Raipura. Every year 5 to 7 students are placed in these Centres for their field work training. As a part of student training programme the Faculty carried out Social Education Programme for members of the Youth League. These programmes included recreational and cultural activities, literacy classes, discussions on topics related to social and economic life of rural people. The students organised women's groups in different falias of the village, and also encouraged village youth to take active interest in community programmes. In addition to this, the programme of family planning was also carried out in these villages.

(ii) Fatehgunj Samaj Kalyan Kendra:

This centre was established in the Fatehgunj area in the year 1951. It extends training facilities to the students and also serves as a service agency for the local community. The main functions of the Kendra are recreational and social education programmes for different age groups, subsidiary diet for children under 12 years, community education on health problems, advice on family planning etc. During this academic year, 7 students were placed in the centre for their field work experiences. This year the centre had organised variety of activities for youth.

(iii) Mental Hygiene and Psychiatric Clinic :

The Clinic was established in July 1952 as an Outpatient Clinic in the S. S. G. Hospital on part-time basis. The Jean and Howard Norman Trust of Australia gave grants to the Clinic and it started working full-time from July, 1954. The objectives of the Clinic have been to provide field instructions to Psychiatric social work students, to offer psychiatric services to the community and to participate in programmes leading to the prevention of mental illness in the community. As of October 1965, the Clinic is working as a Psychiatric Department of the hospital. However, we do use the Clinic services for students' training programme and receive all the help and co-operation from the staff in providing excellent learning experiences to our students. One of the staff members is working in the Clinic to supervise and coordinate the field work training programme of the students.

(3) Res arch Experience

As a part requirement for the Degree of Master of Social Work, the students of the Faculty undertake research studies which are primarily intended to provide an experience in the use of research methods.

(4) Camp and Study Tour

The camp and study tour programme form a part of the total training programme of the students in the Faculty. A programme of camp was organised at Shamlaji, District Sabarkantha during the first academic term for junior students. The purpose was to provide students with an experience in democratic group living and also to offer them an opportunity to study the working of a rural and tribal community development block sponsored by the State. The programme of study tour to Hyderabad was arranged for senior students to help them get acquainted with different types of welfare services organised by voluntary organisations or those managed by the State Department of Social Welfare. Visits to some industrial organisations were also included to enable students to learn more about labour welfare services as they exist in different settings.

(1) To accomplish greater involvement of Field Work Agencies in the students' training programme, a programme of seminar on the following topics was organised by the Faculty. The local members of the voluntary welfare organization, Government Agencies and Industrial organizations participated in these Seminars.

- (a) A seminar on 'Family Planning Services' was held on 30th September, 1967.

(2) On request from the Ministry of Health and Family Planning, Government of India, New Dethi, a programme Workshop and a short-term training course were organised for Urban Community Development workers. The participants for these programmes represented the States of Gujarat, Rajasthan, Andhra Pradesh and Delhi Administration. For organizing these programmes, the Faculty received a grant of Rs. 8000/- from the Ministry of Health and Family Planning, New Delhi.

7. Co-curricular Activities.

(1) The Faculty maintains a film library of its own. Every year additional films on subjects of academic interest are obtained for use from different organizations. Film shows are periodically arranged to supplement class room teaching.

(2) The Students' Association of the Faculty organised socials, sports, outings, debates and lectures by eminent speakers on topics of academic interest. It also arranged a picnic to Chandod-Karnali on 22nd January, 1968. The R15

Association worked for Bihar and Koyana relief funds and raised an amount of Rs. 1,199-75.

(3) The Study Circle arranged a series of lectures on different topics during the year. The students participated in the programmes organized at the university level.

(4) First prize was awarded to the Faculty in Garba Competition in Inter-Faculty Cultural Programme. Kum. Rani Bhaktani won the first prize in the Elocution Competition.

(5) Rao Baha Jur Ramlalbhai H. Desai Gold Medal was awarded to Shri V. C. Kumaran who stood first in order of Merit for the Group enrolled for the year 1965-67. He was also awarded Shrimati Manorama Karandikar Shield on 22nd March, 1968. The Alumni Association Shield was awarded to Shri P. K. Menon, alumni of the group 1965-1967 who stood second in the order of merit.

(6) The Alumni Association continued to give information and counsel to graduates regarding job and other problems. Since its inception, the Association has been making constant efforts to establish close contacts between the Faculty of Social Work and its alumni. It acts as a central bureau of information for transmitting news of employment opportunities and related matters to its members. During the last 18 years of its establishment the Faculty has trained 389 graduates. Most of them are holding key positions in the field.

8 Shri V. T. Krishnamachari Institute of Rural Development, Samiala

The Institute entered its 12th Year.

The Social Educational Organizers Training Centre was discontinued from 1st April, 1967. It implemented four programmes : (i, The Panchayati Raj Training, (ii) The Family Planning Communication and Action Research, (iii, Social Welfare Training, (iv) Social Science Orientation for Ahmedabad School of Public Health Nursing. The Panchayati Raj Training Centre conducted 9 courses and trained 232 fresh trainees; the total number of trainees trained so far are 1734. In follow up programmes the various villages in Baroda District were visited by the teaching staff to contact the past trainees to evaluate the impact of training. The Family Planning Communication and Action Research Project undertook the Pilot work for orientation in staff development for Medical Officers, field project in staff development, Refresher course and Workshop for ex-trainees. Family and Child Welfare Programme was sponsored by the Central Social Welfare Board, New Delhi in August 1967. Two courses were conducted during the year During the first course there were 53 trainees and during the second, there were 57 trainees. The Social Science Orientation for Public Health Nursing Students was held this year also as usual. The Scheme 'Conditions and Care of the Aged in Rural communities in certain parts of Gujarat' was completed and the writing work of the report is on hand.

As per the resolution of the Bar Council of India the new Three-year course in Law has been started from the academic year 1967-68 in the interest of reorganization of Legal Education. Under the new pattern students, wishing to have academic legal qualification can get the degree of Law called LL.B. (General) at the end of two years, successful study and those wishing to have the professional degree in Law will be required to study for one more year to obtain the professional degree in Law called LL.B. (Special). During the second year of the course candidates may choose any one of the following options alongwith other usual compulsory subjects :

Labour Laws (2 papers) OR Taxation Law (2 papers) OR International Law (2 papers) OR Land Revenue, Tenancy Legislation, Village Panchayats, Law of Co-operatives (2 papers).

CHAPTER XVIII-ORIENTAL INSTITUTE

1. The main work of the Oriental Institute is research and publication of unpublished important works carried on with the help of a big collection of manuscripts and printed books on all subjects related to Indology. When the Institute was taken over by the University in 1949, it had a good record of publications—109 volumes in the Gaekwad's Oriental Series and 516 other books. At the end of March 1968, the number of publications in the Institute was 153 in the Gaekwad's Oriental Series and 588 other books.

2. Post-Graduate Teaching

Besides the above, as a part of the scheme of co-ordination of the teaching of 14 Shastras of Sanskrit in the University, 7 members of the Institute are recognised as Post-Graduate teachers in Sanskrit and Gujarati for guiding M. A. and Ph. D. students. They guided in all 4 Ph.D. students in Sanskrit, Gujarati and Ancient Indian Culture and 128 M. A. students in Sanskrit, Gujarati and Prakrit. The Director continued to work as Head of the Gujarati Department of the Faculty of Arts.

3. Staff

The staff consisted of 1 Director, 1 Deputy Director, 4 Research Officers, 8 Class III and 9 Class IV Servants. The staff of the Ramayana Department consisted of 1 General Editor and Head of the Ramayana Department, 1 Assistant Editor, 2 Proof-Readers, 12 Critical Apparatus Writers, 2 Class III and 2 Class IV Servants.

4. Library

(1) Manuscripts Section:

This section has already a collection of 24,838 Manuscripts in Sanskrit, Prakrit, Pali, Apabhramsa and other classical Indian languages and in several modern Indian languages including some in Persian and Arabic. Of these 153 were added during the year, out of which 65 were purchased and 88 were received as gifts from : ____

During the year, 46 Manuscripts were lent out to other institutions, 30 to local scholars and 65 were issued for work on the premises of the Institute, while 1 Manuscript was borrowed from outside.

(2) Printed Books Section:

The Institute has a well-equipped library having a collection of 29,695 Books.

(i) Bonks:

This year the Library received a grant of Rs. 7,000/- for the Section and Rs. 300/- for Ramayana Department from the University for the purchase of books and periodicals. The grant has been fully utilised.

There have been some noteworthy additions during the year viz. collected works of Bu-ston, pts. 7-9; Indian Miniatures in the Allahabad Museum; Linguistic Survey of India by Grierson, Vol. I, pt. 1-2, Vol. II and Vol. IV; Catalogue of the Western Asiatic seals in the British Museum; Silpa Prakasa by Ramchandra Kaulacara: Khajuraho, a Study in the Cultural Conditions of Chandella Society by Vidya Prakash; A Dictionary of Indian History by S. Tailor, Medical Officer, Professor G. G. Dadlani, Dean, Faculty of Social Work and Shri B. K. Naik, Director, Physical Education addressed the students. This was followed by the detailed medical check up of all Preparatory students.

(2) Musical Evening and Annual Day celebrations were organized during the first and second terms respectively. Students participated in the University Week and cultural competitions.

CHAPTER XXII-PREPARATORY UNIT-SCIENCE

1. Courses of Study

The Unit provides instructions in Preparatory Science course of one year's duration.

2. Number of Students

During the year there were 976 men students and 156 women students. The total number of students was 1,132.

3. Staff

There are on the staff of the Unit a Head, 5 Class III and 5 Class IV servants. No separate teaching staff is appointed for this Unit but competent staff members from different departments in the Faculties of Arts and Science and the General Education Department teach the students admitted to the Preparatory Science Course.

4. Library

Special arrangements are made in the Central Hall in the Faculty of Arts for all Preparatory students to read during their free time.

5. Other Activities

(1) At the commencement of the first term of the academic year 1967-68, an Orientation Programme was arranged in the Auditorium of the General Education Centre.

(2) Members of the Medical Examination Board of the M. S. University of Baroda gave lectures on the importance of medical check-up and personal hygiene to the students of the Unit.

CHAPTER XXV-SHRIMATI HANSA MEHTA LIBRARY

The Press has machinery worth about Rs. 1,96,014 including machines worth Rs. 1,19,350 purchased from the grant of the University Grants Commission.

3. Printing Activities

The University Press works for the University publications, Magazines, Stationery, Printed forms etc. purely as a Service Department from April 1967. During the year 1107 plus 197 examination papers were printed under conditions of secrecy for the University Examinations. The Press also printed Syndicate and Senate Proceedings, Annual Report, Details of Establishment, Annual Accounts, Budget Estimates, Pamphlets, Certificates, General Forms, Lists, Prospectus, Questionnaires, Magazines, Souvenirs etc. of the Faculties and Institutions.

(4) Badminton Committee:

The Badminton activities went on vigorously. The rush of students for this major game was so heavy as to make evident the urgent need for one more court. The Committee sent teams to represent the University in the open Gujarat Badminton Championship and the Inter-University Badminton Tournament held at Ahmedabad and Bombay respectively.

(5) Table Tennis Committee:

There was a good response from students for this game. The Committee sent teams to represent the University in the Table Tennis Championships at Ahmedabad and Indore.

(6) Hiking Club:

The Club arranged a cycling trip to Pavagadh on 9th September, 1967 for the selection of students for the basic training camp at Mount Abu. The trip was followed by an over-night tracking to Vasad. The Hiking Club Camp was held at Mount Abu in December, 1967 in which 30 students participated. Shri Hemant Patel, a student of the Faculty of Technology and Engineering of this University, was one of the two students selected from all over India for Advanced ICE Training Camp at the Himalayan Mountaineering Institute, Darjeeling.

(7) Public Relation Committee:

The Committee arranged a talk on "The Gown and The Town" by Shri Coelho, Commissioner of the Baroda Municipal Corporation and a speech on 'The Comparative Study of the Union Executive and the Faculty Executive' by Shri R. D. Pandya, the Ex-Treasurer of the Union.

(8) Entertainment Committee:

The Committee arranged an entertainment programme on 15th August, 1967.

(9) Film Club:

The club arranged only one film show during the year.

(10) Co-operative Store Committee:

The Committee started during the year the spade work of organising a Cooperative store for the benefit of students and staff of the University.

(11) Social Service Committee;

The Committee took 30 students of the University to Kumeta and constructed a road of one mile.

3. Other Events

(1) General Body Meeting:

A meeting of the General Body was held on 24th August, 1967 to approve the budget of the Union and also to discuss the problems of the students. The response from students was not an encouraging one.

(2) University Week;

The University week was celebrated between 18th and 23rd January, 1968. Four student-shows were held with competitions for Drama, Garba Group Dance, Classical Vocal and Instrumental Music, Light Vocal Music and Classical Dance.

(3) University Fun Fair:

A Fun Fair was organised on 27th and 28th January, 1968 for collecting funds for the victims of the earthquake at Koyana. Out of the proceeds of Rs. 6,253-50, Rs. 4,045-10 were earmarked for the Koyana Relief Fund.

CHAPTER XXVIII-GENERAL EDUCATION CENTRE

During the formative years of the University when new Faculties were being established and old ones consolidated, considerable thinking was done on the place general education should have in the total academic programme of the University. It was felt that while a University should make provision for specialised studies in various fields of knowledge, it should also provide for the basic requirement that every student, no matter what his speciality, has some understanding of the physical world in which he lives, an appreciation of the complex social relationships by which he is surrounded and a grasp of human values which can be developed through contact with Art, Literature and the Humanities. In other words, it was necessary to find a place for the elements of liberal education alongside highly specialised studies.

To fulfil this need, the University accepted the principle that General Education should be an important complement to specialisation. Accordingly, a beginning was made as early as 1953 when a programme of General Education lectures and discussions was arranged for the Final Year students of the Arts, Science and Commerce degree classes. The results of this exploratory work were encouraging. Members of the staff gained a better understanding of the aims and techniques of General Education through experience of working the pilot project, as well as through visits to foreign Universities and contacts and discussions with experts in the field. As a result, a comprehensive scheme was undertaken from June 1957 embracing the Preparatory classes and, the First and Second Year Degree classes in Arts, Science, Commerce, Fine Arts and Home Science as well as the Pre-Medical Year and the First Year of the Engineering. The Preparatory Course was reorganised making General Education an integral part of its curriculum.

2. Organisation

The General Education Advisory Committee consisting of Vice-Chancellor, Pro-Vice-Chancellor, Deans and other members advises the University authorities on all matters pertaining to the General Education Programme for the various Faculties of the University matters regarding the selection of the General Education courses, preparation of reading material, system of Tests and Grade etc.

3. Building and Equipment

Classes meet in the General Education Centre, constructed and equipped with the Ford Foundation Grant of \$ 4,30,000. The Auditorium has been completed and is in use. The Language Laboratory and the Music Room are equipped with furniture and instruments.

4. Students under the programme

The General Education programme was organised this year for the Faculties of Arts, Commerce, Science (including Pre-Medical), Home Science, Fine Arts

and Technology and Engineering. The programme in each of these Faculties was offered to the First and Second Year of the Three Year Degree Course, the final year of the degree course being entirely devoted to the optional or special studies.

This does not include about 2500 students of the Pre-University Arts, Science and Commerce classes who take compulsory core courses in English Language, Indian Literature, Social Studies and Science.

General Education Courses 5.

The following are the General Education Courses for the year:

(1) Humanities (which include Literature and Art Appreciation)

- (2) Story of Human Civilization
- (3) On Values of Life
- (4) Social, Political and Economic Problems of India
- (5) Science and its Impact on Life

These courses were distributed over two years to the various faculty classes. Every student at the under-graduate level had to offer the above five General Education courses out of which three were for University examination. In case of two there was no examination but attendance was compulsory.

6. Teaching Staff

The General Education Centre has a nucleus staff of nine teachers who not only teach in General Education and the Pre-University classes, but serve as liaison and help in the preparation of reading material and organisation of the programme. Besides, the General Education work is shared by about fortyseven teachers from the various departments of the University.

7. Library

The Library has a stock of about 2,000 books on General Education at a cost of Rs. 8,500 approximately. The Library at the General Education Centre is specially used by the students when they come to the Centre for classes. Every student has to spend at least four hours per month in the library reading for General Education.

8. Interest in General Education

Students' interest is certainly on the increase. The University examination in General Education has been major factor at work. But both attendance and performance have been much better even in those courses where there was no examination at all. For example, quite a large number of students participated in the Art Studio Programme and their interest in Clay-Work or Painting proves the success of the General Education programme in this University.

Not only has the attendance in classes been better than last year, but a large number of students have been making use of the small library at the General Education Centre, and writing out the given assignments: F.Y. Arts and F.Y. Commerce students submitted their essays in large number. F.Y. Science and Pre-Medical students took the Terminal Examination also and complained that these marks were not counted towards the final assessment.

By and large, therefore, it can be said that students have accepted the General Education Programme as an integral part of their studies at this University and have appreciated the importance given to the programme by the authorities.

9. Other Events

(1) General Education Programme at a higher level was extended to the B.Sc. (Electronics) students at the Suggestion of the University Grants Commission.

(2) A number of exhibitions and film-shows were arranged for the benefit of students taking Science Courses.

(3) Shri K. S. Yagnik, Co-ordinator, General Education Department, went to U.S.A. on an assignment with the Department of Education of the U.S. Government for the purpose of developing Asian Studies in Schools and Colleges of the U.S.A. and the State of Colorado in particular.

(4) Guidance regarding the General Education Programme and its implementation was provided to the Dean, Faculty of Social Sciences of the Kashi Vidya Pith, Varanasi, and to the Co-ordinator in General Education of the Punjab University, Chandigarh.

CHAPTER XXIX-STUDENTS' WELFARE ACTIVITIES

14

1. Hails of Residence

The University, being residential, makes constant efforts to increase and improve residential accommodation for its students. At its start in the year 1949 the University had accommodation for 200 men students in rented buildings and another 200 men students in University-owned buildings There was no hostel accommodation for women students. At the end of 1967-68 there are ten Halls for Men and four Halls for women students. The general policy of the University is to distribute students from various Faculties in different Halls so that every Hall has students from different Faculties. The University looks upon this as an important step towards promotion of integration amongst the students and towards awakening their awareness and interest in areas other than their own.

There was a heavy demand from students for residential accommodation in the University Halls of Residence. In order that the students may not be put to difficulty for searching accommodation in private houses in the city where the rents are exhorbitant and facilities are comparatively too few, the University has had to continue the procedure of admitting 3 students in most of the rooms this year also. Even then the demand for Hostel accommodation is so great that the construction of new hostels for men students is of the utmost necessity.

At the end of the year under report 2059 men students, 757 women students were in residence in different Halls as against 2020 men students and 769 women students at the end of the previous year. A statement showing the break up of these students Hallwise and Institutionwise is given in Appendix XI.

Administration of the Halls was carried on with advice of the Advisory Committee of the Halls of Residence and of the Warden's Committee. All the Halls have been provided with Common Rooms, generally used as Library-cum-Reading-room also. Indoor games are also provided in all Halls.

The University Health Centre dispenses ordinary medicines and provides treatment to the students of the Halls free of charge. In urgent cases the Medical Officer attends the students in their rooms free of charge. The Medical Officer also visits each Hall once a month to inspect sanitation and the Messes.

Central Committee for the Halls was formed with the Secretary, Wardens' Committee as its President. The following three Sub-Committees were also formed to carry out Cultural and Social activities in each of the Halls. (1) Foods Committee

- (2) Sports Committee
- (3) Cultural Committee

The Sports Committee arranged the Inter-Hostel Competitions in different games. National days like Independence Day, Republic Day, Health Day, etc. were also celebrated.

2. University Health Centre

During the year, the staff of the Health Centre consisted of the Medical Officer, one Part-time Lady Doctor, one Nurse, one Compounder-cum-clerk, one Laboratory-cum X-ray Technician, one Sanitary Inspector, three Hamalcum-Sweepers, two Physicians and one lady Gynaecologist were appointed as Honorary staff members from 1st August, 1967.

The Health Centre provides preventive and curative services for the students, members of the staff and their families. The new entrants were given a medical check up by the Medical Inspection Board in S.S.G. Hospital. Out of total 3761 students who were scheduled for medical examination, 3073 (81.70%) reported for medical check up. Out of 3073 students who were examined by Medical Inspection Board, 1,378 students (44.45%) were advised follow-up treatment to be taken either from the Health Centre, specialists of the S.S.G. Hospital, or the family doctors for various disorders *viz.* skin, eye, ear, nose, throat, heart etc. The information regarding the follow-up treatment has been available in 651 (47.65%) students. On miniature chest X-ray examination of the students during the medical check up six students were found to be suffering from Pulmonary Tuberculosis, three of them had pulmonary tuberculosis in the healed stage, whereas the remaining three had active disease. The three active cases were followed up at the Health Centre.

Out of 112 mess servants examined, 31 servants showed evidence of intestinal infection with parasites and were advised treatment. Fluoroscopic examination of the chest did not reveal any abnormality in any case.

During the year, out of the total attendance of 19556 patients at the Health Centre Clinic, 12413 (63.58%) were from the students and 7113 (36.42%) were from the members of the staff and their families. The average daily attendance has been 53.4 during the year. The Health Centre also remains open all hours for emergency and the doctor on duty attends in cases of emergency in the Halls of residence and the residence of the staff members. The total number of cases attended during the year has been 265, the average per day for such emergency cases has been 0.71.

The total number of laboratory investigations were 1176 which included 302 stool, 282 urine and 567 Blood and 18 other miscellaneous (smear etc.) examinations. The total member of fluoroscopic examinations was 293 and X-ray films 72.

3. Physical Education Department

(1) Staff:

The Director of Physical Education, three Physical Instructors, two Lady Physical Instructors, three Swimming Trainers, and One Boating Trainer.

(2) Physical Training :

Physical Training was imparted to 1045 Women students and 491 Men students by the Physical Instructors and the Lady Physical Instructors.

(3) Major Games :

Cricket, Tennis, Hockey, Football, Volleyball, Basketball, Kho-Kho, Throwball and Netball were organised and conducted by the Physical Instructors and the Officers-in-charge of respective games.

(4) Swimming and Bcating:

In Swimming 622 members and in Boating 114 members were imparted training by the Swimming Trainers and the Boating Trainer respectively. 1382 paid guests also took advantage of the Swimming Pool. Annual Swimming and Boating Competitions were also held.

(5) Tournaments and Competitions:

Cricket, Hockey, Football and Badminton Teams participated in League and knock-out Tournaments held in Baroda. The Badminton Teams (Men & Women), Basketball Teams (Men & Women), and Volleyball Team participated in the Gujarat State Championships.

Cricket Team won the M. C. Ghia Trophy by defeating Bank of Baroda in the finals.

(6) Training of University Teams:

The Training of various University Teams was organised and conducted by the Physical Instructors and the Officers-in-charge of respective games. Coaches were also engaged to give special training to Cricket, Hockey and Kho-Kho Teams (Men & Women),

(7) Inter-University Tournaments :

University Cricket, Hockey (Men & Women), Football, Volleyball, Basketball (Men & Women), Kho-Kho (Men & Women), Tennis, Badminton (Men & Women), Table-Tennis (Men & Women), Swimming and Shooting Teams were sent to participate in the Inter-University Tournaments.

Cricket team defeated Vikram, Bombay, and Shivaji Universities but lost to Indore University in the West Zone Finals. Shri D. N. Mahida (Captain) scored centuries against Vikram and Shivaji Universities. Shri S. I. Dudha also scored a century against Vikram University. The bowling performance of Sarvashri N. Y. Satham, P. V. Cholkar and S. I. Dudha was vary good.

Kho-Kho Team (Men) and Kho-Kho Team (Women) who were winners and Runners-up of the last year's tournament respectively lost to Nagpur University in the Semi-Finals.

Committees consisting of the members of the teaching staff look after the upkeep and arrangements of the rooms. The rooms are also used for the meetings of Students' Associations, social functions, indoor games and tournaments.

6. Hobby Workshop

The M. S University Hobby Workshop provides instructions to the University students in (1) Carpentry, (2) Assembling electric and electronic appliances, (3) Music (4) Clay-modelling, and (5) Photography, with a view to canalising the extra time of the students for some creative work. Students from several faculties and institutions are availing the facilities provided at the Hobby Workshop with interest and zeal The total number of students enrolled during the year 1967-68 is 198.
